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Another truck stop proposal alongside the Ruakaka Roundabout

There's a new development proposal on the table for a truck stop, petrol station, café, restaurant and freedom camping area at the intersection of State Highway One and Port Marsden Highway.

Simon and Nancy Tan, who have owned and operated the café in Spring Flats just north of Kamo for the past 13 years have purchased six blocks of land totally 18 hectares alongside the intersection.

Their proposal also incorporates: a public toilet, a bus stop area with a shelter, a children's playground and a dog exercise area (for travelling canines).

They posted letters to people living in the vicinity of the proposed development, inviting them to an information evening at the Ruakaka Recreation Centre on Wednesday evening, 12 June. Their consultant John Duthie was on hand to answer questions.

Asked why a truck stop was needed just half an hour south of Whangarei he said there was no truck stop facility off the southbound lane of SH1 between Whangarei and Wellsford.

Questioned about the flood prone nature of this land Mr. Duthie said the proposed development would only take up about 20% of the land owned by the Tans.

This area would be built up above flood level and the remainder of the land would act as a reservoir for the stormwater run off. He said there would be no extra

Waipu Primary children rebuild the dune at Waipu Cove



Last Thursday 13 June, Waipu Primary children planted 1,450 pingao and spinifex in the dunes at Waipu Cove to complete a project they have been working on for the last five years.

A kilometre stretch of sand dune in front of the Waipu Surf Lifesaving Club has now been rebuilt and planted with dune vegetation to hold it in place. In total of 9,060 plants have been placed there. This year Hansen Drainage sponsored the project by bringing a large digger to the beach to complete the dune reshaping.

The resource consent was overseen by the Northland Regional Council, which also supplied the plants. Camp Waipu Cove organized and sponsored the work and provided a free sausage sizzle for the children after the planting session.

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EDITORIAL

Another development proposal. Will this one fly?

If you live in Bream Bay for any length of time you get used to development proposals. Some fly and some don't. Has anybody kept a tally? Some of the most spectacular proposals have been: a new international airport at Mata, a city to rival Whangarei with its own university on the bare piece of land where the Council has been having all that trouble with the stormwater pipes on One Tree Point Rd at Ruakaka and, going back a bit, the Marsden Power stations the original plan was a line of four power plants all fueled by oil from the Marsden Point Refinery. More recently there was a scheme to fire up the last remaining of these power stations with coal. After many volumes of environmental impact reports, all manner of studies, submissions in opposition and protests (some Greenpeace activists climbed onto the power station roof), that scheme fell over as well.

The newest proposal off the block is a truck stop complete with restaurant, café and petrol station off the southbound lane on State Highway One at the Ruakaka roundabout.

For good measure this proposal also includes: a public toilet, a children's play area and overnight parking for camper vans. There will also be a bus shelter and bus stop – something the people of Ruakaka have been wanting for some time.

Will this one fly? I think this will depend on the New Zealand Transport Agency, NZTA's, assessment of whether the off and on ramps from the highway are safe enough. Also there is an issue with flooding which the developers' planner tells me can be overcome by building up the site and using the balance of the land to soak up the stormwater. Petrol stations usually invove underground fuel storage tanks so we will watch and see.

I am disappointed the Waipu Hammer Hardware development that included a new larger shop and garden centre off Nova Scotia Drive won't be going ahead for the present. I was looking forward to that garden centre. Bruce and Coralie Roberts. who own the hardware shop are long time Waipu people. They understand the needs of their community and of the town of Waipu. That the costs of this development have doubled over the few years it has been in the planning stage from \$10 million to \$20 million is just outrageous.

Coralie made the comment that development costs

have gone way beyond ordinary local people. If you look around it is big companies - Hoppers, WFH Fulton Hogan that are making most of the big play around here. This is a pity because local people are more likely to understand and build what our community needs. The Waipu Hammer Hardware caters well for all us lifestyle- block- people. Last week I was able to buy two lovely little brown shaver pullets to augment my laying flock. These are not easy to find.

We need to support these local businesses to give them the confidence to develop and expand.

To return to the Ruakaka truck stop proposal, Simon and Nancy Tan have operated the Springs Flat truck stop north of Kamo for 13 years, so they qualify as locals. Their proposal seems to have a good understanding of what the travelling public needs – there is even a dog exercise area for all those pampered pooches who travel everywhere in the passenger seat with their humans and they get full marks for the public bus stop.

I feel a bit sorry for the stress this will be giving Chris, who operates the petrol station on the other side of the

Another petrol station though? It makes business sense I suppose. I can't believe how the traffic on that highway has been increasing. But shouldn't we be aiming to reverse this trend. How about a rest stop with all those comfort amenities around an electric vehicle charging station?

