Economist finds major flaws in economic assessment for Bream Bay sandmining proposal

A prominent economist has highlighted significant flaws in an economic assessment provided by Market Economics Limited (MEL) for McCallum Brothers Ltd.'s (MBL) proposal to extract up to nine million cubic metres of sand from the seabed of Bream Bay over 35 years.

Hayden Green, an economist with over 20 years of professional experience, has lived in Waipu for the past decade. Although he had not initially followed the sand mining debate, recent protest coverage prompted him to review the MEL assessment on MBL's website. The MEL report assumes that the only alternative to extracting sand from Bream Bay is to take marine sand from Kaipara Harbour, and that Bream Bay sand is cheaper to transport and involves lower carbon emissions. However, Mr Green argues that these claims are unsubstantiated or demonstrably false, with no evidence provided to support the cost or environmental benefits.

He points out that viable alternatives, such as landbased sand mining and manufactured sand, could meet Auckland's demand without relying on Bream Bay resources. For example, Kaipara Limited's Brookby Quarry in East Auckland already produces 300,000 tonnes of manufactured sand annually and plans to expand to 500,000 tonnes—well above the 380,000

Last November ithey were able to purchased two waka with funding from Te Huinga - a collective of hapu within the Whangārei District Council which received a portion of a \$9.48 million Government grant to the Whangarei District Council in 2023.

Hollie Kereopa, the club's chairwoman explained kauika is the word for a pod of dolphins or whales moving together in unity.

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EDITORIAL

We are fortunate to have so many people who work hard to keep our diverse local sports clubs running smoothly

Yesterday morning I went to the public launch and open day of Te Kauika o Patuharakeke Waka Ama, a new club and a new sport for people to enjoy. There were lots of people there. Hollie Kereopa, the club's chairwoman, told me at 11am she had counted 100 people at the event by 11am and the open day continued until 2pm. Everyone, children and adults alike were happy and excited. I was surprised how beautiful and clear the water is in the bay between the former refinery and the port as I waded out to take photographs of the waka and their crews. There were families seated on the sand in the shade of gazebos and first time paddlers standing in a circle having a lesson in paddling technique. It was a beautiful scene. Hollie tells me Kauika is the word for a pod of whales or dolphins moving together in unity, so an appropriate name for what this new club has the potential to become. I believe exercise and sport offer solutions to many individual and social problems. People make friendships and build connections by joining sports clubs. We have a wonderful array of sports clubs in Bream Bay that cater for all kinds of interests

and abilities. There is no reason for anyone living here to be isolated and lonely. Exercise helps with mental resilience. I am a bit under the pump at present getting the Bream Bay News ready for the printer while helping to get those sports award nominations sorted. Geoff, who is a great example of the healing power of exercise helps me with the technical stuff on the Bream Bay News but is away for several weeks on the Sounds to Sounds cycle ride so I have to sort out any computer tangles that arise myself. When you have deadlines to meet these can be very stressful. I have cattle to move, lawns to mow and gardens to water.

There is a lot to fit into the day but this morning I took time out to go for an hourlong bicycle ride. It really helped. It's so good to be out enjoying the scenery and feeling strong as I push up the hills and then fly down the other side with the wind at my back. I have promised myself that no matter how frantic my life gets - no matter how many computer tangles I have to unravel; I will make time to get some exercise.

tonnes MBL intends to extract from Bream Bay. Kayasand operates a similar plant in Waikato. Mr Green also critiques the MEL report for being opaque, non-replicable, and riddled with errors and omissions. He highlights the lack of methodology behind the claimed transport cost savings and dismisses the alleged emissions savings as unfounded, due to the companies, having advised one of the world's largest, operation of the Emissions Trading Scheme, which the report ignores.

Additionally, Mr Green criticises the report for overlooking the environmental consequences of the proposed sand extraction, including seabed degradation, harm to marine life, and disruption to local fisheries. Potential impacts on tourism and coastal protection are also neglected.

Even if the MEL analysis were accepted, Mr Green ar-

gues, any cost savings would likely benefit McCallum Brothers Ltd. rather than Aucklanders or Northlanders. "It is doubtful that this represents the type of economic benefit Parliament intended when enacting the Fast Track legislation," he stated.

While Mr Green holds no personal bias against mining he asserts that consents should only be granted when the benefits clearly outweigh the negative impacts.

