FRiday 5 March wasn't the usual school day for the three girls in the Fetelika family of Waipū.

Shortly after they arrived at school, the tsunami alarm went off and their respective schools swung into evacuation mode. For the younger two girls, Leila 6 and Ella 9 who both attend Waipū Primary this meant running up St Mary's Rd. to higher ground. The Bream Bay News heard from another source that children in the swimming pool were told to get out immediately and they ran up the gravel road in their togs and with bare feet.

Ella said it was a bit boring waiting up on the hill at first but then the teachers organised some games.

Johnny Fetelika, who headed up St Mary's Rd to be with his girls, said he was impressed at how organised the evacuation was. The Waipū Fire Brigade was

The One Tree Point School PTA's Colour Run went ahead on Saturday 27 February, just in time before last weeks Covid 19 Level 2 restrictions limiting gatherings outside of Auckland to 100 people took effect on Sunday 28 February.

They were invited to join in a warm up routine with Dave and Sonia but many of the children were too keen to get to the throwing powder paint over one another part of the morning schedule to wait for this to finish. By the time the 150 headed out the school gate and around the six kilometer the course everyone was looking pretty colourful.

Good people

There are many reasons why I work to produce the Bream Bay News for you all twice a month but one that I enjoy and think is important is that within these pages we can celebrate local people.

I find the lives of some quite ordinary local people inspiring. Look at Sandra and Terry O'Meara, the thirteen foster children they have cared for and all the other things they have done and still do for the people in their community. They remain bright, positive people despite Terry suffering a severe illness.

Look at Judith Boyd and her kindness and care for everyone who comes within her orbit. As Michael Donald told her at her 80th birthday celebration "I don't think you realise the difference you made to people's lives, not just at the school but in the community with your generosity."

I was impressed by the humility of Alison Worthy who died last month after a long and courageous battle with cancer. Alison, despite her long history of involvement and service to the Waipū community, had expected no one to turn up to the service but the Coronation Hall was packed to the rafters.

Just a month earlier I had called in for a cup of coffee at the Mitre 10 café in Whangarei. I was alone and Alison kindly invited me to sit with her and her husband Graem3, who were also in the cafe. I can't remember what we talked about. I was probably holding forth about some issue or another. I can remember Alison laughing at some story I told and, notably, she never mentioned her illness once. I was shocked when I saw her death notice in the Northern Advocate.

I have noticed good people are usually happy people. I wonder which comes first the happiness, which allows them space to think of others or if, in the act of helping others, they become happy?

When the tsunami sirens went off on Friday morning I went down to see how many people had turned up at the top of Doctors Hill Rd. There was already a crowd there and it was getting pretty hot so I went home and filled some containers with drinking water. My friend Lesley Simkiss and I went along the rows of parked cars checking if anyone needed their water bottles topped up. People were grateful and being able to do something useful in this situation made me happy.

Later I learned that many of my fellow hinterland dwellers had done the same thing. Pam Crawley, for example, who lives in the Glenmohr Rd. hills, south of Waipū, had invited people who needed to evacuate from the flat land along South Rd. to her home and baked scones while her son delivered drinking water to the crowds parked up near the top of the Brynderwyns.

"There were lots of good Samaritans", I commented to Pam. She said, "No," this was nothing out of the ordinary.

"It's just what you do for other people at a time of need." Marilyn

up there as well and able to supply the children with plenty of water to drink. Fruit and snacks were handed around. There were also lots of parents to help look after the children.

For Grace – 14 who is a Bream Bay College student it was a climb up onto Sargent's Hill, where the Whangarei District Council water storage tank is located. A locked gate barred the way and the padlock needed to be smashed to let everyone through. School vans loaded with provisions, including lots of toilet paper, were driven up the hill. There were no toilets so the teachers improvised with girls sent behind the water tank and boys down the hill a bit. They were able to use a tap on the side of the storage tank to supply everyone with drinking water.

Eighty-plus year old Ton Lannan also ended up on Sargents Hill. When she tried to drive out from her home in Dune Lake Place, she found the roads blocked. She managed to get onto Marsden Point Rd. and was guided to a parking spot. With the help of a kind man, whom she only knows as Michael and her walking stick, she climbed up the hill. Ton said the Bream Bay College students and staff "were amazing" but she was surprised at the lack of forethought by the Council authorities.

