A narrow escape on SH1

A local woman phoned the Bream Bay News last week to describe a frightening situation she found herself in when this Ute came weaving across the road heading straight towards her while she was driving home from Whangarei at around 3pm on Saturday 1 August.

Two vehicles in front of her had swerved to the opposite side of the road to avoid the Ute. Luckily there was no other oncoming traffic at the time. The woman slowed down and had almost come to a stop when the Ute ran off the road right in front of her flying up into the air and landing on its side in the roadside drain. Stones and mud from the impact of the Ute hitting the bank of the drain flew up and landed on her car causing damage to the paintwork and cracking the windscreen. As she sat there stunned wondering if the driver of the Ute had survived the crash, several other vehicles pulled up and ran to check if the Ute driver was OK.

A young man leapt out of the upturned truck "like a jack rabbit." He appeared to be unscathed. He climbed in with the driver of a vehicle marked with Fulton Hogan signage and then went back to his Ute to retrieve what looked like a glass bottle or, as someone suggested, perhaps a bong, and left the scene in the Fulton Hogan vehicle.

When the Police arrived he was nowhere to be seen. The woman, who does not want to be identified, points out that helping someone to escape police attention who has been driving so recklessly is irresponsible. She said the young driver could have easily killed someone and she was grateful she didn't have her children with her in the car at the time of the accident. She said that most Bream Bay residents regularly have

Ruakaka School's junior kapahaka group


Bream Bay schools got together in the hall at Waipu Primary for a combined kapahaka festival on Friday 31 July.

EDITORIAL

Mistakes on the highway can have terrible consequences

Last week I had a phone conversation with a young mother who had just survived a dramatic accident on State Highway One at Ruakaka while driving back from Whangarei

Understandably she needed to talk out some of the trauma she had experienced but she also had some strong points she wanted to raise.

The first was that all of us in Bream Bay regularly travel up and down the highway to Whangarei on what is a very dangerous road where serious accidents resulting in people being injured or killed regularly

I one had a close brush with this myself. A few years ago while driving to Whangarei I was slowed to a halt approximately 500 metres north of the Oakleigh Service station.

Just a few metres further up the road three people had died in a head on collision. We have to use that highway: to take children to sport, to access health services and for shopping.

Weirdly one of my daughters had a premonition that I could be involved and phoned to see if I was OK.

I regularly hear from Sergeant Simon Craig, Officer in Charge at the Bream Bay Police Station how head on collision accidents have been avoided when vehicles, which otherwise would have crossed the centre line or run off the road bounced off the wire fences which were installed there as part of an \$18 million project completed in 2017. It is likely that many lives have already been saved by this improvement.

Every year there is more and more traffic on our stretch of highway. I would feel a lot safer if the road were widened and there was a physical barrier sep-

> arating northbound and southbound traffic for the entire length of SH1 between Waipu and Whangarei.

But road conditions are only part of the problem. The behaviour of drivers is another. The young man who crossed the highway in his Ute and survived his vehicle crashing into the bank, flying up into the air and landing upside down in a drain was driving like a lunatic with no consideration for his own safety or the lives and

safety of other road users.

How do we make people like this act more responsibly? Helping him escape the scene before the Police arrived might not have been the wisest thing to do.

The woman who phoned was also concerned that legalizing marijuana might lead to people driving while under the influence.

I typed the question "Does marijuana use effect driving ability? Into Google and found top of the list a report by America's National Institute of Drug abuse which stated,

"Marijuana significantly impairs judgment, motor coordination, and reaction time, and studies have found a direct relationship between blood THC concentration and impaired driving ability."

The article went on to say that "Two large European studies found that drivers with THC (Tetrahydrocannabinol) in their blood were roughly twice as likely to be culpable for a fatal crash than drivers who had not used drugs or alcohol. THC is the main psychoactive compound in marijuana,

Is legalising this drug likely to result in more people getting behind the wheel of their vehicles while under its influence?

This is another thing to consider before we vote in the legalising marijuana referendum, along with: do we want young people experimenting with marijuana to be criminalised, is marijuana taking up a disproportionate amount of police time, are its effects any worse than those of alcohol, which is legal, is this drugs current illegal status placing its marketing and distribution in the hands of criminals? I am undecided on this issue

But back to the dangers on the highway - from time to time we all need to take a reality check and remember that when we drive we are in control of what can turn into a lethal weapon and our own and other people's lives are in our hands.

I worry about computer games I see the young ones playing where the heroes emerge unscathed from spectacular crashes with explosions and vehicle parts flying through the air in all directions. Might they confuse this with the reality on our roads where 353 people died last year?

