More Police road checkpoints in lead up to Christmas

Officer in Charge at the Bream Bay Police Station, Senior Sergeant Simon Craig said it has been disappointing to find so many drunk drivers at Police road checkpoint over recent weeks and promises Bream Bay Police assisted by Whangārei staff would be increasing the frequency of checkpoints in the lead up Christmas and New Year.

- On 3 December at 7.30pm a vehicle was stopped on Cove Rd., Waipu. The driver, a 29-year-old Langs Beach man, returned a breath alcohol reading of 683 micrograms of alcohol per litre of breath. He will appear in the Whangārei District Court on 21 December on a drink driving charge.
- Later that evening at 10pm at the same Cove Rd. checkpoint a 58-year-old Mangawhai man returned a reading of 516 micrograms of alcohol per litre of breath. He will appear in the Whangārei District Court on 21 December to face a drink driving charge.
- On 1 December at 8.15pm Police stopped a vehicle on Port Marsden Highway at Ruakaka. The driver returned a breath alcohol reading of 694 micrograms and refused to accompany Police and was arrested. A 56-year-old Whangarei man will be appearing in the Whangārei District Court on drunk driving and resisting arrest charges.
- Two more drivers were issued with infringement notices after returning breath to alcohol readings over the 250mc limit.
- "We want to get everyone home safely for Christmas. That's the plan anyway "said Senior Sergean Craig.

I had seen them running around in my garden yesterday. They were happily digging up some vegetable peelings I had buried. I set a trap with some fresh peanut butter as bait near all this action and about half an hour later there was a big brown rat, likely their mother, squished inside it. I wondered how I would catch those little ones as they were too small to activate the trap spring but they solved that problem for me

I am pleased with myself for facing and dealing with this rodent invasion. Like many people I have this irrational horror of mice and rats. Northpine has serious concerns about proposed South Rd. housing development

Bruce Larsen, Managing Director of the Northpine Timber Mill in Waipu has some serious concerns about the impact a proposed 56 lot residential development in South Rd. will have on the mill.

Mr. Larsen said he has no issues with the developer who is "just doing what he is allowed to do" but he thinks it short sighted of the Whangārei District Council to have allowed for the land adjacent to Northpine to change its zone designation to residential in the district plan without considering the implications this will have on the mill's operation.

Northpine has 70 employees and is a major sponsor of many Bream Bay sports clubs and community initiatives.

Developer Nigel Williams said he is aware of the importance of Northpine in Waipu and has been talking with Mr. Larsen about what can be done to mitigate the effects of the mill's operation on the new housing development. He has offered to build a fence on the subdivision boundary but there is some disagreement on how high this should be. Northpine favours a three metre high fence but this would cast a big shadow and is likely to reduce the number of saleable house lots in the development.

Northpine would have liked a no complaints covernant on the residential properties closest to the mill. Such covernants are in place alongside many Fonterra factories but Mr. Williams said he did not think this is warranted as if Northpine operates within the noise, dust and odour limits of its consents there should be no problems. Northpine is required to operate under a noise level of 55 decibels at its boundary. but Mr. Larsen, who lives in Cove Rd., alongside the mill said, 55db is still quite loud and it is likely there will be complaints to the Northland Regional Council, which will make it difficult for Northpine to renew its consents.

Asked why Northpine's concerns were not taken into consideration when the plan change was made, Whangārei District Council's Senior Communications Manager Ann Midson said, "Changes to zoning in Waipu village were made through the Rural Plan Change package, which was finalized and became operative in 2019. Northpine's zoning submissions in relation to land adjoining the timber mill site were considered in the submissions analysis and then by the independent hearing panel, with full discussion and reasoning provided in the publicly released reports as part of the plan change. Northpine's submission was limited to zoning and did not request changes to specific rules in relation to noise and amenity on the boundary of the industrial zone."

Northpine had requested that the land at 43 South Road retain its existing Living 3 Environment zoning (2,000m2 minimum net site area) rather than the more intensive residential (500m2 minimum net site area).

Ann Midson said the hearing panel considered the submission and the potential for reverse sensitivity effects but noted "noise, traffic and amenity effects are already managed through the mill's existing resource consents." It also found that both the former and the new residential zoning on the subject land had the same boundary setbacks and building height requirements and declined Northpine's submission. Mr. Larsen commented, "It is interesting that we are facing issues which may limit our growth or even the survival of the business when the government and the Ministry of Primary Industry are about to announce a Forestry and Wood Manufacturing Industry Transformation Plan that has as one of it's goals an increase in local timber manufacturing of 25% by 2030."


Entry is by koha and money collected will be donated to a local charity although organizer Sally Haigh said this is not about making money. "We just want people to enjoy the beauty of Christmas."

