

# It must be Ruakākā's turn for that \$100,000 Community Led Fund offer from the Council

It must be Ruakākā's turn soon to get that \$100,000 Community Led Fund offer from the Whangarei District Council. I am wondering what project the people of Ruakākā might pick.

In its Long Term Plan the Council has set aside funds to offer its various communities a grant for a project chosen by thier members. .

I have been a member of the Waipū Community Led Project team from the outset and it has been quite a process. I was a bit impatient at first about the extensive public consultation procedures we went through before choosing what had seemed to me to be obviously the best idea, right from the start. But there are some very smart people in this group and I have learned a lot

Community consultation can sometimes just be quite cynical but this group led by two of its younger members is setting the standard for inclusiveness and transparency. One of the aims of Community Led Projects is to unite diverse members of each community in a common purpose. The Waipū River Walk project has done this. We are a united team.

Its easy to see how in the wrong hands such a scheme could get way off track but along with the \$100,000 comes a Council employed Community Development Advisor. Jacki Cooper who works with the Waipū group has been great, standing back from the selection process but present at every meeting to offer support and advice. I was impressed when she turned up on a Saturday morning to join a walk around the proposed trail.

Running such a project in Ruakākā might be a bit more challenging. First you would need to establish the boundaries. Is Takahiwai part of Ruakākā or is this a community in itself? Perhaps the separate settlements of Ruakākā should each have their own Community Led Projects. The people in Ruakākā Village, for example, might come up with a good way to spend \$100,000— perhaps establish a big community orchard and garden. On the other hand, a project that would unite Ruakākā's diverse settlements might be the best plan. To achieve this the selection process would need to be a careful one.

I had occasion to call into the Bream Bay College swimming pool enclosure at the end of the last school term of 2020 and thought it was looking a bit shabby. I believe this pool was built as a community project around 50 years ago. Ann Hines was a member of the swimming pool committee of that time and she remembers holding bottle drives and book sales to raise the funds. Ann is adamant that this pool should belong to the whole community. I am wondering if an upgrade, perhaps with some solar heating so it can be used for more months of the year might, be a good Ruakākā unifying project.

The pool is already used for training by the Bream Bay Swimming Club, so to this extent, does continue to have a community function. However, this use could be broadened. Negotiation with the Bream Bay College Board of Trustees would be necessary from the outset to get an agreement that once the work is complete the pool can be used outside of school hours by groups such as the Over 60s Club, aqua aerobics classes, preschoolers with their parents etc. Maybe people interested in fitness training might want to claim a few set hours each week to swim lengths. Just an idea to throw into the mix. I am sure the people of Ruakākā will come up with many more. Time to put your thinking caps on.

# Campground managers report busiest summer ever

Ann - Marie Abel manager of the Ruakākā Beach holiday Park said in the fourteen years she has managed the park, this summer is the busiest and she and her staff have had to turn more people away than ever before.

The campground, the biggest in Bream Bay, has 350 camping sites and nine cabins and has been fully booked every night since Boxing Day.

"We usually have one or two spaces available when people turn up but this year there is nothing. We had a call from Camp Waipū Cove to see if we could take their overflow but we are just completely full. We have to tell people to go to Whangarei and try to find somewhere to stay up there.

Ann-Marie said despite the crowds the camp has been peaceful.

"It's lovely really. We were a bit concerned about the lack of overseas visitors who usually arrive towards the end of summer when the local holidaymakers have gone back to work. If it carries on like this for a bit longer, we will be fine."

Anton Trist, manager at Camp Waipū has a similar story to tell. This camp with its 250 camp sites and 9 cabins is fully booked for the whole of January.

Anton said the camp is looking forward to a busier than normal shoulder period through February, March and April.

"With schools going back slightly later this year and Auckland anniversary weekend on 1 February, it is extending our busy period out a little bit."

Anton said it is "great to see a resurgence in camping and seeing so many happy families enjoying our piece of paradise!"

The Uretiti Department of Conservation camp has been at or over capacity since New Year's Day. The camp can officially hold 1,000 people but a glitch on the Department of Conservation booking website meant that more campers turned up on the night of 1 January and the camp managers found room for them.

# Record numbers of swimmers and sandcastles at Waipū beach day

A fine calm morning brought a record number of swimmers down to the beach early on Sunday morning 3 January to dive into the ocean for Waipu Surf Life Saving Club's annual Lang's Beach to Waipu Cove swim. Last year 50 swimmers swam the 3km course, this year numbers were up to 77.