For us older, more experienced drivers, we need to consider that any kind of impairment, including being tired, dazzled by bright lights, or in unfamiliar places, can lead to bad driving and that mistakes on the highway can have terrible consequences.

Hundreds turnout for vote on Waihoihoi skatepark

Waipu people turned out in droves to cast their vote in a poll conducted last week on whether or not a skate park should be built in Waipu's Waihoihoi Park.

The Whangarei District Council invited people to tick either the Yes or No boxes on forms provided at the Waipu Presbyterian Church Hall on Thursday 6 August from 12 noon to 6pm and Saturday 8 August from 8am to 1pm. Anyone over the age of five years was permitted to vote.

Asked how the vote had gone. Katy Davidson the Whangarei District Council's Team Leader Communications Operations said, "We had a great turnout to our two community drop-in sessions with several hundred people attending. The results will released to the community as soon as the votes have been counted." She gave no indication on when this might be.

The proposal is to build a small skatepark at the western end of the park alongside the existing playground. A flyer explaining to people what the vote entailed said, a Yes vote would enable construction of a skatepark to begin this summer while a No vote would mean the project would be deferred indefinitely as there is no suitable alternative site currently available. In September 2019 people were asked whether they would like a skatepark, half court or pump track to be built as a first priority with the skatepark receiving most support. In February 2020 a design workshop was held in the park with skatepark designers Rich Landscapes and a plan for a small skatepark was settled on which would allow space for the half court and pump track at some future date.

The proposal, however, has received opposition from some Waipu residents who prefer to see the Waihoihoi Park remain as a quiet, place for walking, enjoying the natural environment and resting beside the river.

The Whangarei District Council has set aside funds to build the skatepark. A youth zone project has been floated in the community for several decades with the stumbling block, finding a suitable place to build the facility.

The Whangarei District Council flyer states, after looking at available public space in Waipu, Waihoihoi River Park was chosen by WDC as the location to provide activities for young people within the community. The decision was based on its close proximity to toilets, short walking distance from the village, existing parking and good surveillance into the park

Clean up hasn't yet begun at former Ruakaka solvent recycling plant

Work has not yet begun on clearing away the solvents stored at the former Ruakaka Solvent Recycling Plant although Brian Smith, the site owner, recently informed the Bream Bay News that a contract had been let for the job.

Asked if the heavy rain in mid July had resulted in any flooding at the site and if solvents leaking from the stored containers may have been washed into the surrounding land or into the sea nearby, Colin Dall, Group Manager of regulatory Services for the Northland Regional Council said, "Whangarei District Council and Northland Regional Council staff inspected the plant site after the heavy rain on 17 and 18 July to check the impact of that rain. They observed that the stormwater contained in the bunded area had risen to a level where it had entered the main building at the site. There were signs that some of that bund water had subsequently leaked from the building to the adjacent land. The district council promptly arranged for the bund water to be pumped out down to a level that would stop any further water leaks from the building. Samples of the bund water and adjacent land were collected to check for what contaminants they contained. Test results for the

bund water showed that it contained several contaminants found in organic solvents. Soil samples were also collected to check for solvent contaminants. The test results for the soil samples have not been received yet from the testing laboratory."

Mr. Dall said, a more detailed investigation of the soil contamination at the site will be able to be done once the hazardous waste stored there has been removed

Four years after the Northland Regional Council brought a successful prosecution against the plant's owners, Mr. Smith and several companies he is the director of for an illegal discharge of hazardous substances into the surrounding duneland, a quantity of solvents remain stockpiled in rusty drums and old plastic containers at the plant.

An Environment Court Order served on the Mr. Smith and the plant's former operators in March requiring them to provide an inventory of all hazardous substances stored there and to ensure that these were safely contained was not complied with and the Whangarei District Council has since gained an enforcement order from the court allowing it to access the site and undertake a clean up.

Electric vehicle charger gone from Waipu's main street but fast charger may be coming soon

The electric vehicle charger on the Spark phone booth She said it looked as though the cord had been run in central Waipu has been removed causing problems over. for people hoping to top up the charge in their EVs She explained that Spark had set up five charging sta-Kaiwaka

The charger, which was back in action last year after being inoperative for some months after the fire in the main street in 2018 but was reported as damaged around a month ago and has since been taken away.

One man said as a regular commuter between Northland and Auckland he relied on the network of EV charges to keep his Nissan Leaf going.

A woman posted on the EV Charge Net chat site that

she arrived in Waipu with her vehicles battery almost completely out of charge and had to call in a tow truck to take the car to Kaiwaka.

