Cruise ships scheduled to come to Northport this summer

Cruise ships are back on the agenda for Northport. The first scheduled arrival is MS Regatta: 181m in length, carrying up to 684 passengers due on Marsden Point 3 Wharf at around 8am on Sunday 4 February and departing the same day at 8pm.

The ship with its crew and passengers will be welcomed to Whangārei Harbour by mana whenua Patuharakeke. Members of the public will be able to view its arrival from the beach accessed at the end of Ralph Trimmer Drive.

A cruise ship visit was scheduled back in December 2020 but the Covid 19 Pandemic got in the way. Now cruise shipping companies are back in business.

MS Regatta will be returning on 22 February and a smaller ship the Seven Seas Navigator with up to 500 passengers is booked to arrive on 7 March.

There are seven cruise ships booked for the 2023/2024 season and already three for 2025/2026.

Ken Andrews has been appointed Northport's Cruise Manager and has the task of making sure the passengers leaving the ship for excursions in and around Whangārei can get safely through the port between log and container loading operations.

There is a lot to think about. The vehicles in the Northport carpark will need to be moved to make way for a fleet of vans, which will transport the passengers to

EDITORIAL

I am making good use of the new changing sheds at Ruakākā beach alongside the surf club. I have been down to the beach for a swim for the last two mornings just to celebrate their final completion. It is so nice to have a proper changing shed with a wooden seat and hooks to hang things on.

In the past I have sometimes got changed into my swimming togs in the toilet, which up until now was the only public facility available here. It was pretty awful with not much space and I was nervous about putting my bag on the floor.

The new changing shed and toilets have been a long time coming. There were all kinds of hold ups.

The hero of this story is a former Ruakākā Beach resident Trevor le Clus. It took a great deal of persistence, frustration and numerous emails, phone calls and meetings over around ten years by Trevor to keep the changing sheds on the Whangārei District Council's agenda. Trevor has since moved from Ruakākā but was back last Friday to celebrate the opening of what he described as "an absolute necessity" to cope with all the local and national visitors who come to Ruakākā Beach.

Council Field Officer Grant Alsop also needs recognition for the role he played in getting this project completed.

The Whangārei District Council originally applied to a government tourism support fund but was unsuccessful. Both mornings when I visited there was a trail of young tourists coming across from their vans squeezed into the freedom camping space in front of the motel with their toothbrushes to use the new hand basins. I think the changing shed project should absolutely have qualified for that grant. Who knows how these things are decided?

The sheds should have been ready by last summe (2022/2023) but the WDC had difficulty in finding a contractor to take on the job. The original cost estimate, based on some recently build similar facilities, had been under \$250,000. However, with the rising cost of materials and hiring qualified builders it turned out no one was willing to take on the job for this amount. Grant needed to go back to the drawing board. A slimmed down design was drawn up and the job was re-advertised.

The final cost of the building is \$420,000, which seems an astonishing amount to me. I would have thought this would be enough to build an entire house. The building has some nice features - some blue tiles on the wall behind the outside showers and slates of cedar to break up the black front walls but behind this are just concrete blocks.

Still it's a nice building and its good to have it here at last. It's not too obtrusive in that beachside setting. It is simple and functional. It has three toilet cubicles, with one spacious enough for a wheel chair. The pre-existing toilets will remain, so the queues waiting outside shouldn't be so long this summer. There are two hand basins and two sets of outside showers to wash the salt water from your body and the sand from your feet. The changing sheds have hooks and a wooden seat bench, which I regard as pure luxury.

their chosen destinations.

An area around the ships gangway will be fenced so people don't wander off into the port. There will need to be shelter here for the passengers as they wait for their vans to arrive. Their identifications will be checked as they all leave and then return to the ship. But cruise ship schedules can change at short notic If the weather makes it a bit difficult to get into the berth at Northport the ship's master may decide to go on to the next port of call. With cruises typically being just ten days long, there isn't much room for delays.

Passengers arriving on MS Regatta are invited to choose from a number of local excursions. They are being offered: a guided trip to the Hundertwasser Art Centre, a trip to Whangārei Falls and the Town Basin, a visit to the Quarry Gardens and Town Basin, a visit to the Matakohe Kauri Museum, a Māori Village cultural experience, a visit to Whangarei's Kiwi House, a fishing charter, horseback riding, a Scottish experience in Waipu, an art workshop, a farm experience

and a trip to the Waipu Caves and walk amongst the limestone formations there.

