Northland Regional Council plans to cut funding which puts lifeguards on our beaches and helps to keep the rescue helicopter flying

Northland Regional Council proposal to stop might mean no surf lifeguards on our beaches during week days next summer.

The Northland Regional Council is proposing to stop its funding contributions to emergency services and sporting facilities.

In its draft Long Term Plan the NRC favoured option is to stop funding these activities, redirecting \$2.7m a year to reduce rate rises and deliver what it sees as its "core work."

The Northland Rescue Helicopter stands to lose \$535K, which it needs to top up its Government funding which covers 85% of its operating costs. At a Waipu Lions dinner last week where the Lions handed over a \$31,500 donations proceeds of their 2024 Car and Bike show, Briar Edwards, fundraising coordinator for the rescue helicopter trust said the trust needed to find an additional \$1.2 million each year for its operation and the loss of the NRC support would leave a big hole in its budget.

EDITORIAL

Here's hoping the Northland Regional Council gets flooded with submissions asking it to retain its funding for our vital emergency services

I frequently hear the Northland Rescue Helicopter flying over our home and I feel gratitude for this service. Hopefully, I will never have occasion to use it myself but I am glad it is there. I know of local people who are alive today because of it.

Equally if I go for a dip in the sea at Ruakākā or at Waipu Cove it is reassuring to know the surf lifeguards are nearby I never venture out too far in the waves but my grandsons know no such constraint. They like to go surfing at Waipu Cove while I watch nervously from the beach, so it is good to know those surf life guards are up there in the club house

What are the Northland Regional Councillors thinking in proposing to cut funding for these important services? I hope they get flooded with submissions by people asking for these annual grants to be maintained.

That was a magnificent effort by the Waipu Lions to raise \$31,500 for the rescue helicopter at the Waipu Car and Bike Show back in February. But think about all the hard work this entailed and all the circumstances that needed to align —no pandemic, no cyclones, no road closures - to make it such a success. We would need 17 more such events every year to make up for the \$535,000 the Northland Regional Council is proposing to take away from this essential Northland service. The NRC Long Term Plan proposal would also do away with funding for sporting facilities. The Okara Park Stadium, the Pohe Island Bike Park, the Mangawhai activity zone, and sports hubs in Kaitaia, Kaikohe and Dargaville have all benefited from this fund. It must be Bream Bay's turn to get some of this money. I can think of a couple of cycle and walking trails that could use some assistance.

The sum of \$27 a year per household seems like a small price to play for all these benefits

I have been wading through the NRC's long-term plan consultation document. It has lots of clever design elelments, pretty pictures and lofty platitudes about leadership and "weaving the people together" and how "In unity we have strength."

But have a look at the video recording of the Council meeting back in November 2023 when four conservationist leaning councillors were stripped of all their leadership positions by a block of three with farming interests joined by the two Te Raki Maori representatives. Not much "weaving of people together" or "unity" going on here.

Northland Regional Councillors get paid quite well. The Chairperson receives \$126,500 pa. The Deputy Chairperson gets \$79,181. Councillors with additional responsibilities (chairing various subcommittees) \$71,681 and other councillors (like the four who lost their portfolios at the end of last year) a bit less at \$53,710. I think we should expect more of these councillors.

Despite the cuts in grants to emergency services and sporting facilities there is still a proposed NRC rate rise of 11.05% which equates to an average of \$58 per property for the coming year. We have come to expect the price of everything to just keep going up and I appreciate that bus drivers, for example, need a wage rise. The Northland Regional Council has some dedicated staff who deserve to be paid well for their hard work and expertise but I think it likely that some savings could be made. Perhaps a smaller, simpler Long Term Plan consultation document with less spin and more straight-forward information.

It's going to be chaos. What will happen when the surf is running and there are rips everywhere and there are no flags in place?

Kath Manning, Captain of the Waipu Cove Surf Lifesaving Club said while the club appreciates the funding support it has had from the Northland Regional Council over the last few years she is "very, very concerned" about what things will look like next summer.

If the proposed NRC cuts go ahead all six lifesaving clubs in Northland will lose the funding they use to keep paid life guards on the beach over the busiest weeks of summer.

Kath said without those lifeguards on the beach weekdays, "It's going to be chaos. What will happen when the surf is running and there are rips everywhere and there are no flags in place?

"The beach will not be a safe place. A lot of what our lifesavers do is about prevention. I am just really worried about what will happen without those measures in place."