Elle Dorset, a media spokesperson for Spark said, this particular EV charger had been quite "problematic."

"We've had a number of reports of issues with it, which escalated recently and Northpower were brought it to disconnect it as it was damaged. We unfortunately won't be replacing it as we don't have a spare part to replace it with."

> 'We are currently reviewing this service and while we don't have any plans in place, it could be something we explore in future."

> But Northland's electric vehicle champion Joe Comuso said that help might be on the way. The Northland Regional Electric Vehicle Utility Project had applied to the Government's Energy and Efficiency Conservation Authority for funds to install a fast charger in the Waipu museum carpark.

> Mr Comuso said Waipu had been identified as a place where there was a gap in Northland's EV charging station network. The Spark phone box charger was a slow charger useful sometimes in topping up a battery but a fast charger capable of delivering 50Kw per hour and is likely to bring more EV drivers into the town, The ECCA application had the backing of the Whangarei District Council and the Northland Regional Council and he expected to find out in the next couple of weeks if it had been successful.

> An Electric Vehicle charger at the Northpower's substation in Camellia Ave in Ruakaka was damaged in the mid July flooding and is also out of action.

Celebrating their new Croquet clubhouse



Whangarei mayor Sheryl Mai cuts the ribbon to open Waipu Croquet Club's new clubhouse, with help from the club's eldest member John Christmas (who celebrated his 90th birthday on the day of the opening) and youngest member Lynne Stewart.

It has been a long wait and lot of fundraising, but Waipu Croquet Club's members could not keep the smiles off their faces at the opening of their new clubrooms.

More than 100 members and invited guests, including Whangarei mayor Sheryl Mai and councillors Phil Halse, Shelley Deeming and Ken Couper, turned out to celebrate the new building in July.

Croquet club president Gordon Walker says it has taken two years to make the new clubrooms a reality. When their first grant application to the district council was turned down, Walker says councillor Deeming lobbied hard on the club's behalf. Their next application was successful and resulted in an \$80,000 grant, enough money to get the project in motion. Applications to other bodies were unsuccessful so the remainder of the approximate \$300,000 cost has come from members' own pockets, donations from the community and club fundraising

Memberships at the club has grown from 14 to 53 in the last five years, and Walker says the new clubrooms will boost the club further. "We had no power, toilets, kitchen, not even running water," he says, gesturing at the old clubhouse nearby. "Our members have been champing at the bit to get into the new rooms."

"We used to have to use the toilets at the backpackers," laughs club captain Christine Martin.

With a deck and large room to socialise, as well as a full kitchen and two toilets, club members can now gather in all weathers.

Walker and Martin agree the Waipu club's popularity is because the sport is such a social one, made more so by a new format, which sees groups of four out playing on each court. And players rack up the mileage - fitbit-wearing members walk up to six kilometres in a day of playing.

Whangarei Mayor Sheryl Mai thanked club members for their commitment and passion, and congratulated them on their increasing membership numbers. "I love coming to this community – you fight for what you want, and you get it," she said.

Ute ends up in ditch

On Saturday 1 August at 2.37pm a Ute swerved over the road at SH1 at Mata and ended up on its side in the roadside ditch. Two vehicles took evasive action and a third was showered with stones and mud suffering stone chips to the paintwork and a cracked windscreen. Police are making enquiries to confirm the identity of the driver who had left the scene in another vehicle.



A dinner of chicken, ham, roast potatoes, baby carrots and peas followed by dessert was served up to the guests and Christmas decorations, Christmas crackers and party hats were set out on the tables. Waipu Lion Sharon Carroll said she thinks the chance to get together for a celebration post the Covid 19 lockdown was eagerly seized upon by Waipu's older citizens.



An exciting development for the Waipu to Waipu Cove cycle and walking trail

The Waipu to Waipu Cove Cycle and Walkway Trail has had an exciting new development with the Brown family granting a 700 - metre long access over its Tahamoana Farm above Cove Rd.

Alongside this, other landowners are supportive of the trail running along the road reserve in front of their properties with David Lourie clearing vegetation to make way for the route. The new section of the trail will take the trail from Cullen Rd. to McLean Rd., a distance of 1.24 kilometres.

David Brown is effectively retiring a hectare and a half of his land, which will be planted in native trees and shrubs around the cycle and walkway route.

He has also built silt containment ponds with the aim of preventing sediment from reaching the drain which leads from his farm under Cove Rd. and down into the Waipu Estuary. Wetland species will further help to trap the sediment.

