Bus carrying 20 school children and two adults crashed into the median strip barrier coming down the northern side of the **Brynderwyns**

The driver of a school bus carrying 20 children and two adults on the steep northern side of the Brynderwyn Hill on State Highway One lost control of the bus and crashed into the median strip wire fence barrier on Tuesday morning 25 March,

Police received a driving complaint and the bus was pulled over at Uretiti. The 70-year-old driver was spoken to and was fined for "failing to stay within a lane". The children from Waitakere School in West Auckland were travelling to the Marsden Bay Christian Camp. They sat with their lunch boxes for over an hour on the grassed area alongside the Police weigh station waiting for a replacement driver and another bus to take them on to their camp.

Sergeant Simon Craig of the Bream Bay Police said, "The central median barrier saved the day again. It worked a treat that's for sure. This could have been nasty."

EDITORIAL

Thank goodness for those median strip wire barriers

Thank goodness for that central median barrier wire fence separating northbound and southbound traffic on the steep northern slope of the Brynderwyn!

On Tuesday 26 March a bus carrying 20 school children and two adults on their way to the Marsden Bay Christian Camp crashed into that barrier when the driver lost control of the vehicle. It is still a bit unclear if this was a driver fault or a mechanical one. The Police are looking into both possibilities.

The point I want to make though is that humans, even the best of us, sometimes make mistakes. Mechanical faults can occur in even well maintained vehicles. A bus full of school children crossing the centre line while coming down the Brynderwyn Hill could have had very tragic consequences.

Those median barrier fences have their detractors. When they first went up there were described as "cheese cutters" with claims they would be lethal for motorbike riders. I haven't heard any examples of fatalities or serious injuries to bikers caused by those wire fences. I have, however, heard of numerous instances of serious injury and lives being saved by their presence.

When I phone through for a fortnightly Bream Bay Police report Sergeant Simon Craig frequently comments how the median strip fence prevented a serious accident .

His comments on this latest save were "The central medium barrier saved the day again. It worked a treat for sure. It could have been very nasty."

I have been given several more examples of recent saves by those central median

- Several weeks ago a woman while trying to swat a wasp in her car drove into the barrier at Ruakākā. The car was a write off but the woman attributes the barrier to saving her life.
- A driver was seen weaving over the highway but on colliding with one of those centre lane bendy plastic posts, appeared to regain consciousness and pulled over to the side of the road.

A safety programme to install more of those fences on the state highway between Waipu and the Brynderwyn Hill has been paused with all NZTA resources going instead towards the building of the much talked about four-lane highway. So how is that going?

I checked to see if there were any updates on the New Zealand Transport Agency Northern Gateway web page. Nothing had changed since the last time I looked around Christmas time.

NZTA is in the process of securing land for the Puhoi to Wellsford section of the highway and is still investigating options for the Te Hana to Port Marsden and Port Marsden to Whangārei sections. Searching for further information I clicked on a link for frequently asked questions only to find this message: "Sorry, it seems you were trying to access a page that doesn't exist."

Ten years ago NZTA was actively looking at options for a bypass around the Brynderwyn - so no movement there.

It took 13 years and, by some reports, over a billion dollars to build the 18.5 ilometres of four lane highway between Pūhoi and Warkworth. There will be many more distracted, tired, reckless, drug or alcohol impaired and unwell drivers on that 55.4km strip of state highway between Whangārei and the Brynderwyns before we get those four lanes. There will also be tire blowouts and skids and steering failures.. Lets hope they all occur on the sections of road where we already have safety barriers.



Waipu Lions donate \$34,000 to the Northland Rescue Helicopter Service





The Waipu Lions handed over \$34,000, the bulk of the proceeds from the big Waipu Car and Bike Show, to the Northern Rescue Helicopter Trust at the Lions dinner meeting at the RAZZA on Wednesday night.

Jan Hewitt, marketing Manager for Northland Emergency Services Trust said this donation combined with the \$31.500 donated to NEST from the 2024 Car and Bike Show was a big boost to the services fundraising efforts.

She said the Government paid 80 to 85% of the emergency helicopter's operating costs but this left around \$1.5 million needed in sponsorship and fundraising.