She said, "Our volunteer rescue squads won't be able to cope and will get burned out.

"Its just really irresponsible to just pull the funding so suddenly. The Government has said its not going to meet the shortfall."

Submissions on the Northland Regional Council Long Term Plan can be made on the NRC website and are due in by Friday19 April.

funding also supports the Coastguard, Search and Rescue and Surf Lifesaving.

The funding allows our local surf lifesaving clubs to pay the surf lifeguards, who look after the beach at both the Ruakākā and Waipu Cove Surf lifesaving clubs week days during the summer. Volunteers take care of the weekends. Without this NRC grant is doubtful if lifeguards will be on our beaches Monday to Friday next summer.

NRC funding for all these services costs an average of \$11.40 per household per year.

In addition the regional council is proposing to scrap a Regional Sporting Facilities Rate, which works out at \$16.30 per household per year. The fund was originally established to build the Northland Event centre and Okara Park stadium .

Some of the projects it has supported in more recent years are: The Mangawhai Activity Zone, the Pohe Island Bike Park and sports hubs in Kaikohe, Kaitaia and Dargaville.

Areas where the NRC proposes to redirect its rates take include:

- \$6.56m new spend over the next three years on flood protection
- 1.04 million new spend to go towards an joint emergency co-ordination centre.
- \$1.05m new spend on harbour safety and navigation
- S1.04m new spend on public transport.
- •.An additional \$12.8 million over the next three years on staff salaries to help with staff attraction and retention along with increased expenses for items as insurance, licensing and maintenance
- \$1.74m new spend over the next three years to "grow capacity to deliver on TeTiriti relationships"
- Under the heading "Regional Leadership" is a \$4.85m new spend a year to "strengthen cultural capacity and TeTiriti partnerships" and provide "more capacity to keep council running smoothly."

Highway closure impacts Waipu retail business with many reporting significant drop offs in customer numbers

The long State Highway One closure over the Brynderwyns is having an impact on Waipu retail businesses.

Danni Hang, who owns Goody Goody Café and the Waipu Butcher shop, points to all the empty carparks outside her cafē.

"There are never any carparks there normally. The closure has definitely had an impact. We noticed the jump when the Brynderwyns opened for a few days over Easter."

She is looking forward to when the road opens permanently in May.

She drove over to take a look while it was opened for Easter.

"A lot of work has been done so hopefully there won't be any more road closures for a while."

Clayton Gwynne of the Pizza Barn said his business has suffered a 20% drop in custom while the highway has been closed.

"People just think it is too difficult to come north. They hear about the truck that got jack knifed on Cove Rd., which held up traffic for hours and the accident near Johnsons Point with seven people airlifted to hospital and they decide not to come."

Stalls at the Waipu monthly market in the Market sales may have Coronation Hall have dropped off slowed a bit but she

Claire Nichols and Kate Mitchell who run the market said for many stall holders it's just too much of a mission to drive around one of those detour routes to get here. Usually the room at the back of the hall is full of stalls but when the highway is closed this space is not needed.

Claire said she usually judges how busy the market has been by seeing how many pastries and loaves

of bread Petra van Dulst has left on her stall. Last Sunday 14 April, Petra said she would likely be taking some of her sourdough loaves home to put in the freezer and her colleagues at Whangarei Hospital where she works would be enjoying some of her pastries with their Monday morning coffee.

Liffy Truman of Glencairn Gardens said it's a bit like when we were all locked down under Covid regulations.

"You have to adapt."

Market sales may have slowed a bit but she mostly sells her plants on line and couriers them to customers.

Waipu's social activities have been impacted as well. Wes and Barb Bycroft of the band Twisty Willow have halted their monthly Reeling in Waipu nights in the Coronation Hall. Wes said, "We had a good turn-out on

the first night but the numbers dropped right away with the closing of the Brinderwyns. We hadn't realised how many young people from the Maungataroto/ Kaiwaka region had come!"

It's not just Waipu businesses that have felt the impact of the closure. Chris Elavia, the owner and operator of the GAS station at the State Highway One Ruakākā roundabout, said his turnover has dropped by 40%.

His main concern is to pay his staff and he has not paid himself any wages for the past few months.

He said, "You know how it is when you reach my age you have a few reserves put away."

He is crossing his fingers that the highway will re-open as scheduled on Monday 13 May before he has to dig too deep into those reservers though.