Those passengers not booked on a tour will be offered a coach ride into the Whangarei town Basin where the Whangarei District Council, pulling out all stops to ensure this first visit is a success will operate an I site and arrange for "cruise ship ambassadors" to assist the visitors. A market will be set up on the Victoria Canopy Bridge on the day of the visit.

There are specialised destination management companies, which arrange all the offered tours a list of which is supplied to the passengers before their arrival

Ken said the Waipu Golf Club is a future possible cruise ship passenger destination and a local helicopter operator has also been approached.

He suggests anyone with an idea they would like to develop as a tourism attraction make contact with Tania Burt at Northland Inc.

Piroa Conservation Trust has just under \$600,000 from the Ministry for Primary Industries (MPI).

A demonstration site is being created to show how a wetland can be created relatively simply and cost effectively.


Graham said, "A lot of good science has gone into how to build wetlands to get the maximum water quality and bio-diversity improvement at the least cost." Guest speakers on the day include: Ben Herbert (Fonterra), Jon Hampson (NZ Landcare Trust), Hamish Matthews (Dairy NZ) and Nicholas Naysmith (Mountains to SeaTrust).

Graham wants to talk to local landowners inviting them to join existing catchment groups for the Ahuroa/Millbrook, Waionehu, Pohuenui and Ruakākā Rivers, or to start up new local groups.

Existing groups meet regularly to talk about the issues and challenges of their rivers and streams. Issues being addressed to date are: willows in rivers and stream beds causing flooding, erosion of river banks, water quality and how sediment flows vary from the hills to the sea.

The Ahuroa/Millbrook and Ruakākā catchment groups are already carrying out riparian planting, trapping and weed maintenance.

Anyone interested is welcome to attend.

As he focuses his work in Bream Bay he would like to find a house in this area but with so many families looking for rental accommodation finding a property is not proving an easy task.

He said the project had been on the Whangārei District Council's long-term plan but was dropped and it was a battle to get it back on. He has since moved away from Ruakākā but he and his wife Annette came back to celebrate its final opening on Friday 10 November.

The new facilities were to have been built by Christmas of 2022 but the rising cost of building materials and labour shortages meant that no contractor could be found to do the job at an estimated price of less than \$250,000. In the end the project cost \$420,000.

Grant Alsop of the Whangārei District Council was also pleased to see the building completed. He has overseen the work, liaising with Trevor, talking to neighbours, negotiating with the contractors etc. The sky blue tiles at the back of the showers were his idea.

He is aware that Ruakākā beach gets very busy over summer and that the small two toilet block there was inadequate. He has seen long lines of people waiting to use them. This block will remain where it is giving beach goers a total of seven toilets – so no more long lines.

Trevor said the process has been frustrating but "anyway all good now. We have an absolute necessity in place to cope with local and national visitors and for the various surf club and volleyball competitions that are held at the beach.



Planning an indoor heated swimming pool for the Bream Bay Community

A proposed indoor heated swimming pool complex in Waipu would be a mix of a private and community investment.

Tania Abercrombie and Gilbert Costello, the owners of the Shred Fitness Hub in South Rd. said the idea came from Mary Sinclair, a gym member who put it to them that such a pool would be an asset for the whole Bream Bay community.

A community group has formed to promote the project including: Mary a retired teacher and ministry of education employee, now retired Waipu RD contractor Steve Jones, Rick Stolwerk our regional councilor, swim coach and representative swimmer Andrea Hawcridge, Jess Loomis also a swim coach, Tania and Gilbert, with Tania's father, Stuart Abercrombie,

The group has launched an online survey on the SHrED Waipu website to get a feeling about how popular a heated pool alongside theover \$300 fitness centre would be and how people would like to use it.

The survey will run until the New Year to capture the people who come to Langs and Waipu Cove over the holiday period.

Last week 660 people had responded, most saying they would use such a facility once or twice a week.

Meanwhile the team is also gathering information about how much it would cost to build the complex comprising: two pools – one 25 metres long for lane swimming and aqua jogging and activities and another shallower pool for

children's swimming lessons, aqua fit classes and physiotherapy and rehabilitation as well as the building these would be housed in.