She said the \$34,000 would go towards the purchase of three FLIR heat imaging cameras which a paramedic accompanying her said would be a big help in searching for people in the ocean, particularly at night. He said it was difficult to find someone in the sea in

the dark. A person in the water below might just look like the white foam of a wave but the FLIR camera would pin point heat coming from the person in the water.

The donation would also go towards the purchase of a new ventilator. The new machine is intuitive and able to react to the patient's requirement for air. At the moment the machines on the hellicopters need to be pumped by hand.

Last year the rescue helicopter crew were called out to 68 times to incidents in the Bream Bay and Mangawhai areas.

The gross return from the Car and Bike show held on Sunday 9 February in the Waipu Caledonian Park was \$47,000 with \$2,500 going to the Waipu Fire Brigade and \$1500 to the Bream Bay Swim Club both of which helped out on the day.

Did decades of sand extraction cause erosion of the Mangawhai Sandspit?

Mangawhai's sandspit is under severe threat, with a new aerial survey revealing over 400,000 tonnes of sand have disappeared—raising fears of a catastrophic breach at the spit's narrowest point.

Local residents and environmental advocates in Bream Bay are pointing to decades of sand mining as the primary cause, accusing Auckland Council of failing to monitor the activity or enforce conditions.

The first in-depth LIDAR aerial survey of the area revealed that more than 26,000 truckloads of sand have vanished from Mangawhai in just six years.

Auckland-based mining company McCallum Brothers has submitted a Fast Track application to extract 8.45 million cubic metres of sand over the next 35 years.

Coastal processes expert and Bream Bay resident Andre La Bonte said, "The sand miners will argue that there's no proof offshore mining has caused erosion of the Mangawhai sandspit and Pakiri shoreline. But their argument isn't backed by any significant New Zealand data, and it is strongly contradicted by overseas research. Now, most importantly, the latest Mangawhai spit LIDAR surveys confirm an alarming rate of sand loss."

Environmental groups believe sand has been shifted from Mangawhai to Pakiri to offset decades of extraction, weakening Mangawhai's coastal defences.

Malcolm Morrison of the Bream Bay Guardians was critical of Auckland Council's inaction.

"The buck stops with Auckland Council. It ignored expert advice; it did not follow up on breaches or chose not to prosecute McCallum's for them. Callum McCallum said that as part of the consent conditions, the Council had specific access to McCallum's dredges to

observe what was happening but never did. At the very least, it should be monitoring sand transport in this region as their own senior coastal officers recommended but they haven't bothered."

Mangawhai resident Ken Rayward said McCallum's most damaging dredging occurred after storms.

"McCallum's practice cuts off the lifeline that Nature provides, where this sand should be returned to the beach. It disrupts the natural cyclical process and creates further beach erosion."

Dr Valentina Spanu, an international geomorphologist, said, "The same situation happened at an urban beach in the city of Cagliari, Italy except only 2 million and not the 8.5 million cubic metres McCallum's want to take, was extracted over 46 years. Legal and illegal extraction was limited but inaction by the authorities and a lack of monitoring caused huge environmental destruction."

The Bream Bay Guardians have filed an official request under the Local Government Official Information and Meetings Act (LGOIMA) to demand answers from Auckland Council.

"Evidence has been presented showing that sand mining would lead to massive coastal erosion and the loss of the Mangawhai sandspit," Morrison said. "That scenario has now played out exactly as predicted." Asked when the McCallum Bream Bay sand mining application will be lodged, DEO Callum McCallum said finalising reports for the application is taking longer than expected "as we endeavour to cpover off any issues as they arise."

Work on Ruakākā to Marsden Cove shared pathway about to begin

The Bream Bay Shared Path group has been given the green light by Deputy Mayor Phil Halse to start work on a trail linking Marsden Cove Marina with the Ruakaka Town Centre.

Councillor Halse has informed the group that there is money in the Long Term Plan to begin work on the section of the trail along Marsden Point Rd. and then along McEwen Rd to the entrance of the Hermpac property.

Negotiations are underway with Hermpac and Marsden Maritime Holdings to secure easements over their land to take the trail to the Marina. Grant Brown of the Shared Path Group said they are confident these will be forthcoming later in the year.