Beach Ambassadors needed for summer patrols

The call is going out once again for volunteer beach ambassadors to patrol the eight kilometres of beach between the Ruakaka and Waipu estuaries. This will be the eighth summer the Bream Bay Beach Safety Ambassador initiative has run and over that time in partnership with Ruakaka, and Waipu Surf Clubs it has helped to prevent drownings and has educated beach users in water safety.

A beach Gator utility vehicle for the patrols will be supplied this summer by Shane Rouse of Rouse Motorcycles Hikurangi .Northport and the Whangarei District Council are sponsoring the costs and GAS Bream Bay (at the Ruakaka State Highway One roundabout) is assisting with fuel costs as their business have done for the last six patol seasons.

Patrols are scheduled to begin around the 23 December and continue for a couple of months. Volunteers will receive training in the use of the Gator, in identifying dangerous sea conditions and responding to emergencies. Ambassadors are not encouraged to enter the ccean to save lives but rather to be the point of contact at the scene relaying vital information to emergency services. The key roles of the ambassadors are around prevention and education. To assist with this, they will have a supply of safety pamphlets in Chinese, English and Korean.

Constable Martin Geddes who set up the ambassador patrols after attending a drowning on Christmas day at Uretiti said, "The hands on personal approach is what makes this initiative work."

A typical patrol will start with logging on at the Ruakākā Surf Lifesaving Club, where the Gator is kept. From there patrollers drive along the beach stopping and talking to groups and individuals, handing out pamphlets and advising on beach safety and etiquette.

There will be morning shifts and afternoon shifts to cover off the daily busy periods. The duration of each patrol is approximately two hours or less.

College pool open again this summer

The swimming pool at Bream Bay College will be open to the public again this summer. Bream Bay College Principal Wayne Buckland has secured Lotteries funding to pay for lifeguards employed by the company CML which runs the Whangārei Aquatic Centre to be present d from 10am to 5pm daily over six weeks of summer. The Whangārei District Council has agreed to pay for the chemicals needed to keep the water clean and Bream Bay College will meet any additional expenses such as the upgrade of filters from its operations grant.

The pool has been water blasted and will be painted once the weather clears. Mr. Buckland said a window of four fine days is needed for this job and then the paint needs to dry for another 10 days before the pool can be filled with water.

He is hopeful it can be available for use following the Christmas statutory holidays but this is dependent on the weather. Pool users can check on the Bream Bay College website to find out if it is open or not.

Entry is by a gold coin donations and this money will be used to allay any expenses to the school

Mr. Buckland said the school operational budget needs to be safeguarded and used for the benefit of its students.

Constable Geddes said, "We are looking for a commitment of four to six shifts over the summer season. Some patrollers may be able to contribute more than that and there is some flexibility around these shifts."

You will need a current driver's licence or be willing to double up on a patrol if you do not have a licence.

Training will be for two hours at the Ruakaka Surf Club on the 18t December 2022 beginning at 3pm.

After a two year hiatus The 150th Waipu Highland Game are on

January 1 2023 will see the 150th Waipu Highland Games in the Waipu Caledonian Park.

After two years of cancellations, due mostly to Covid 19 restrictions the games are back on with a full programme of competitions and entertainment.

It all begins at 9am with a street march and grand entry of bands and clans into the Caledonian Park via the gate on The Centre alongside Hammer Hardware. The New Zealand Open Heavyweight Competition gets underway in the main arena and the solo piping and drumming competitions also begin. As well as the national competition there is a novice heavyweight event, which is open to anyone over the age of 16. Those under 18 require adult permission to take part. The novice event is restricted to the first 20 people to register at the heavyweights tent. Registration costs \$20, which will also buy you a T shirt.

At 9.30am the dancing competition begins. There are two styles of dancing: the Scottish Official Board Dancing and the New Zealand Academy of Highland and National Dancing each with its own governing board. To accommodate both at the Waipu Games there are separate competitions, with two sets of judges on separate stages.

9.30am is also the time for children to register at the marquee in the centre of the track for running races, which will be held at 10.30am.

A fiddling competition will begin in the Coronation Hall at 10am. Registrations will be taken for the Tug of War at Arena 2 and performances will begin on the Variety Stage – with music and dancing supported by Twisty Willow.

A massed pipe band performance, a highlight of the

day will be held in the main arena at 12.35 followed by a massed highland fling and a rendition of the song The Flower of Scotland.

Then the Assynt Quaich will be presented to the person who in the opinion of the Caledonian Society committee has best supported the ideals of the society in preserving the Scottish and Nova Scotian traditions and heritage of Waipu. The Quaich, an ancient Scottish form of drinking vessel, was presented to the Society at the

Waipu Sesquicentennial celebrations in January 2003 by Norman MacAskill of Assynt. Following all the above, the games are officially opened

Competitions continue from 1pm . At 1.30pm the Tug of War will be staged in Arena 2 and at 3.15pm there will be New Zealand record attempt at the Farmers Walk also in arena 2.