"It was disgusting really. There were 600 people up on that hill. It is the designated place for the Bream Bay College students to go and you would think there would have been more preparation."

She has talked to staff and the Whangarei District Council Ruakākā service centre about this and understands they are making a list of what needs to be put in place should there be another tsunami evacuation. At One Tree Point School the plan was that everyone meet in the school hall and wait for buses to arrive to take them to higher ground. The intention was to take the children up Prescott Rd but Marsden Point Highway was too clogged for the buses to get through so they turned into a private driveway just before the Big Tomato shops. With nowhere for buses to park at the top of the driveway the children climbed up the hill on foot. They were able to use the toilet at the home of one of the school's families and had plenty of drinking water as they waited out the evacuation.

Ruakākā Primary School staff and children evacuated on foot to higher ground on Sandford Rd. The school supplies lunch so this went with them and there were shady trees to wait under.

Ann Marie Able, who manages the Ruakākā Beach Holiday Park, said the evacuation there went smoothly and it took just 20 minutes for her to alert all the campers and be in her car and waiting at the one lane bridge on Bream Bay Drive. Ann Marie said she waited around three or four minutes to get over the bridge and had further waits at both the intersection onto Marsden

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

SH1 Widening Ruakākā to Whangarei -Who is paddling the waka?

The proposed four lane widening of SH1 from the Ruakaka roundabout ("which will remain") to Whangarei is much discussed in the local community. Rightly so. The 22km has a \$692 m price tag. A project of this magnitude deserves considerable scrutiny not the least because this project is "treasury funded" and has not gone through the usual funding allocation system requiring rigorous cost-benefit analysis. Hence the gestation period has been much shorter because "this is one of the Governments shovel ready projects" (though in reality, this project is far from turning the first sod). Major roading projects have multiple issues ranging through ecological, NIMBY, vested interest, balancing flora, fauna and property and not least, value for taxpayers. Northland has been under-funded for a long time and the forecast spending is to be welcomed providing taxpayer value remains.

I have attended a meeting with NZTA at their Whangarei offices and a NZTA community meeting at Mata Hall. The message was the same. The corridor has been defined but not the actual alignment or adjoining road intersections. On- ground investigation is required before the design can be completed. Some or all of the corridor may be used. Land owners have been notified. NZTA say property purchases can't start until the alignment design is complete. Naturally, this has caused anxiety because of the uncertainty about how much land may be taken. Some have had their lives put on hold. Despite the on-ground investigation having not yet started, NZTA say the project will be ready for resource consenting by early-mid 2022.

The justification for the Ruakaka-Whangarei widening seems to be servicing Marsden Port on the basis this will become the Northland region hub. Of course, what Marsden Port will look like hasn't been defined yet just as what will happen to Auckland Port hasn't been defined. It should be clear that what some would have you believe is going to happen doesn't make it so. Aside from whether the widening is merited on a rational cost-benefit basis, there are other questions. NZTA say the adjoining Ruakaka to Te Hana upgrade will not occur for "30 years". Likewise, Warkworth to Te Hana may take a similar period.

NZTA is being assisted by Jacobs Engineering Group, a very large, multi-national American consultancy who acquired SKM a large Australian consultancy who, in turn had acquired Kingston Morrison, a Whangarei

consultancy. Many of the project team used to be with Kingston Morrison so its "just the same really". Was this large planning/engineering work competitively tendered? The NZTA website states the on-ground investigation and detailed design will be competitively tendered.

Organisation, works structure and leadership are key to successfully managing major projects. So is Peer Review; the process of standing back and reviewing the project direction, design, execution and fundamentals such as whether to let a single contract or divide the works into discrete segments. Not to mention whether the taxpayer is getting value.