"However consents should only be granted when benefits clearly outweigh the adverse impacts."

The MEL report fails to establish this for the McCallum Brothers Ltd. proposal."


There are seven nominations for best Coach over

If you want a roundabout have a few more crashes

My suggestion to the Whangārei District Council that a roundabout should be built at Nova Scotia Drive, Cove Road, South Road and The Centre has been turned down. The cost for a roundabout there would be up to \$1,500,000 !

When I questioned the cost and why could it not be a small drive-over roundabout, I was informed that NZTA had not approved the funding for a large roundabout. The explanation included this comment: "Given the use of this intersection: the roundabout will need to ensure each type of vehicle (eg milk tanker) can perform the manoeuvre. With a high volume strategic road that is the official SH1 detour route, the intersection controls need to be a formal roundabout, not a drive-over (fried-egg style) intended for residential streets only.

It seems that should The Brynderwyns get blocked again that Cove Road to Mangawhai will either become SH1 or NZTA has provided the wrong reason for denying our having a roundabout at this intersection.

It was also noted that:"Council will continue to monitor the need for intersection improvements based on growth and crash data."

So if you want a roundabout at that intersection you need to have a few more crashes ?

This follows the decision by NZTA not to build the approved roundabout at the intersection of Nova Scotia Drive and SH1. The land to build the roundabout has apparently been acquired, but the Government decision to, sometime in the next five years, build a four-lane highway has caused this delay. Some sort of double middle lane road markings will supposedly suffice. Meanwhile as traffic builds at that intersection cars trying to cross or get onto SH1 are likely to have increasing-ly longer wait times for a number of years. One would have thought that building the roundabout there once the four-lane route has been confirmed could have been a good first step. We hope that crash data at this intersection does not mean people will come to regret this decision.

Feedback invited on revised ownership of Marsden Maritime Holdings and ownership of Northport

There is a proposal on the table to reset the ownership of Marsden Maritime Holdings and, along with this, the ownership of Northport.

Under the planned new arrangement Marsden Maritime Holdings would be jointly owned by the Northland Regional Council -43%, Ports of Tauranga -50% and the Ngapuhi investment company Tupu Tonu would hold a 7% shareholding.

The NRC currently owns 53% of MMH so would be selling 10% of its holding, while Ports of Auckland, which currently holds 19%, would pull out completely.

Individual shareholders, who currently own 24% of the company would be bought out by the new entity. As the offering is \$5.60 per share against the current valuation of \$3.39 there are unlikely to be many objections to this. MMH would own Northport outright along with the industrial and farmland adjacent to the port, Marsden Cove Marina with it 236 berths, the commercial area alongside the marina, the boatyard facility and the Kiteotara Business and Commercial Centre.

Tupu Tonu is a crown owned company with responsibility for acquiring and growing assets that will eventually be offered to Ngāpuhi as part of a Treaty settlement. Tupu Tonu was established to manage a \$150 million investment fund approved by Cabinet in 2020, designed to provide more options for Ngāpuhi in future negotiations and ensure they would not miss out on opportunities for investment while they worked towards a settlement. Former Whangārei District Councillor Neil McLeod has concerns that the Northland Regional Council will be losing its controlling majority share holding in a major piece of Northland's infrastructure: the port. He also points out that the NRC stands to lose around \$400,000 a year in dividends. Feedback on the proposal is open until 28 March - for more information go to www.nrc.govt.nz/MMHproposal


A petition carrying the signatures of 14,000 people opposing the McCallum Brothers Ltd. sand mining application in Bream Bay was handed over on the steps of Parliament on Thursday March 5th.

Ex Rugby League star Tarwera Nikau (co-chair of Endangered Species foundation who the hosted the petition handed it to Green MP Huhana Lyndon.

Huhana gave a strong statement to the house stating it was a travesty that McCallum Brothers could be allowed to expand operations into Bream Bay when land based options existed well able to meet the needs of the Auckland construction industry.

A full contingent of Green MPs including the party's co- leader Chloe Swarbrick came out to meet the Northland delegation.

A boat protest in the bay is planned for this Sunday 16 March at the proposed sand extraction zone. from 12noon to 1pm. Participants are invited to make lots of noise with horns, instruments and voicessinging protest songs, to wave signs and banners and to take photos and videos.