Tania said they would aim to keep the cost of using the pool competitive with the price for swimming in other pool complexes such as Whangārei's Aquatic Centre where it costs \$7.50 for an adult and \$5.50 for children and seniors to swim. However the Aquatic Centre is subsidized by the Whangārei District Council to the tune of over \$300,000 pa.

While Tania and Gilbert will provide the land they are inviting interested people to invest or become sponsors in the pool complex. The survey invites participants to contribute by way of investment, sponsorship or by helping with the construction work.

Another idea is that individuals might like to contribute a few thousand dollars towards constructions costs in return for a pass to use the pool.

Northpower gives big discounts on electrictiy bills

Most residential and business customers connected to electricity distribution company Northpower's network will get a discount of \$285.41gst on either their November or December electricity bill.

Those who used less that 2,000 kwh for the prior year will get a \$105.55 discount.

The discount is made possible with the support of the Northpower Electric Power Trust, which owns Northpower on behalf of the consumers on its network.

Phil Heatley the trust chairman said "It is a practical mechanism the Company and Trust can use so that financial returns flow directly bact ot electricity consumers in Kaipara and Whangārei. Overall the annual discount payout comes to \$14.1 million, an increase of \$1.7million on what was paid out last year.

Bev Webb reflects on 27 years as Personal Assistant to a series of four principals at Bream Bay College

Bev Webb still uses plural first person pronouns – we, us, our when she talks about Bream Bay College. After 27 years in the job as personal assistant to four principals and only having just retired this is hardly surprising.

Bev's farewell party was held a few weeks ago but she has been back helping to hand over to her replacement Nikki Donaldson. Last Thursday she could finally say she had retired.

The first Principal Bev worked with was Linda Fox, a temporary replacement for Principal Jules Flight who was away on sabbatical leave. When Mr. Flight decided not to return to the college John Fitzgerald, who had previously worked in the Education Review Office ,was appointed by the school's board. He remained for six years until he left under a cloud having had an affair with a student.

For the next 21 years Bev was PA Wayne Buckland who she got on well with saying they complimented one another. She thinks Mr. Buckland has been a positive influence on the school, putting it's finances on a good footing, raising the NCEA achievement rate, introducing restorative justice processes and overseeing some big building projects.

Bev said the new year seven and eight classrooms and science block will be his legacy.

For her final few months in the job she worked with new Bream Bay College Principal Julian Cosgrove. She believes he will be good for the school and says, "It was time for a change."

Bev began working at Bream Bay College as the part time "photocopy girl." In the days before laptops and chrome books lots of photocopying was needed. Teachers would bring her the material they wanted multiple copies of and she would guarantee a 24-hour turnaround time.

Towards the end of 1995 the principal's PA job became available and Bev applied. She had previously worked, as a private secretary to a partner in a big actuary firm in Melbourne, so was well qualified.

Bev and her husband "came back home" in 1989 when their son Mitchell was born. Bev's parents had retired to One Tree Point and she wanted her children to grow up knowing their grandparents. Her mother, who died recently aged in her 90s, had supported Bev in her job by helping to take care of her two children.

Bev's father Frank Bray was an engineer who helped to build the Marsden A power station and her parents had immigrated to New Zealand before she was born.

"We were transient people", Bev said. They moved around to where ever her father had work. The family returned to Ruakaka when her father was employed to work at the Marsden Point Refinery and Bev spent two years as a pupil at Ruakākā Primary. Her mother worked in the refinery cafeteria.

The John Fitzgerald saga was a difficult time for Bev and a low point for the college but there have been plenty of high points since then.

She has enjoyed getting to know local families. The children of some of the students at the school in her early years are now coming through the college.

She valued the contact and relationship building with kaumatua of Patuharakeke, which she said has given her an insight into how special the community of Bream Bay is.

She thinks the kahui ako communities of learning structure, where all three local primary schools, the college and early childhood learning centres have formed a co-operative relationship has been "really successful."

"It has brought everyone together so we can support all our students from the moment they enter the education sector through their learning journey."

Opening the new whare in 2018 was a celebratory occasion. The whare was built by the school board without Ministry of Education funding and is a valuable addition to the school. The old college whare was relocated to the Lakeside Industrial Park where it became the Ruakākā Toy Library, which Bev regards as good repurposing of it.