For trucks, which don't run well on electricity, perhaps there could be a liquid hydrogen fueling station. I believe Refining NZ is about to make a public announcement on this subject


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Waipu Hammer Hardware development called off for the time being

The relocation of Waipu Hammer Hardware to a new larger site with a garden centre off Nova Scotia Rd. has been called off, at least for the time being.

Coralie and Bruce Roberts said delays have led to astronomical price rises.

As well as the new hardware store and garden centre, stage one of the development included five smaller shops with office space above and over 100 new parking spaces. A second stage allowed for a supermarket, three smaller shops and a storage facility.

The Roberts were given consent for the development by the Whangarei District Council at a hearing in October 2017 when objectors withdrew their appeal to the Environment Court.

However, a delay of almost a year while they waited to get the approval of the Waipu Museum Board for access to connect to the storm-water pipe that runs through The Glebe has held the project up. The Glebe is owned by the Whangarei District Council but leased by the museum. The Council advised the Roberts that they should seek the cooperation of the Museum Board for the connection. The cost for the drainage connection work more than doubled from \$120,000 to \$250,000 in that time because of new strictre rules about laying pipes in peat

Coralie said, "This is the kind of thing we have been up against. You get given a price for something and then it changes."

Development fees charged by the Whangarei District Council were somewhere in the region of \$800,000 - \$900,000.

The estimated cost of the entire development, including stage two, is now \$20

million, more than double what it was when the Roberts first considered this venture. The assets they own – their home and the current hardware building -which they would need to borrow against haven't doubled in value during that time so continuing with the development has become unviable.

Coralie said, "We have decided that our health and family come first. We were extremely disappointed to have to give up on this project. We have already spent a lot of money on it. I cried for a month but now we are just getting on with things.

"We want to pay back all our debt as quickly as we can and who knows what will happen in the future."

She said, "It is hard to see how small New Zealand towns are able to develop and prosper on their own these days without some foreign investment. The costs have gone way beyond the reach of ordinary New Zealanders."

The Roberts received strong public support for their proposed new shopping complex and they expect Waipu people will be disappointed.

However, Coralie has some advice on what they can do about it.

"It sounds a bit counter intuitive but I tell people the best thing they can do is 'shop local.' If people in Waipu all shopped at the local Four Square than maybe Foodstuffs would realize we need a supermarket here."

If one of the big supermarket chains came on board and decided to invest in a supermarket in the development than the viability of the project would look a whole lot better.

Understanding colds and flu

What is a Cold?

It can be particularly dangerous for anyone with a health condition like asthma, heart disease, diabetes, or a weakened immune system to get the flu.

What treatment is available?

There are no medicines that cure a cold or the flu, However, you can treat your symptoms with medicines such as painkillers, nasal drops or sprays, cough syrups, throat lozenges and decongestants. Talk to your Pharmacist before you take any of these especially if you're already taking other medicines.

When to see your Doctor

Most colds and flus will run their course however you should seek medical advice if you get:

- a cough that gets worse or becomes painful
- an earache that gets more painful
- a headache that lasts several days . a very sore throat, or if you can see white or

One tree Point residents are about to lose a treasured coastal walkway

Do the residents of One Tree Point realise they are going to lose a treasured coastal walkway? I am referring to the seawall walkway on the western side of OTP. A beautiful walk at high tide, with the water lapping up next to you. Tranquil and interesting.

Residents have been waiting for the walkway to be reinstated, after it was damaged by a storm last year. Instead, the council have decided to open up the esplanade on the western side of One Tree Point. That is great. But I don't think residents want to lose the walkway, in exchange for the esplanade. I would certainly prefer the peaceful walk along the seawall at high tide, to the crumbling cliff top in front of houses.

Here is my arguement to the WDC...

- I thought we asked the WDC for better access to the coastline. Instead the WDC are planning to cover up this walkway with rocks, because they say we don't need it if the esplanade is open. So now the only access to the water at high tide, will be at the end of the current access points. That is roughly a 90% reduction in access.
- A focus point of the WDC's OTP Erosion Protection Investigation was to find "opportunities to enhance the coastal environment". Incorporating a footpath into the rock revetment wall is an enhancement over a wall that has only one purpose to retain. It doubles the walls usefulness. A 100% increase in usefulness should be viewed as an enhancement that cannot be overlooked.
- Sue Hodge from the WDC was quoted in the BBNews saying that current best practice is to "avoid the hardening of coastlines where possible". But the planned rock revetment wall will harden the coastline, with or without a footpath on top of
- If the WDC say the increased cost of making the wall with a footpath is the issue, they should refer to their own OTP Erosion Protection Investigation. It clearly shows that the rock revetment wall and footpath design already in use at Paradise Point (area 14), has the greatest longevity with the lowest maintenance required. And it states... "Extending this rock revetment should be considered". Because in the long term, it will be well worth it.