Life member Ian Godfrey says the increase posed a few issues for the club to ensure they kept swimmers safe. "It takes a bit of effort by us, counting them in and out of the water and have enough people out there watching them."

The first swimmer across the line was David Martin in 41.02 minutes while the final swimmer reached the finish line in just under two hours.

Godfrey says the increase in numbers at Waipu's annual Club Day could be due to the event becoming more widely known. "We could probably throw Covid in as well, there are more people around."

The 10km pub to club run also proved popular with 52 runners and 28 walkers competing. Godfrey said several runners entered that morning on the spur of the moment and once at the club, needed to ask around for a ride back to the Waipu Pub to collect their cars.

Club captain Kath Manning says it was an awesome day and she was impressed by the turnout. "It just seems to get bigger and bigger each year," she says. "The Big Dig was huge, I don't know if we've ever had one quite as big." Most children managed to find an iceblock stick to exchange for a prize, with just three children missing out and needing a consolation prize.

The fun beach events also proved popular, with a record number of sandcastles. Hungry hippos, dolphins, turtles, cars and octopuses jostled for position on the sand. In the tug of war, the kids team beat the adults and the girls won against the boys. Manning says the egg throw was particularly hilarious. "We used free range eggs and they had really hard shells, so people were hurling them from a huge distance – eventually they got smashed and quite a few people were egged."

At 7pm just as surf club members were packing up after their huge day, an emergency call came in for a kayaker in distress near Uretiti. A crew raced to launch the IRB to stage a rescue but within five minutes a call came in to say the kayaker was out of danger and the rescue was called off.

#### In support of Maori wards

Under the Local Government Act of 2001 Councils are required to facilitate Maori participation in local authority decision-making, and legislation allows for the formation of Maori wards as a means of doing this. So contrary to the opinions of previous correspondents, the formation of Maori wards is indeed within the scope of Council's concerns and responsibilities. I don't know if the formation of Maori wards is the best way to foster greater Maori representation. However I do know that the current system is not doing well. Maori are routinely under-represented in local government all over the country, and markedly so in Northland. The "exceptional individual" argument is routinely rolled out to justify the status quo, but as with women and Board rooms, it would be better if people of equal mediocrity can get elected, and even better if the system supported people with different values and perspectives to come together for the good

of all. Maori wards have been a feature of national politics for 150 years and I don't see that they have destroyed our democracy. Rather they have contributed to more representative governance of our country. Who knows what local governance will look like in 50 years? Perhaps they won't work and we will try something else. What I do know is that if we don't try something different nothing will change.

Seven territorial authorities have voted to establish Maori wards ahead of the 2022 election, three of these being our own Whangarei and Kaipara District Councils and the Northern Regional Council. Six authorities have previously voted in favour of Maori wards. It looks like an idea for its time, so why are there so few? Unfortunately the bar for effective resistance is very low, and the resistance is well organised. With

# The many uses of seaweed

There were a few gasps around the Waipū Cove Surf Lifesaving Club when Scientist Dr. Serean Adams of the Cawthorn institute of Nelson said the institute was attempting to find out how to grow feathery red seaweed, which has been shown to reduce methane emissions when fed to cattle.

For the past ten years or so large amounts of smelly seaweed, usually red in colour has been washing up which from time to time washes up on the beach at Waipū Cove

The red seaweed asparagopsis, in particular, has been shown to lower methane emissions from burping when fed to cattle, sheep or deer and could be a helpful took in reducing carbon emissions from dairy and beef farms. The challenge though is to grow it in sufficient quantities so it could be harvested profitably.

Dr. Adams said she had searched unsuccessfully for a plant form of the seaweed in the Marlborough Sounds but had then found some on the beach during her annual holiday at Waipū Cove.

Dr. Adams was invited by Northland Regional Councillor Rick Stolwerk to give a talk in the Waipū Cove Surf Lifesaving Club on the last day of her holiday

She talked about some of the uses for seaweed and current research being put into the compounds it contains and the uses it can be put to.

There are over 800 known varieties in New Zealand

waters and a potential to develop a range of prod-

It is used for fertilizer and for horticulture pest solutions. A seaweed solution has been found to be helpful in controlling the disease PSA in kiwifruit.

Seaweed is a nutritious food. Dr. Adams She showed a satellite picture of seaweed farms in South

Korea and wondered if this kind of development would be tolerated around New Zealand.

Seaweed can be used to suppress waves and it works to remove nitrogen from the sea. Seaweed farming can work in conjunction with mussel farming with the seaweed cleaning up the water around the racks of mussels. The Crown research institute Scion is investigating how cellulose from seaweed can be used to replace plastics.