When this project was in its infancy NZTA requested comment and public submissions. I stated that following the existing alignment or parallel to the north/ east was a no brainer. This was based on the existing alignment being essentially the most direct. Having witnessed the ensuing traffic congestion/interruption and works period of the Ruakaka roundabout construction, the bridge/road widening at Oakleigh and now the Otaika works, I could easily be persuaded a greenfields route for the SH1 widening is preferable. Mine was a rushed judgement without the required information and could easily have been wrong. NZTA is now doing the work to ensure the correct decisions are made. However, a dog and pony show without specifics is insufficient for the community. It is reasonable to conclude that if this project is going to consent early next year then the alignment decisions must be more advanced than the "indicative alignment" currently being shown by NZTA. A rational on-ground investigation (including sub-surface drilling etc) cannot be undertaken without knowing where any intersections/ structures will be located. NZTA say they do not have all the requisite land owners consents to enter and an investigation contract has not been awarded.

NZTA should want and expect a thorough examination of every aspect of the project. When this occurs is in the hands of NZTA. It should choose sooner rather than later. Stakeholders, including the taxpayer, need to be engaged in a meaningful way and it is incumbent on all those who value that notion to make sure they are.

Point Rd. and then onto State Highway One. She said someone was waiting coming in the opposite direction to cross the bridge perhaps to pick up a pet or an elderly friend or relation.

"Eventually someone let him through but this is a problem."

Carolyn Newey sent in photographs of traffic trying to get out onto State Highway One from the Port Marsden Highway. She and husband Keith decided to follow the car in front of them, which went up a private driveway near the McCathie Rd. intersection. She said Jevan Sturley and Tracey Williams, whose home is up the hill on this driveway, were very hospitable to the close to 30 people who arrived on their doorstep firing up their barbeque to cook sausages and offering everyone drinks.

The residents of the Ranburn Hospital and Retirement Home were driven up St Mary's Rd in the Ranburn van and a Leabourne Bus. The Waipū Fire Brigade helped with the evacuation and some of the elderly people were taken into private homes at the top of the road.

Several Geneva caregivers took their clients with them when they evacuated to the high point at the top of Doctors Hill Rd. Kerry Jarvis came prepared with plenty of drinking water, deck chair and sun umbrella for an elderly gentleman she was caring for to sit under.

Addi McCarthy and Sean Smith, who live in Finch St. Marsden Bay drove up Doctors Hill Rd. with their six-day-old baby girl and toddler. and were invited into the home of a Mountfield Rd. resident. Mountfield

Quarry was turned into a carpark, which helped to clear vehicles off Doctors Hill and Mountfield Rd. Two fire trucks from the Ruakākā station were based there, as was an ambulance. Up near the top of the Brynderwyns the rest area was full of vehicles. The coffee cart there must have had the best day ever.

Log trucks blocked the road to prevent more traffic coming north. As with many of the hill top evacuation sites the lack of a toilet was a problem.

There are many stories of hospitality and generosity towards people waiting out the tsunami warning on hilltops around Bream Bay. The owners of the One Tree Point Store Anjna and Nilesh Patel, for example, handed out drinks and snacks to those who evacuated up into the quarry off One Tree Point Rd.

Dead fish in the Waipū Estuary



Thousands of dead mullet in the Waipū Estuary

People living near the Waipū Estuary became alarmed this week when thousands of dead mullet began washing up in the mud at the edge of the estuary at low tide.

Peter Blanch said he thinks the deaths are due to the red seaweed, which was washed up into the estuary on a high tide and then sat there in big swathes rotting in the sun on the surface of the water unable to escape back into the sea

Mr. Blanch contacted Northland Regional Councillor Rick Stolwerk who in turn notified the NRC Hotline. Councillor Stolwerk said he expected someone from the NRC to come and inspect the estuary soon.

Some good news for people living on unsealed roads

There is some good news for people living on unsealed a dead straight road. It would be quite safe if the seal rural roads in the Whangarei District Councils draft Long Term Plan which sets out its spending priorities for the next ten years: the Council proposes to set aside \$47 million for the road sealing.

"We want to increase our level of service in this area and better meet the expectation of our communities," says the draft document.

The allocation does not depend on subsidy from Waka Kotahi – The New Zealand Transport Agency. Road sealing is horrendously expensive. Sealing just programme, if the funding is approved in the final one kilometre costs between \$400,000 and \$500,000 LTP. depending on the existing state of the road and the standards it needs to be built to dependent on traffic volume. Councillor Phil Halse, who served as a Bream Bay Ward councillor for 27 years and now living in Whangarei and representing Okara disputes this costing. He said that road sealing could be much less expensive if the Whangarei District Council didn't require every road to be six metres in width. Take the bottom of Sandford Rd., for example. There are 694 kilometres of unsealed roads in the Whangarei District. The extra funding will seal around 94 kilometers of these.