He said the group intended to engage Hansen Developments for this first stage of the project with Grant Brown and Darrell Trigg as Project Managers.

All going to plan work is expected to begin this month.

A pile of sand 15,000 feet high under the sea off the top of Northland

I am told the Waikato River once flowed up the East Coast and ended at the Parry Channel off Whangārei Heads.

We know that the Waikato River was diverted by land movements at Henuera near the head of the current Karapiro Dam from where it flowed into the Firth of Thames. Evidence can still be seen of the old riverbed at Henuera. This tells me that the bulk of natural sand supply for the East Coast has been cut off at Henuera. Mining sand on the East Coast now means we are harvesting an irreplaceable resource. Evidence of this can be seen at Helena Bay where sand has been stripped for commercial purposes. Some natural recovery will happen at the expense of other areas.

Harvesting of sand on Northland's East Coast I believe must stop.

It is hard to imagine much natural increase of sand on Northland's West Coast either. The various hydro dams must be collecting any natural flow of sand down the Waikato River and commercial harvesting of sand at Mercer will further deprive the West Coast.

However there is a pile of sand 15,000 feet high under the sea off the top of Northland that nobody is touching. This can be seen on NZ marine charts. I would like to know why such could not be harvested by a couple of really big barges bringing in great surges of sand to Auckland and other ports. This could be offered at one price ex barge and slightly more if stockpiled locally. Sand should not be harvested from Bream Bay or anywhere else on Northland's coastline except from this massive pile.

Scenic helicopter rides on offer at this year's Waipu Easter Carnival

19 April, the date of the Waipu Primary Easter Carnival in the Caledonian Park is coming up fast and Dee Field, who is sharing the role of Carnival Co-coordinator this year with Sarah Tesniere ,says setting up the event is now "kind of my natural habitat."

Dee first got involved in the carnival in 2020. Allowing for one year out because of Covid 19 restrictions, this is her fourth year of helping to run the event. The carnival itself is in its seventeenth year.

Dee said each year is different with new people getting involved and bringing new ideas and new skills.

An exciting addition to the programme this time is scenic helicopter rides. Another new offering is a pamper zone with massage, eyebrow shaping and eye lash tinting.

There will be more activities for older kids such as a dunk tank, climbing wall and axe throwing and there will be more food stalls. Asked if it was hard to find enough – Dee said, "Not at all. Everyone wants to be at the Easter Fair we had to cut off applications ages ago".

There will be all day free entertainment on the main stage and many free or low cost activities for children.

To start with the organising team was concerned about finding enough parent volunteers as Easter falls in the school holidays when families often go away but the roster is now looking pretty good. The upside is that the school holidays are likely to bring more visitors to Waipu.

To keep the focus in the Caledonian Park this year there will be no market stalls in the street.

Dee said, "It just got so congested there. We will see how it goes and if people don't like it we can change it back next year."

Asked if she had prior experience as an event organizer, Dee said she had none at all.

"I am just an organised sort of person and that seems to be skill enough."

Her talents in this area have been noticed and she was invited by Promote Waipu to become the group's secretary.

Proceeds from the Carnival will go towards school resources, playground upgrades, property projects, and the purchase of Chrome books. Previous Carnivals have funded the structured literacy programme, new chairs and a stage for the school hall and scooter tracks

Entry to the Carnival will be by koha or gold coin donation only. The Carnival runs from 9am until 2pm.



Takahiwai Marae hosts children from Auckland's Richmond Rd. School

Children from Richmond Rd. School in Grey Lynn were hosted at Takahiwai Marae last week along with their teachers and parents.

The 40 children are all pupils in the school's total immersion Māori language unit - Te Whānau Whāriki, but, as they live in Auckland City, many had not experienced a stay on a marae. Included were a group of little five year olds whose parents came along with them.

Ten-year-old Jade Reuben, who is the great granddaughter of Crete Milner of Takahiwai, instigated the visit. Jade lives in Auckland and is one of the tamariki in Richmond Rd. School's Te Whānau Whāriki. She and her mother Kasie Smith frequently visit whanau at Takahiwai so Jade wanted to share this experience with her school friends.