None of this solves the Waipū Cove problem though. Dr. Adams seed excess nutrients in the water were a likely cause but said the source of these would need to be identified before preventative action could be taken.

# Public meeting on Ruakākā satellite station


Staff from Great South, the company looking at building a satellite ground station in Sandford Rd., Ruakākā, will hold a public meeting with staff present to answer questions at the Bream Bay Community Trust, 9 Takutai Place on Tuesday 19 January at 7pm. Great South is Southland's development agency, akin to the Northland Regional Council agency Northland Inc. Great South Space Operations already has satellite communications ground stations located between Invercargill and Bluff and works with small satellite launching companies such as New Zealand's own Rocket Lab to provide ground communication services. A satellite belonging to the University of Auckland was sent into space aboard a Rocket Lab spacecraft in November. The satellite has a probe on board which is now communicating with Great South's Awarua station sending back information helpful in predicting where earthquakes might occur. In a flier sent to Sandford Rd. residents the company explained its desire to establish a station in Northland saying that this would maximize its opportunity to harvest data from satellites as they pass overhead.

The residents were sent an artists impression of what the station would look like showing a pattern of dome like structures spaced interspersed with satellite discs, around the edge of several paddocks.

People living near the site have concerns about the proposed station's effects on the outlook from their homes and a possible drop in their property values because of perceived adverse health effects from the station. A public meeting on the issue was held in December resulting in Ruakākā Primary withdrawing a letter of support it had provided to Great South.

Chantelle Subritsky, who is Strategic Project Advisor for Great South, gave assurances that the station would not pose any health risks.

She said the site had not yet been purchased, as investigations into its suitability were ongoing. In its favour the Sandford Rd. site is flat land close to the Ruakākā towncentre and close to Whangarei where there is likely to be a pool of people with the skills needed to maintain and operate the station. The willingness of local people to have the station established in their location would be another factor to consider.

just 5% of local residents' signatures anyone can force a public referendum, and such referenda are likely to be successful simply because there are more Pakeha than Maori. No other ward can be subject to a referendum and decided in this way. Frank Newman (17/12/20) thinks a popular vote "gives voice to those who would otherwise remain silent and returns power to the people". What he really means is "Pakeha people", and it must be noted that given the inequality of representation Pakeha people are hardly a silent voice. I hope we can support our Councils' decisions to form Maori wards. I hope we can look to the needs of our young Maori people and promote a system of representation they can identify with. I hope we can recognise the need for more diverse understandings of, and solutions to, the issues our communities face. I hope we can stop talking about divisiveness, and instead talk about reconciliation and moving forward together. A greater say for Maori in local governance will not cure all ills, but it would be one good step forward. Contrary to previous correspondents I am happy to say that I trusted Ken Couper with my vote for precisely this kind of issue. This is exactly what I want my elected representative to do - make thoughtful, nuanced, progressive decisions that recognise that the electoral playing field is not level, and seek to promote the well-being of all members of our community.





# The dedicated guardians of the Ruakākā shorebird nesting site

Tuesday 6 January was a hot cloudless morning. There's a row of around 20 surf kayaks lined up on the wet sand and nearby a big circle of around 30 youngsters from the Bethells Beach and Mangawhai surf lifesaving clubs running through some training drills. The beach is packed.

Down at the estuary members of the Bream Bay Coastal Care Trust and The Northern Branch of the Royal Forest and Bird Protection Society are keeping vigil.

They have fenced off the shorebird nesting areas on the sandspit and in the dunes directly south of the estuary where dotterel and oystercatcher chicks scuttle around while the parent birds keep watch calling anxiously when their little ones stray to far away. This year there is a bumper crop of babies – 12 dotterel and seven oystercatcher chicks, with several more nests with eggs still to hatch. With so many people on the beach the chicks' survival through to fledging is full of hazards.

Bev Woods of the Forest and Bird Protections Society said, "We can keep guard all day but it's what happens after we leave that we worry about." Yesterday she had to explain to the Bethells Beach contingent why they could not haul their kayaks up onto the sandspit. Bev pointed out all the little chicks and when they understood the situation the young surf lifesavers and their instructors agreed to exercise further up the beach.

This morning there is a vehicle left just above the tide line. Water covers the floor and there is a pile of vaping paraphernalia on the front seat. Lu Cummings of Bream Bay Coastal Care gets on the phone to the Northland Regional Council's environmental hot line. She also tries the Police and the Department of Conservation – anyone she can think off to get that vehicle off the beach before the tide comes in again at it begins leaking toxins into the sea.