In 2006 a building that had served as the Marsden Bay Mission to Seafarers centre was relocated to the college and became the students welfare centre used by counselors, nurses and the school's deans to work with students. Bev was particularly pleased when this building was named the Reid-Gardner centre in memory of Gloria Reid who had been a local public health nurse for many years and the late Ginny Gardner a teacher at the school who had a particular interest in student welfare.

In 2005 Bream Bay College set up a sister school relationship with Higashi School in Osaka, Japan and 30 students from that school visited the college and were billeted out by local families. The following year Bream Bay College students paid a return visit. These exchanges continued until halted by the Covid epidemic but began again this year. The school also has an arrangement with Jinai Girls High school in Osaka. Two students from this school have attended Bream Bay College this year and another two are due to come to the school in 2024.

Another memorable time was when the when Covid 19 arrived in New Zealand and the college was closed. Bev said this was, in fact, a very busy time for the schools teaching and administrative staff who worked together to make sure lessons could be continued via zoom. The school staff made a big effort to keep in contact with all its students and their families. Bev describes a spreadsheet developed for staff to use when making contact. Top of the page were two question to put to students and their whanau: "How are you? How can we help?

If a family didn't have a computers or an internet connection the school worked to remedy this Chrome books were handed to families through car windows in the school car park.

She wants to compliment the school's Board of Trustees and senior management team whom she says are all "committed, intelligent people who want what's best for the school."

"The school has a good team of support staff. It has been a privilege to work with them all."

What will she do now with all her free time? She is not in a great rush to make plans. Perhaps next year she and her husband will do some travelling around New Zealand or further afield.

For now Bev said, "I will do some walking and try to get a little bit fitter. The PA job involved a lot of deskwork.

"I will reconnect with people, potter around a bit in my garden. I haven't had time to do these things. The school has been my whole life."

Yasmin said she prefers outdoor work as is planning to take on a mining job in Australia.

The Bream Bay College Senior Prizegivng was held on Friday morning November 3. The school's senior Year 11,12 and 13 students are now well into their NCEA

Joel Tolley who won the Proxime Accesit award will attend Waikato University in 2024 where he will study Mechatronics, which blends Mechanical, Electronics, Computer, and Software Engineering.

Residents of Ranburn Rest Home get to enjoy some Tuesday afternoon choir music with a combined Kaiwaka and Waipu choir holding a weekly practice session in the retirement complex's common room.

The choir's conductor Anne Connolly-Munt is now a resident of Ranburn and the retirement home management has agreed the weekly practice sessions can be held there.

At present they are rehearing Christmas carols in preparation for the festive season.

As well as Kaiwaka and Waipu, members of the 14 strong choir come from Ruakākā and Whakapirau. They have a set of sky blue matching polo shirts monogramed with KW Choir design, with these part sponsored by Ranburn.

"Where ever I go I seem to start choirs", said Ann.

This is no exaggeration.

In the 1980s, married and living in Hamilton, she formed the 100 strong Cantando Choir, then the Cantamus Womens Choir, Les Enfants Children's Choir and Hamilton Chorale and the Cantamus Men's Choir now known as Male Voices Waikato. In 1999 she rehearsed the North Island Male Choir and became an associate director of the New Zealand Male Choir.

She formed the Albany Singers mixed community choir after moving to Auckland's North Shore in 2007 and then the Albany Women's Choir.

Then living in Kaiwaka she set up the KW choir. Now aged 91 and living in Ranburn the choir has come to her.

Ann's first had piano lessons at the age of six practicing on her mother's harmonium. When she was ten years old she was transfixed by the sound of an church organ. By the age of 12 she was able to play her first service on the organ at the Anglican Church in Pt. Chevalier. While at training college she became the deputy organist at St Mathews in the City.

Ann is an exacting choir mistress getting her KW singers to repeat lines if they are not quite right.

"Hold your music sheets up and your heads high, then you

won't go flat on that last note", she exhorts. She sets homework for the singers between choir practice sessions.

The KW Choir has been together since June and Anne says they are "going pretty well." She would like a few more singers, particularly a few more male voices.

She will limit the number in the group to 25. "That will give us enough people to perform even if some can't be therell"

She doesn't hold auditions

"Everyone has the right to sing. If people can't cope they don't stay."

The KW choir is preparing for a Christmas concert at Ranburn on 19 December for residents and their relatives.