Grant Egan an owner of Ruakākā Fresh Choice estimates that the supermarket's custom has dropped by around 10%.

"It picked up over Easter when the highway was open but now there just aren't as many people around. We are getting good support from our locals but the bach owners don't seem to be coming up for weekends."

"The Ruakaka towncentre generally just doesn't have as many people around as it usually does.

"Hopefully it will all return to normal when the road re-opens and we won't get any more closures."

High water table under the dunes adds to the urgency for the rebuild of the Ruakākā Wastewater treatment plant

The Whangārei District Council is proposing to spend \$84.8 million on upgrading the Ruakaka wastewater treatment plant and developing a new treated waste water disposal system. with work starting this year and continuing to 2030.

The Council already holds a consent to build a wastewater ocean outfall but one of the conditions of this is that it first investigate possible land based disposal options.

The late Margaret Hicks, who was appointed as an independent monitor for the Ruakaka wastewater treatment plant, a job she took very seriously, had been calling for an upgrade of the plant since 2010. In a letter to the Bream Bay News she wrote "The Ruakaka waste water treatment plant is in urgent need of an upgrade! Not only is it reaching its uptake limit and breaking resource consent conditions as a result of ponding but its wetland is in dire need of replacement.

She went on to say, "The Ruakaka wastewater intake used to be around 3,000 cubic metres per week or even less. Now it can be 8,400 cubic metres or more! Just think of all that additional part treated water being discharged into the Ruakaka dunes.

"Surely they don't deserve to suffer such ongoing degradation? Enough is enough, as the present waste water treatment plan no longer has the capacity to cope with such a growing population."

But it's not just the growing population that has forced this situation. Increased rainfall as a consequence of higher temperatures as the climate warms (also a topic Margaret was eloquent on) is another factor forcing the wastewater plant's urgent upgrade,

Jim Sephton, the Whangarei District Councils Works and Infrastructure Manager, told a discussion group at the Council's drop in session on its 2024 to 2034 Long Term Plan held in the Ruakākā Recreation Centre on Tuesday afternoon 9 April, that due to the almost constant rain of the summer of 2022/2023 the water table had risen under the dunes as evident in all the ponding at the Uretiti Campground. The water level under the dunes north of NIWA where the Ruakaka Wastewater treatment plant is located remains high and this is another reason the plant has very little remaining canacity

Mr. Sephton said the Council is in consultation with Patuhakakeke to find alternate disposal options and is also talking with Meridian Energy about the possibility of treated wastewater being pumped into the wetland it plans to build alongside its proposed solar energy farm. But given the investment the Council has already made in securing resource consents for its outflow pipe this seems a likely option.

Whatever the disposal option there will need to be an upgrade of the water treatment plant. In the Long Term Plan consultation documents a Sequencing Batch Reactor is proposed. In these systems wastewater is treated in tanks to remove nutrients, nitrogen and phosphorous.

Mr. Sephton told the discussion group the cost of the treatment plant upgrade would amount to around \$40 million with the remaining \$44 million earmarked to develop the new disposal

Waipu Gateway development hearing postphoned so plans can be downscaled

In response to submissions received and a Council staff report on its application to develop a commercial centre at the intersection of Millbrook Road and State Highway One, Vaco Investments has asked for a postponement of the hearing on its controversial proposal. The hearing had been set down for 24 April 2024.

Reasons given by Vaco's agent for the request were that Vaco Investments intends to "redesign the project to a lesser scale.'

Some of the activities put forward in the original proposal would be dropped and the vehicle access to the site would be redesigned in an attempt to reach agreement on the access with the New Zealand Transport Agency -NZTA.

Vaco Investments Ltd. also hoped to reach an agreement with the New Zealand Transport Agency on the design of an off ramp from State Highway One. NZTA's submission on the original development proposal asked that it be declined

The Hearing Panel, appointed commissioners David Hill, Chairman and Dr. Lee Beattie, agreed to the extension saying the reasons provided for seeking it were "appropriate in light of the complexity of the issues raised by parties, the applicant's seeming willingness to address those further, and that it will likely assist in narrowing the matters in dispute and therefore enable a more efficient hearing."

The Waipu Lions newspaper collection is going pretty well, averaging around 15kg a month, which brings in \$600 in funds. Householders are invited to deliver bundles of newspapers to the home of Lions member Dave Bell at 13 Inverness Lane in Waipu.