As competitions come to a close the evening entertainment begins from 7pm with performances by competition winners in the Celtic Barn followed by a ceilidh or Scottish Barn Dance.



Waipu Residents and Ratepayers Association seeks public comment on future of Tip Rd beach entrance

The Waipu Residents and Ratepayers Association wants to hear the opinions of local people as well as regular visitors to Bream Bay's beaches about the future of the vehicle entrance at Tip Road and whether it should remain for all to use or should be closed.

The issue arose after a question was asked at the association's October meeting about banning vehicles from all Bream Bay beaches. In response to this question, recorded in the minutes, a delegation of people who want to see the entrance kept open attended the October meeting and presented a petition signed by 150 stating "We, the undersigned, approve of the careful use of vehicles on Ruakākā-Uretiti-Waipu beaches."

Under a Whangārei District Council 'Vehicles on Beaches' bylaw vehicles are banned for short stretches of beach north and south of the Ruakākā river mouth. Apart from fishers, who have a key to a locked gate at an entrance in front of the Paradise Shores subdivision, all vehicles on the beach between the Ruakākā and Waipu estuaries are most likely to have driven through the Tip Road entrance, so closing this off would greatly reduce the number of vehicles on the beach.

Some of the petitioners agreed that motorbikes and four-wheel drive vehicles in the dunes are very destructive and that some people who drive on the beach don't act responsibly. Some even said they would be willing to help with maintaining signage with information about shorebirds and dune protection.

Bream Bay Coastal Care has long held concerns about public safety, interruption of other beach users peaceful enjoyment of the beach, threats to shorebird nesting sites and damage to the dune structure and ecosystem caused by vehicles. There are also concerns about the aggression of some four-wheel vehicle drivers and motorbike riders who don't like being told to slow down or to keep off the dunes or away from shorebird breeding sites.

WRRRA member Wendy Boyd suggested that a locked gate could be placed across the Tip Rd. entrance with keys issued to responsible fishers, similar to the system that is already in place at Ruakākā.

Another idea is that regular fishers could be granted some form of licence allowing them to access the beach by vehicle.

David Lourie suggested the landscaped area at the end of Tip Road could be extended to both the south and north with a number of new pedestrian beach entry points created reducing the need for fishers to drive along the beach to their favourite spots.

Closing off or restricting use of the Tip Road vehicle beach access is ultimately the decision of the Department of Conservation, which has the administration of the dune land through which the access is carved. The Whangarei District Council can enact its 'Vehicles on Beaches' bylaw to restrict vehicles from sections of the beach.

The Waipu Riding Residents' and Ratepayers Association invites members of the public to put forward suggestions and indicate their views and reasons for or against permitting vehicles to continue to access the beach at Tip Rd. The association's email address is: waipurrra@gmail.com

WRRRA member Richard Cole suggests it might be possible for a compromise to be made between those who are against vehicles driving on the beach and the fishers who want to continue to drive to their favourite spots? The WRRRA could then make a recommendation to both the Council and the Department of Conservation.

New toilets for sports clubs using Bream Bay College fields

The Whangarei District Council has paid \$10,000 for a portable double toilet unit to be installed in the grounds of Bream Bay College. This will be placed near the school's gymnasium and is for the use of sports clubs such as the Bream Bay Cricket and Bream Bay Hockey, which use the school grounds for games and practice. The clubs will be issued with keys to the toilets so they can be open while practices or games are underway.

Bream Bay College Principal Wayne Buckland said this would make it easier for clubs to utilize the school grounds as previously they have had to use the public toilets across Peter Snell Rd., at the Ruakākā Town Centre.

He said that opening up the gymnasium is a step too far as people could then access valuable school equipment out of public view.

Camping in public places

Several of our District's 'first-come, first-served' freedom camping sites will be closed over the summer peak to help protect the environment and ensure day-to-day beach goers can find a place to park. Sites that will be closed to freedom camping from 18 December to 8 February are the designated sites at Whangaumu Wellingtons Bay, Kowharewa Bay, Matapōuri (Wehiwehi Road), Woolleys Bay West and Sandy Bay.

The Reyburn/ Finlayson
House Lane Carpark is now
a prohibited site for all
camping. New sites for fully
self-contained vehicles have
been designated at Hātea East
Carpark (year-round), and at
Tikipunga and Onerahi Sports
parks from 18 December
to Northland/ Auckland
Anniversary day each year.

The designated sites in the main carpark at Ocean Beach remain open, but the grass overflow carpark there is now permanently closed for all camping.

Certified self-contained vehicle users may stay for three nights anywhere parking or camping are not prohibited, provided they use their onboard facilities and are considerate of residents and other road users.