Asked if there is a list of roads to be sealed with this allocation Jeff Devine, Strategy and Planning Manager for the Northland Transport Alliance, said, No this is to be considered by Council over the next few months, hopefully they will approve a 3 year

When emergency alerts screeched out a tsunami warning on mobile phones across Bream Bay last Friday morning, it was scary and inconvenient for most of us.

For Hollie McIntyre, it was worse. Friday was to be her wedding day, on Ruakaka Beach.

Most of you will know Hollie's story - she was well known in the community through her work at OrrsPharmacy in Ruakaka, appreciated for her friendly smile and helpful manner. In October 2019 she learned the benign cyst she was diagnosed with in February was actually terminal cancer, and given six months to live.

Since then, she has faced numerous hurdles and setbacks - including the restrictions of a global pandemic- while constantly fundraising for expensive chemotherapy. She also made the effort to fundraise for others, including people affected by the Australian bush fires and fellow cancer sufferers. Last month she received the news that with the cancer spreading through her body, she had just weeks to live.

On Leap Day last year, Hollie proposed to fiancé Andrew Welsh after winning a competition at Ellerslie's Derby Day in Auckland, which brought an array of gifts, including a contribution towards planning their wedding.

Knowing time was short, four of her close friends got together and decided to make Hollie and Andrew's wedding happen in a week. They called on the local community to help pull everything together quickly.

"It will be an emotional and beautiful day," friend Kirsty Halliday said before the day. "So many people have got on board, so many vendors are giving their products for free or for next to nothing."

A tsunami on her wedding day seemed like just another bump in the road. "If we have to, we will get married wherever," Hollie messaged her wedding guests

from her Northhaven hospice bed. "If I have no dress no big deal. If our hair and makeup isn't done, I don't care. If there is a tsunami, we have heaps of wedding food to share with the community."

Everyone was hoping for a miracle, says Kirsty. When the land warning was lifted that afternoon, friends and family swung back into wedding mode. In under three hours, they had the bride ready and a new venue on high ground up Sandford Road prepared.

"There was not a dry eye in the crowd as family and friends gathered to witness two kind souls marry the love of their life," says Kirsty. "The evening went as smooth as possible and Hollie and Andy watched the sun go down at the end of their special day surrounded by their closest loved ones."

Kirsty says the day could not have happened without all the exceptional people involved, saying each of the businesses and people behind the scenes "all deserve the biggest fist bump and recognition."

"Their kindness and humanity is a true testament to Hollie and Andy and their families," she says.

"Hollie's battle isn't over yet but she has an amazing husband by her side."


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Essie's stepping down after eleven years as Ruakaka library Committee Chairperson

Terry O'Meara - Ruakaka Citizen of the Year

Terry O'Meara is the Ruakākā Library Citizen of the Year for 2020.

Terry, his wife Sandra and their three daughters came to Ruakākā in 1976. Terry, a fitter and turner by trade, was employed by the New Zealand Electricity Department and was transferred from Meremere to work at the Marsden Power Station. They first lived in the Power Station village and then built their own home at Ruakākā Beach.

Soon after his arrival Terry became an active member of the community. He volunteered as a Scout leader in 1977 and 1978 and became a member of both the Ruakākā School PTA and the St John Ambulance Committee. He joined the Marsden Jaycees where he held the positions of both Secretary and President and joined the debating team.

Terry became a Marsden Lion in 1985 and for 27 years played an active role in the many community projects undertaken by the Lions. He served terms as President, Secretary and Bulletin Editor.

For many years Terry and Sandra shared their home with foster children assisting 13 different children at difficult times in their lives. In 1981 they adopted the last of their foster children.



The number of people who turned out for Judith Boyd's 80th birthday celebration was a testament to the affection she is held in by many in the

Ruakaka community. More than 100 people showed up at her surprise festivities, which were organised by her children Sharon and Steve. With many family members unable to come due to Covid-19 travel restrictions, friends, and acquaintances from many areas of her life made up most of the guests.

As they wanted it to be a surprise, they could not ask Judith who she would like to be there



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