The three-metre wide cycle walkway easement, which will be vested in perpetuity with the Whangarei District Council, winds around the ponds and through the plantings. Easements can take a long time to establish but because the trail is on private land and David is happy for work to precede the trail formation did not have to wait until the agreement was finalised.

Contractor Paul Jenkins had almost completed build-

ing the new section of trail when the rains began. He said all going well and if the land dries out enough it would be open by Christmas.

Limestone rocks, supplied by the Brown family, have been placed strategically along the route to provide interest and places to stop and rest.

The Tahamoana Farm section offers people views over the Waipu estuary. David said some of his motivation in offering the easement was to keep foot traffic away from the shorebird nesting sites on the Waipu sandspit. The whole idea came about when he decided to build a new driveway at a safer location further to the east on

Cove Rd. He was also concerned for the safety of people cycling or walking on Cove Rd.

He said, "It doesn't bother me if people are cycling along at this end of the farm." In fact he is excited at how well the design of the cycle/walking trail is shaping up and considering investing in an electric bicycle himself.

He insists he is just a farmer who wanted a new driveway and that the members of the Waipu Cycle and Walkway Trust are the real visionaries.

He said Council Staff, the contractors and members of the trust have all been good to work with and it is wonderful how much community support the Waipu to Waipu Cove Cycle Walkway has gained.

Camp Waipu Cove has contributed \$25,000 towards the trail extension. Fencing contractors Crombie MacKay and Mike Leech have given a discount on their work and Mountfield Quarry has supplied metal at a discounted rate.

Funds to help with the fencing have come from the Alex McLean Trust and several local families have made generous donations

The Waipu Cycle and Walkway Trust has a Give - ${\bf a}$ - Little page where people can contribute to the next section of the route.

The Whangarei District Council and the Waipu Cycle and Walkway Group want to warn members of the public to exercise care when crossing the road to access the trail at McLean Rd. Tim Manning, the cycle/walkway trust Chairman said the plan is to create a safer crossing in the next stage of the trail build.

Volunteers are invited to a planting day on the new trail section on Sunday 23 August from 9.30am at 566 Cove Rd to plant around 2,000 native plants donated by local landowners and the Whangarei District Council.

Reade said Bream Bay's swimmers had shown some real commitment and effort this season, and congratulated them on maintaining their fitness with dry land work throughout isolation.



The Waipu River Walk -"An extremely super cool idea"

The Waipu Community Led Project committee has settled on a river walk as the project it will advance. The proposed walk will begin at the Waihoihoi Park and follow the river around to Nova Scotia Drive. It could also serve as a loop walk continuing along Nova Scotia Drive into Waipu and through the town centre back to the park.

The Whangarei District Council is offering various communities in the district \$100,000 to advance projects of their choosing. The proposal is that each community should discuss and decide on a project and work towards its achievement. In addition to providing a new public asset, an objective of the scheme is that the Community Led Projects should have a unifying effect bringing people of all ages and various walks of life together in a shared purpose.

The Waipu Community Led Project Committee (WCLPC) was formed after a series of advertised meetings last year. It invited submissions on how the money should be spent and in May, once the Covid 19 restrictions were lifted, members sat through a long meeting evaluating a list of suggested projects.

The river walk, which had received the highest number of public submissions received the highest score but the committee agreed that some of the other ideas: an adventure playground for toddlers, a petanque court and art trail, native tree plantings and signage acknowledging Maori involvement with the river and land could also be incorporated into the project.

Last week members of the Waipu Community Led Project team held a meeting in the Waipu Boat Club with Nova Scotia residents to listen to their concerns and hear ideas about how such a walkway could operate. Most of the residents were supportive of the proposal. They asked that the trail in front of their homes remain as a mown grassy strip rather then a concrete path to preserve the natural outlook and some had concerns about members of the public straying into private property and disturbance of the birds, which roost alongside the river.

The WCLP committee is also receiving letters of support for the river walk project from individuals and Waipu community groups.

Room 10 children at Waipu Primary School have written letters saying they think the river walk is "an extremely super cool idea" because they would be able to spend time there "with family and friends". They also provided some innovative thinking such as: an obstacle course for fitness and fun, a jetty to fish from, some seats to sit and watch the water, a glass bottomed boat to watch fish in, games marked on the ground, paddle boards and pedal boats, a waka and a sailing boat, artwork by local people and somewhere along the route – an ice-cream cart.

The next meeting of the WCLPC will be held in the Waipu Presbyterian Church Hall on Thursday 27 August at 7.30pm. Anyone interested is welcome to come along.