Campers wanting to be sure of a place to stay should have a 'Plan B' and consider booking at one of our District's commercial or Department of Conservation campgrounds. For more information go to www.wdc.govt.nz/camping

Horses on beaches

Check our website <u>www.wdc.govt.nz/horses</u> before riding a horse on the beach this summer. Horses are allowed on most beaches in our District, including two yearround, all-day horse areas. Some special rules apply in summer, and there are some beaches where horses are banned. Year-round riding areas:

- Ruakākā Beach from Mair Road to Karawai Street
- Uretiti from the camping ground to Tip Road.

Summer rules: In summer horses are allowed on most beaches from 5pm to 9am – the cooler and quieter parts of the day.

Horse ban areas: To protect wildlife, horses are banned all year around in several areas. See www.wdc.govt.nz/horses for more information. Swimming remember to keep horses 100m away from swimmers.

Dogs

We have three all-day outdoor dog exercise areas – two in Bream Bay (Uretiti and Ruakākā) and a dog park at William Fraser Memorial Park on Pohe Island. On all other beaches where dogs are not prohibited, dogs can be walked before 9am or after 5pm between 20 December and 31 January.

Dog no-go zones

To keep kiwi and other wildlife safe, dogs are banned year-round from nine beach and estuary conservation areas in our District, and from all bush reserves. Locations are listed and mapped at www.wdc.govt.nz/dogs and includes Kauri Mountain Beach where dogs are prohibited year-round.

Driving on beaches

To help keep everyone safe on our beaches, Council has a bylaw to control vehicles on beaches in the Bream Bay area.

Ruakākā: Driving on beaches is banned at Ruakākā between the Surf Club and a point 500m north of Marsden Village (including the Ruakākā River Mouth area).

This includes the areas in front of the Ruakākā Wildlife Refuge.

Langs Beach: The speed limit on the beach has been reduced to 20kph, and access to the beach is only from the south-east of the vehicle access point.

On the most popular northwestern part of the beach, vehicles are banned from 20m north-west of the public toilets.

On all beaches drivers must not damage the beach, be a nuisance to anyone else, do anything that could be dangerous, or exceed the posted speed limit. Driving over Dunes is strictly prohibited. If someone is being unsafe report it to *555 as all driving offences are a Police matter.

About alcohol

Check Council's website's information on alcohol bans at www.wdc.govt.nz/alcoholban. Drinking alcohol in public places is banned on all beaches and public land within 300 metres of the coast (including Whangārei Harbour), Whangārei's central business district and six suburbs within the urban boundaries of our District as well as six coastal villages.

Two inspiring Takahiwai women

Two Takahiwai women, both with children and busy family lives, have set a high bar with their commitment to the Bream Bay Community

Billie Hopkins has recently qualified as a Senior Firefighter with the Ruakaka Fire Brigade after completing and intensive training course in Wellington. She can not turn out with the Ruakaka Brigade with this rank and can take charge at a call out when there is no station officer present. She is not absolutely sure but thinks she may be the first woman to have gained this ranking with the Ruakākā brigade.

Her grandmother Joanne Hannon was a member of the Ahipara Brigade and also served on the Ruakākā Brigade for a few years.

Billie has three children aged 12 years, 4 and 2 as well as two part time jobs and saiid it has all been challenging at times. Training is every Monday night, then there are training courses and callouts.

She has been with the brigade for seven years. and enjoys the commeraderie

"It feels like we are all one big family."

And she is a young woman who likes a challenge. Firefighters sometimes have to deal with traumatic events but Billie said there are good support networks in place.

"We all get together for a debrief afterwards."

Anyone interested in joining the Ruakaka Fire Brigade

can call down at the Princes Rd. station on a Monday night at 7pm to observe the training session.

Jeanette Carrington, who started her training with Bream Bay St. John nine months ago, has now qualified as a first responder. Jeanette has five children but said she has great support both at home from her husband Ari and from volunteers and staff at the Bream Bay St. John Station. As a first responder she is now authorized to give primary first aid until advanced medical care is available.

Jeannette is also following a family tradition. Her grandmother Ngaire Wilson was the first female officer at the Maungaturoto ambulance station.

She said she was keen to do something for her community and training with St. John has given her the skill set so she "actually can help."

"The joy of helping people is one of my big things. I want to be a really valuable part of the community."

She also enjoys the friendships she has made through St. John and says if she happens to meet another ambulance officer out in the community they will stop and have a catch up about what has been happening at the station.

While all the classroom work and 12 hour shifts are difficult at times, Jeanette is pleased to be setting a good example for her children, which she hopes will inspire them to do something positive with their own lives.

Volunteer ambulance officers are expected to put in four shifts a month but there is flexibility around when you can be available.






Art'n Tartan + 2023 - Entries now open