In reply

Neither myself, or the majority of this community misunderstand at all. One entitled individual not consenting to the process has nothing to do with an incomplete cycle and walkway.

Rather, the personal and private agenda's of a self appointed few is the sole reason for the three plus years delay and the resulting increase in costs. The children and indeed the whole community would have now been utilising a cycleway, had it not been for this groups clandestine and protracted approach.

Please, can Sue Foster elaborate on how an eastern route was "far" more desirable? A quick look down the western side suggests, significant less cost, far less ongoing maintenance, direct connection to the side roads where the bulk of the community live, and the western route is in line with the governments PGF. It also makes the most sense to have this area designated road/cycleway as essentially the majority of it is an open drain covered with kaikuyu, which is currently maintained.

If the cycleway group's motivation is to help ensure this community has a useful and much awaited resource, then I suggest they support the council's decision to have a western route that links Waipu and the Cove, and transfer the funds that have been donated by the community over the past four years.

The community has previously shown majority support for a western route, and indeed Langs Beach is doing just that and protecting its eastern side.

Accepted it does not connect to the now completed town/riverside section. However it is of such poor design, it precludes a good percentage of cyclists using it, including children. Many people continue to cycle on the western side of the road.

In the interest of the local population and visitors to Waipu, a well considered cycle/ walkway on the western side will be an asset to the community and a landmark for this popular beachside town.

stormwater running onto neighbouring properties as a result of the development.

Mr. Duthie said the New Zealand Transport Agency (NZTA) had raised some issues, which they had worked to resolve.

Again the extra land owned by the Tans had come in useful. There would be a long off ramp from SH1 into the truck stop and running alongside the highway. To leave the truck stop, vehicles would drive onto Port Marsden Highway approximately 200 metres east of the SH1 roundabout.

Mr. Duthie said this is a section of road with good visibility. He said another meeting with NZTA had been scheduled.

In the meantime the developers are consulting with local iwi, Patuharakeke and neighbours.

To a suggestion that Bream Bay people might welcome a safe carparking area to leave vehicles when they catch buses or car pool to Whangarei or Auckland Mr. Duthie said this might easily be accommodated in an area set aside for Freedom camping, as the Freedom campers would mostly be there overnight.

Steve Scott suggested that a tourist information centre might be a good addition to the proposal and Mr. Tan said he was interested in the ideas of the local community.

For Jacquie and Carl Hawkins who live alongside SH1 just north of where the highway off ramp to the proposed new service centre would run, this is something they have seen before. Back in 2011 a similar service centre proposal gained consent for a site further along Port Marsden Highway, but, so far, there is no sign of anything happening.

Mrs. Hawkins said the site of the current proposal was the first choice of the previous developers but was turned down by NZTA as being too dangerous. She pointed out the proposed off ramp will be close to the Prescott Rd. intersection.

She said, "This new Proposed Service Centre will be built directly on top of an underground stream. There are multiple bores on this site, so contamination is a huge concern. Tidal overflows run through this property, which sits in the Hazard Water Catchment Zone. "I will leave it to you to imagine what will happen if two neighbouring Petrol Stations (with a third across the road) flood and the runoff flows back into the Tauroa Stream and the Ruakaka River."

She also points out NZTA may eventually want to build a four lane highway between Whangarei and

"If there is a petrol station either side (of the highway) the costs will be huge."

Beware of internet scammers

Sergeant Neil Pennington, acting Officer in Charge at the Bream Bay Police Station, is concerned at the number of complaints the station has been receiving from people who have been scammed by online sharpsters.

One was from a man who had received a phone call with a recorded message, which purported to be from the telecommunications company Spark. The message told him that he had a problem with his Internet connection and if he wanted to get this fixed he should follow a list of instructions, which involved handing over his passwords. Sergeant Pennington advises anyone who receives such a call to hang up and contact Spark. The second complaint was from a man who had be contacted by what looked like a friend on his Facebook page inviting him to buy scratchy cards with a chance of winning \$20,000. When a friend contacted him to ask why he was trying to get him to buy these

Lots of minor crashes

There have been a number of minor crashes around the district over the past few weeks. None of these have resulted in any serious injuries.

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Lilliput Library at the Bream Bay Community Trust

The Ruakaka Community Library has placed a *Lilliput Library* at the Bream Bay Trust to give children easy access to books

During the day the Lilliput library stall is situated outside the main entrance (opposite the Sharing Shed). It is on castors so it can be moved inside at night. Librarian Sharon Booth said, "The idea is for children to pick a book to take home and read. Once read the book can be returned to the Lilliput library and they can take another.

She asks that people "Don't keep the books, just bring them back so other children can read and enjoy them also."

The Library will regularly place new books in the Lilliput library.

Waipū or Waipu?