Dave makes monthly trips to Orewa. The Orewa Lions Club sells the paper to a company, to use in erosion control

The Waipu Lions also collect aluminum cans. These can be dropped into a can cage in the car park at the RAZZA (Waipu RSA and Citizen and Services Club) Dave said, "We estimate we are getting about 10 -20% of the cans available in Waipu. Can we encourage people to put their cans in the cage instead of into their recycling bins.

Wine bottle sleeves and tops are another moneymaker. other good causes the Waipu Lions support

These can be dropped off at 13 Inverness Lane or left in plastic bags at the can cage

The can collection has brought in \$3,900 to date, and the wine bottle tags and sleeves - \$2,000. Proceeds from the cans and the wine tops collections go to the charity Kidney Kids, which provides support and services to children with kidney disease and their families

The recycling operation is expanding with Dave now inviting people to drop off their old vehicle lead acid batteries at his address.

Strong cases made to the Whangārei District Council Long Term Plan for funding to help build Bream Bay shared cycling and walking trails

The Bream Bay Shared Path group, which is working to establish a safe off road shared path for cyclists and walkers between Marsden Cove and the Ruakākā Town Centre has prepared a strong submission for the Whangārei District Council 's Long Term Plan.

The submission will be accompanied by a petition with 195 signatures . Sixty five of these are from logging truck drivers who use the Port Marsden Highway many of whom report near misses with cyclists on this road.

The group has also gathered together support letters from the Marsden Lions, Marsden Maritime Holdings, Bream Bay College, Bream Bay Village, Channel Infrastructure and Northport.

Although the Council's LTP consultation document states that progressing the district's cycle and walk-ways will be 'deferred'', Mayor Vince Cocurullo said that this did not apply to community led projects such as the Waipu to Waipu Cove cycle/walkway and the Ruakaka Shared Path project.

He said the Waipu Cycle and Walkway is a good example of how effective a community organisation with the support of the council could be.

The Waipu to Waipu Cove Cycle and Walking Trail group is also sending in a submission to the Long Term Plan asking for Council assistance to finish the last two and a half kilometres of its trail pointing out that this community group has been working on this project for over fifteen years and in this time has added a lot of value to this public asset.



Another 270 metres of trail was recently added to the WaipuCove to Waipu trail built with funds raised by the Waipu community including the proceeds of the Waipu Lions 2023 Car and Bike Show.



Collaborative effort to to attack weeds in the Bream Bay dunes

A collaborative effort to clear a large infestation of wattle from the Bream Bay duneland took place on Monday 8 April.

Thirty people in total took part in the drill and fill attack overseen by weed eradication expert Mike Urlich of Re-Native

The Bream Bay Coastal Care Trust has used a grant from Foundation North to commission a report on the weed problem and how best to tackle it on the 700 hectares of Bream Bay duneland administered by the Department of Conservation.

The report is expected to be completed by July 2024. On Monday 8 April, Mike brought together Bream Bay Coastal Care volunteers, Department of Conservation and Northland Regional Council staff, young people and leaders in Patuharakeke's Taiao environmental group and skilled weed busters from the Aki Tai Here environmental protection group based at Pataua South. Members of this group were able to demonstrate how best to deal effectively with dense growing coastal wattle, which had surrounded and was starting to infiltrate a stand of native kanuka and totara forest in the back dunes south of Paradise Shores in Ruakākā.

Te Kaurinui Parata showed the local volunteers how to clear away small twiggy branches from the trunk of the wattle trees and then drill holes 10cm apart around the circumference of the trunk filling each with a dose of blue dyed herbicide – a mix of glyphosate and metsulfuron $\,$

He explained this very targeted method is a lot safer than spraying and much less herbicide is required.

Mr. Urlich sent around an email thanking all the participants. He said the day's work had dealt with close to a hectare of dense wattle trees. He would attempt to get some drone footage of the area where the work had been concentrated to show the before and after effects of the work.

"The muscle and sweat of this collab will seriously release the impacted kanuka forest from competition of this rampant aussie invader."

Sue Jolly, Chairwoman of the Bream Bay Coastal Care Trust said the success of the working bee demonstrated the value of working together to restore and protect native biodiversity.

She said, "The inter-agency coordination and cooperation shown today and all working together made this a highly successful day.

"Many thanks to Mike Urlich for organising us. Without his passion and drive the day would not have happened. Thanks also for the training given. This will help us be more effective in our future weed management efforts."