Two young men belatedly arrive with a replacement battery. It doesn't make much difference though as the car's electrics have been dunked in salt water. It's not a good morning for those two young men. In addition to the likely write off of their vehicle, possible sanctions and a fine from the Whangarei District Council for driving into a vehicle free zone and the cost of having the vehicle towed off the beach, they are facing the sharp end of Lu's tongue.

"This is a wildlife refuge. You are breaking the law driving here. There are little chicks running around. You could run them over. Didn't you see the signs?"

One young man replies he is sorry. He didn't see any signs and he is doing his best to move his vehicle off the beach. They carry on tinkering hopelessly with their car. A cloud of vapour envelops them – perhaps this helps to get through a stressful situation.

There is a pile of charred wood still smoldering in the sand and empty alcohol bottles strewn around nearby. Wooden posts are missing from the bird protection fencing. Lu recognizes an end of one post in the remains of the fire.

Sue Jolly (Bream Bay Coastal Care) has an armful of warratahs to replace the missing posts. Posts

being pulled out and burned on beach fires is a regular occurrence so she comes prepared.

Bev heads off a couple out for a morning walk who are trekking onto the sandspit. They don't seem to notice the distress of the oystercatcher parents.

There is a fence preventing walkers going up into the dunes, leaving a narrow walking strip around the estuary. Without people regularly treading it down the dune vegetation: grey-green spinifex and golden pingaoa is looking healthy. With the deep cool waters of the estuary alongside it's a glorious place. But don't linger there too long.

Lu points out how the chicks run down to the waters edge for a drink. Sea birds have built in desalination systems and can handle drinking salt water. They also forage for food at the water's edge. Lu asks people who look like they are settling in at the estuary edge—"How would you like to go all day without eating or drinking?" She points out one family of dotterel.

"Those chicks are just like kids. There are three of them and one is the naughty one. The mother calls and two go running but this one stays down by the water. The mother sits up there in the spinifex and calls and calls and finally he runs back up there." "That poor oyster catcher up there on the edge of the dune is a grief stricken", says Sue. "She has lost two sets of eggs, one got covered by sand in a

If oystercatcher eggs are left exposed to the sun for just a few minutes the chick inside overheats and dies – another reason people need to keep their distance.

storm and the second just didn't hatch."

Lu thinks some of the additional breeding pairs of dotterel at the Ruakākā estuary this year might be from the Marsden Point Refinery's success in protecting the nesting site adjacent to the refinery complex.

Last year only two oystercatcher and one dotterel chick survived at Ruakākā. This season's chicks still have a while to go before their wings are

strong enough to carry they away from danger.

"One dog through here at night and that could be the end", said Sue.

Still, fingers crossed, this will be a good shorebird summer.

I asked Robbie Jones of Forest and Bird why; so far at least, this is shaping up as a successful season.

Robbie said she thinks that the Coastal Care volunteers have learned over the years where the protective fencing for the nesting areas needs to be. The long hours put in by the volunteers is also making a difference. Another factor Robbie says is "good bird parents."

She has watched oystercatcher dive bombing on intruders and dotterel parents chase away gulls much bigger than themselves. It's tragic when through some thoughtless human action all their efforts are in vain.

# Tomatoes for the neigbourhood

People living at the southern end of Peter Snell Rd. in the Ruakākā Village are being well supplied with tomatoes this summer thanks to the efforts of 82-year- old Don Rollo.

Don has planted more than 80 tomato plants around the house he shares with his stepdaughter and her family. Tomato plants heavy with fruit at various stages of ripeness run the full length of the fence on the northern boundary of his property which is adjacent to a pedestrian right of way. In fact his neighbours have named the walkway "Tomato Alley" and Don doesn't mind if they pick a few to nibble on

There are many varieties to choose fromincluding acid free, cherry, a black tomato and heirloom types. Don likes to mix them up.

He grew many of them from seed or by striking cuttings but was also given plants by the Bream Bay Community Trust and others who learned about his tomatogrowing mission.

All these tomatoes take some watering. In order not to waste water Don collects rainfall from the roof of his house in a barrel and carries it in buckets. The section is very sandy so it has taken a lot of effort to build up some good growing topsoil. As well as supplying his family Don hands tomatoes out to his neighbours.

He is also growing watermelons, courgettes, cucumber, strawberries and pumpkins and has a collection of fruit trees. His aim is to have fresh fruit of one kind or another available to pick all year around. He is currently watching some big bunches of grapes turn black. The bunches are protected from birds by netting and Don is hoping they will be ripe by the time school starts up again, so his grandchildren can take a bunch each in their lunchboxes.