Semi conscious driver at wheel of car parked in the middle of the road

At 5am on 3 March Police were called out to a vehicle, which was parked in the middle of Salle Rd. They found a man inside in a semi conscious state with the appearance of being under the influence of drugs. He was asked to accompany Police to the station for a blood test but he refused. The 43-year-old Auckland man was then arrested and charged with refusing to follow a Police order. He may face further charges when the results of his blood test are known

Wire rope prevents possible head on crash

On Saturday 8 March at 11am a distracted driver drove her vehicle into the wire rope on State Highway One just south of the Port Marsden Highway. She was prevented from driving into oncoming traffic by the rope and although her vehicle was extensively damaged she was unhurt.

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

Stingray have no teeth but very dangerous tails Des Thomas is lucky to have survived a stingray barb embedded deep in his wrist

Des Thomas is lucky to be alive after an incident on Ruakākā beach on the morning of Thursday 20 February,

At around 10am he had just pulled in his torpedo fishing line and was inspecting the catch. On his line was a stingray as had happened at least 30 times previously.

Des said, "He was just a little fella about 600cm across the flippers." He couldn't find his gaffe, so knowing stingray have no teeth, he put his fingers in its mouth to take out the hook. But the creature lashed out with its tail and a poisonous barb dug deep into Des's wrist.

Des, who takes blood-thinning medication for a heart condition had begun to bleed profusely. He took off his shirt to wrap up the wound but this was soon soaked in blood.

The beach was pretty deserted that morning. Des had ridden down to his fishing spot on his quad bike and was around 1.5 kilometres south of the Ruak $\bar{a}k\bar{a}$ Surf Club, a pretty empty stretch of beach at the best of times. Gary, a neighbour, had walked past earlier o but it would be some time before he returned.

About 100 metres away a couple were seated on the sand.

The couple, who turned out to be American tourists, came over to see what they could do. The woman took a bungee cord from Des's quad bike and used it as a tourniquet.

Des said, "If those people hadn't been on the beach it could have been all over."

Gary returned from his walk and ran to the surf club to get help but there was no one there.

Some one – Des isn't sure who - rang 111 and a St John paramedic came to the beach but was not able to get the ambulance down the four wheel drive vehicle entrance just south of the Surf Club and started to walk down the beach carrying the equipment he needed. "Some one took my bike down to pick him up," said Des

The stingray barb had injected venom into his arm and the pain was excruciating

There was blood everywhere. The barb had cut through an artery and tendons. To make matters worse the tide was coming in.

The paramedic called for back up and a four-wheel drive ambulance came down onto the beach to pick Des up.

With blood still pumping out of his wrist Des was transported to Whangārei Hospital. He had to be moved onto three different beds as his blood soaked the sheets. Someone commented it looked like a

murder had been committed. He was later told that all that bleeding had helped to get the stingray venom out of his body.

The doctor on duty at Accident and Emergency had a look at the wound and wondered if Des would need to be helicoptered to Auckland. However, he got to work stitching it up.

Des said, "He put in one stitch and then a helicopter arrived and he had to go and attend to the patient who had just arrived. This happened two or three times."

Des said all the medical staff at the hospital are "bloody good" but they are overworked and "you have to be patient."

At 7pm Des was sent back home with his wife Christine. However, he has had to return three times to the hospital with concerns over his wounded wrist. His arm turned black as he bled internally.

Two weeks after the incident Des is at home in Ruakākā and says the wound is now healing nicely. There remains a deep gouge in his wrist.

He would like to return to the golf course but is worried the action of swinging a club might open up the injury. He misses the beach.

He has managed to track down the home address of the American tourist couple and he will be sending them a very sincere thank you letter.

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Des Thomas is lucky to be alive after a stingray he was attenpting to unhook from his torpedo line lashed out with its tail and sunk a poisonous barb deep iinto his wrist.

When the Waipu District High School was established in 1939 the four house names were adopted as a way of maintaining the link to the Scottish Highlands. Then in 1972, when Bream Bay College was established in Ruakākā this tradition transferred across.

Coastal Scientist Jim Dahm warns sea level rise likely to result in more permanent erosion to our coast

Engineered solutions to coastal erosion, while they might protect the properties behind lead to the degradation of the beach in front was one of the messages coastal scientist Jim Dahm had for his Bream Bay audiences at two addresses he gave at the Ruakākā Recreation Centre on Monday 3 March and then at the Waipu Celtic Barn on Tuesday 4 March.