The Patuharakeke Taiao Unit with Ari Carrington and Hollie Kereopa spent a day with the children showing them a set of whale bones and challenging them to set them in the correct order. The children were given bones to polish smooth, to make porotiti discs, which can be strung on twin cords to produce a humming music when spun.

They learnt about the life cycle of tuna and the importance of looking after waterways.

Some of the uncles even went out at night to catch tuna for a hakari (feast) the children prepared for their parents who were invited to visit on Thursday evening. Parents and teachers expressed their gratitude to their marae hosts, saying they had all been well looked after.

An afternoon tea to show the community's appreciation for Ron and Kay Dixon's decades of volunteer work in Waipu

Waipu 2000 is hosting an afternoon tea on behalf of the citizens of Waipu to thank Ron and Kay Dixon for all the volunteer work they have contributed to the wellbeing of the town.

Trailers targeted by thieves



Police attended 10 family harm incidents over the fortnight Friday 21 March to Friday 4 April. This number is down on family harm incidents attended over the past few months.





A 10.7% general rates increase Graffiti and vandalism costly for proposed in WDC 2025/2026 **Annual Plan**

Consultation opened this month on the Whangārei District Council's annual plan and on its proposals for future water management under the Coalition Governments Water Done Well rules.

The Council is proposing a new targeted rate for stormwater.

It is also proposing to lower the Uniform Annual General charge, which would have the effect of reducing the rates burden for lower value property owners while raising it on properties of higher value.

Another proposal is to provide "contestable business grants" to owners of business zoned land currently used for farming. This would be funded by an additional 1.2% rates increase for ratepayers in the Commercial, Industrial and Rural sectors.

The draft budget contains a 10.7% general rates increase for the 2025/2026 year in line with the 7.5% in the Council's 2024 -2034 long Term Plan plus inflation.

WDC's water management proposals also up for consultation

The Whangārei District Council has also adopted its water management proposals for consultation.

While the Coalition Government has scrapped the previous Governments Three Waters plans which would have seen water management across New Zealand consolidated under four and then ten publicly owned entities it seems there is still pressure on Councils to work more collaboratively on their water management.

The Whangarei District Council's Infrastructure Committee Chairman Simon Reid said Council's plan for future water management is due to go to the Government in September.

He said, "We have investigated several options and brought two of the preferred options to the public to consider.

"Our preferred option is to have an in-house business unit and to increase our collaboration with Northland councils."

Under this option the delivery of water services would remain within Council as a business unit, rather than being established as a new organisation. The business unit would be responsible to the elected Council members and ultimately the ratepayers. "The alternate option would be a Northland Council Controlled Organisation (CCO) with Kaipara District Council and Far North District Council (drinking water and wastewater only).

"While this option would continue to provide a high level of service delivery, Whangarei District could end up cross-subsidising water costs for the rest of Northland, and the CCO could carry higher amounts of debt.

"Either way we know change is coming. We have been fortunate to have had a very high quality level of service for water in our district as a result of multiple decades of thoughtful management and governance, and I expect that to continue."

Bream Bay currently has some very active graffiti vandals.

Signs along Marsden Point Rd have been spray painted as was the Police shelter at the Uretiti weigh station, where the mess was quickly painted over.

Graham Boult, acting Chairman of Waipu 2,000, is particularly annoyed at damage to furniture newly installed in the Waihoihoi Park and to the Waipu public toilet block. Both of these are the result of efforts made by Waipu 2,000 volunteers. Informed of the problem Whangarei District Mayor Vince Cocurullo said graffiti is

rife throughout the district. He said the Council spends around \$400,000each year getting rid of it and a total of around \$1 million on vandalism repairs.

Recreation Centre Ruakākā Committee asks for \$3.2 million from WDC to build a new sports gymnasium

The Ruakākā Recreation Centre committee is asking the Whangarei District Council for a \$3.5 million investment towards Stage 2 of what it terms the "multi use indoor sports arena."

The committee claims that a \$3.5million investment from the Council would leverage grants from "central government and other agencies."

The proposed sports arena would be located in Peter Snell Rd near the new recreation centre building. It would have two full sized basketball courts and be available for a wide range of indoor sports including: netball, badminton, basketball, volleyball, futsal and indoor soccer.