He said the traditional way of looking at this was to "hold the line" and build hard sea walls but people have come to realize that beaches themselves have value and also need to be retained

By restoring the dunes, taking out weeds and planting or allowing dune species to grow erosion shorelines can be protected.

Where the dune is very narrow he said "Push Ups" could be used, where sand is pushed up from the beach to expand the dune then planted with spinifex and pingao to hold it in place.

The lectures were organised by the Northland Regional Council to mark Sea Week, officially from 1 -9 March.

Mr. Dahm is an applied coastal scientist with a Masters degree in Earth Sciences. He helped form New Zealand's first Coastcare groups.

He described how there are two types of erosion "permanent" and "temporary", with most of what we experience on our east coast beaches in the temporary category.

He said this could sometimes be very dramatic with dunes swept away to leave steep cliffs but if the right type of vegetation is in place the dune will gradually repair.

"This is not as rapid as the erosion and people don't tend to notice it so much" but over time the sand will wash in again and long tendrils of spinifex and pingao will spread out to hold it in place.

When the sea level rises however this could change and more permanent coastal erosion is likely. With every metre of sea level rise it is predicated there will be 20 - 30 metres of permanent erosion.

He said east coast sand washed up the coast from Taranaki around 7500 years ago. It is a finite resource with no new sand coming into the system

Asked about what the effects of removing 9 million cubic metres of sand from Bream Bay Mr. Dahm commented this is "an awful lot of sand" but declined to comment on the McCallum Brothers Ltd. sand mining proposal as he did not have enough information about it.

No public consultation on NRC annual plan

The Northland Regional Council will not be consulting on its annual plan this year. Northland Regional NRC Chairman Geoff Crawford said, the NRC's Long Term Plan set last year was widely consulted on and the annual plan "is not expected to contain any significant changes."

He said, "We think it's better for our ratepayers to save the expense of re-consulting"

The NRC is still required to develop an Annual Plan for 2025/26 and to set its rate for the year. Mr. Crawford said his Council "is are working hard" to reduce the predicted 2025/2026 rate rise of 5.79 %

The NRC will still be seeking feedback on its Draft User Fees and Charges for 2025/26,

which it reviews each year. In addition to a baseline 3.1% inflationary increase, the NRC is proposing to increase changes to three specific fees - for oil spill contingency plans, the initial charge for extension of consent period, and the purchase of hard copies of its proposed regional plan which is available at no charge on the NRC website. The NRC's Draft User Fees and Charges 2025/26 document is available at www.nrc.govt.nz/userfees .

Last weekend, New Zealand's biggest junior lifesaving carnival, the "Oceans Festival of Junior Surf Lifesaving" celebrated its 25th anniversary. Held at Mount Maunganui Beach, the four day event drew 726 athletes from 49 clubs nationwide, from the most northern representative, Ruakaka Surf Lifesaving club, to the southernmost, Kaka Point from Dunedin. The competition brought together talented 10-14 year-olds, all vying for top honours in a series of intense events, including board races, surf swims, beach flags and relays. In such a prestigious national level setting, standing out among the best can be a daunting task, but one young Bream Bay athlete rose to the occasion, demonstrating skill, perseverance and sportsmanship.

Tia de Jong, representing Ruakākā Surf Lifesaving Club in the U11 female division, made an incredible impression. The first day of competition had strong waves create challenging conditions for the competitors. Tia secured a gold medal in a remarkable performance in her "run swim run" event.

Day 3 witnessed tight racing in the surf race, where Tia earned a silver medal in a fiercely contested field. On the final day, athletes faced the Diamond Finals – a gruelling event that combines both a swim, board and running race. This tested not only the swimmers endurance but their ability to navigate through waves and currents around the courses buoys. Tia secured a bronze medal in a nail biting finish that had the spectators on the edge of their seats. This impressive haul of three medals – a gold, a silver and a bronze was a testament to Tia's skill and determination in the face of tough competition.

The true spirit of the Oceans Festival lies however,

in the camaraderie that thrives among the clubs. The event was not just about winning medals but about fostering new friendships, exchanging experiences, and creating lasting memories for all involved.


Graham said they were married young - he first met Judy when he was just 15 years old, and many predicted their marriage wouldn't last.