In a letter addressed to the Whangarei District Council the Recreation Centre Committee makes the suggestion that the Council could purchase the old Recreation Centre building in Takutai Placewhich could then become dedicated club rooms for the field sports which use the Ruakaka sports fields.. This money could then go towards the proposed new indoor sports facility.

Rain brings relief to local fire brigades

The recent rain will have come as a relief to our local fire brigades. The dry hot conditions over the past few months made for worrying times. Ruakākā Fire Chief Warren Marshall said there have been some big fires in the far north, which have been difficult to put out but so far nothing of a large scale in Bream Bay.

On 25 March the Ruakākā Brigade was called out around 8.45pm to a back yard rubbish fire. Backyard fires are currently banned across the whole of the Northland Region with no word yet that this ban has been lifted.

On 27 March the Ruak \bar{a} k \bar{a} Brigade was called to a fire in One Tree Point when a fish smoker positioned close to a house caught alight.

Luckily the householder had a hose at the ready to put the fire out before it spread

Another concern of the Brigade is that people on rural properties make sure that a water source is available to put out a fire. This can be a full tank or a nearby dam. "Otherwise we have to wait for tankers to arrive before we can get to work", Warren

Over the past fortnight the Ruakākā Brigade has also been called on to provide cover in Whangārei when the Whangārei Brigade has been called out to fires or road accidents.

Meridian Energy board approves \$227 budget for the 130MW Ruakākā solar farm. Construction is expected to begin later this year



The location of the soon to be built Meridian Energy solar farm

Battery Energy Storage System expected to be completed this month.

Construction of the battery energy storage system (BESS) at the corner of State Highway 15 and Rama Rd. is expected to be completed this month.

Testing and commissioning has been underway for some time and the bulk of the work including the battery equipment, the switching station, interconnecting cables and associated ancillary plant is essentially complete. The final stages of civil works are underway including finishing an access road carparking areas, road lighting and a stormwater retention pond

The Meridian board approved the \$227 million budget to build a 130MW solar farm at Ruakākā last month. The contract for the build has been awarded to renewable energy experts Ethical Power and construction is expected to begin later this year with early site works likely to get under way over the next two months. Some adjustments were made to the original plans in consultation with the Forest and Bird Society. An additional 10ha of existing wetland will be retained bring the total area of protected existing wetland to 18ha. In addition a new native habitat area of around 11.7ha will be created on site 3 (alongside Marsden Point Rd.) including a new 5ha wetland to provide habitats for bird species such as bittern and dabchick.

The new wetland will help cleanse stormwater before it flows into the Ruakākā River.

It wasn't vandals - it was the Council



Lucina Cummings of the Bream Bay Coastal Care Trust thought vandals were responsible for the removal of the signs at the Bream Bay Drive entrance to the Ruakākā Wildlife Refuge and at the northern end of the beach in front of the Ruakākā Beach Domain.

Lucina Cummings of the Bream Bay Coastal Care Trust thought vandals had once again destroyed signs at Ruakākā Beach entrances and was astonished to find that the man who took the signs down was in fact a contractor doing work on Whangārei District Council orders.

The signs showed a map and gave detailed instructions where dogs are allowed and not allowed. The contractor told Lu the rules for dog control had changed and the signs are no longer accurate. When Lu asked him when new signs would go up he said there was no money in the budget for replacements. Lu's husband Spencer asked why Council staff could not have just tweaked the old sign with a marker pen. Lu who looks after the bird nesting sites in the wildlife refuge said the signs are needed as when she approaches people taking their dogs into the refuge they frequently won't believe this is a dog free area until they see the sign.

From the map on the Whangarei District Council website the section of beach from the Paradise Shores access to the Ruakākā Estuary is now a dog free area. Ann Midson Communications Manager tiwth the WDC said "Anew bylaw was adopted by Council last year, meaning tht many of the existing signs needed to be updated with fresh information.

We also adopted a more "directive approach" to many of our signs, to make things simpler and more straightforward for dog owners.

"The simpler signs have been installed at between 90 and 100 locations across the District, at the places where people with dogs access recreational areas, including those around the sign mentioned in this story.

"This particular sign is more detailed and needs to be redesigned and updated and that will be coor inated by Council working with NRC and DoC.