Lydia Draper emailed the Bream Bay News to say she had noticed that in some places: Te Ara New Zealand Encyclopedia and in the New Zealand Herald for example, Waipu is always spelt with a macron over the u.

Lydia said this got her thinking, "This is the correct way, yes? So why do we omit the macron in so many other places? Signage, media publications etc?"

NZ History list of 1,000 place names give a translation of Wai as water and pū (with the macron making it into a long vowel) as "reddish."

On the other hand pu with out the macron means bubbling-so Waipu could be bubbling water.

In recent years we have seen each summer the sea turn red at Waipu Cove, the prevailing currents and land forms seem to cause algal bloom which forms in Bream Bay to be captured and concentrated here. Perhaps this has been happening over the centuries accounting for the name Waipū. The algal bloom however might be caused by excessive nitrogen run off into the sea and there is another explanation in Te Ara Dictionary of Maori place names as to how this name came about.

"Koia i waiho ai hei ingoa mō tēnei matenga o Whena me tōna iwi, ko Te Moana waipū, arā te moana i whero i te toto. That's why, as a name for this slaughter of Whena and his people, it was called Te Moanawaipū (The Reddened Sea), that is the sea was red with blood."

Harry Midwood of Patuharakeke said, "none of us were alive when the name was coined so we can never be totally sure of its provenance."

He said the way the name is pronounced by most people with a short u vowel would make him tend to think the non-macron version is correct.

However, there were some major battles in the area so the reference in the Te Ara dictionary does have an air of authenticity. He said on gathering his thoughts "the mention of the sea being red with blood resonated with what I had learnt" as there are known to have been some major battles in the area.

He said, "I would now support the macron over the u; and although it is not a practice I employ (being an old stick in the mud), nevertheless it is a convention that, in this instance at least, ought to apply."

"As far as your mention of the red algae bloom that is around those parts and the recurrence over the years, I see your point, however as I say, the explanation as given in Te Ara dictionary does accord with Patuharakeke known histories."

Editor's note: The explanation from the Te Ara dictionary had the reference numbers W1971: 476 attached to it. I phoned: The Ministry of Culture and Heritage, Te Puni Kokiri and The Waitangi Tribunal to try to find out what this reference means but got no answer. I will keep trying.

Councillor Stolwerk back at the WDC service centre

Rick Stolwerk the Northland Regional Council's representative for the southern coastal ward (which incorporates Bream Bay) has now been told that he can once again use the Takutai Place Service Centre meeting room, just not during the election period from 12 July to 12 October.

He had previously been told that he could not use the room at all.

Last week Councillor Stolwerk received a letter from the Whangarei District Council's Chief Executive Rob Forlong telling him that the WDC staff appreciated his regular monthly sessions at the service centre as they could refer public enquires on Regional Council matters to him.

However, during the election period councilors cannot use Council assets to further their election chances. Councillor Stolwerk will be holding his next drop in session from 1030am – 11.30am back in the Service Centre meeting room.

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
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

Digging up the past at One Tree Point

Hāngī stones and charcoal, postholes from temporary shelters, a mysterious piece of chert and masses of cockle and pipi shell have all been unearthed in a week-long archeological dig at One Tree Point just north of the OTP Primary School.

The site is soon to be cleared of its peat and sand cover to make way for a WFH Fulton Hogan housing development.

An earlier archeological assessment had identified four areas of midden and a condition of the Fulton Hogan development is that a thorough archeological assessment of these be undertaken before the site is cleared.

Last Thursday a team of three archeologists working with representatives of Patuharakeke had excavated two of the identified midden sites to find an extensive layer of shell fairly close to the surface at both.

Lead archeologist on the project Ben Jones said the shell middens were not really a surprise as there was (until recently) a good resource of pipi and cockle beds nearby. He commented that all the midden were located in gullies.

Mr. Jones said the big lump of chert found in one of the middens would be sent to a laboratory to attempt to identify where it came from. The flat land at One Tree Point is formed on old sand dune and does not contain chert.

He said, "Perhaps the people here were getting this from trading somewhere down the line."

The piece was "a bit of a mystery" as, although it is clear that flakes have been hammered off it, none of these were to be found. As chert is very hard and sharp, flakes were used as cutting implements.

The hāngī stones would also be studied to try to find their origins.

Although none of the timber from those long ago shelters remains, their presence can be deduced from patterns of post holes filled with sand lighter in colour than the surrounding sandy peat soil.

Bags of shell and charcoal will be sent to a laboratory for carbon dating to establish out how old the middens are.

Ari Carrington, Resource Management coordinator for Patuharakeke said, the carbon dating is important to the Patuharakeke Hapū "as it helps build the cultural landscape and history of Patuharakeke. We can align our whakapapa (genealogy lines) as to who the Tūpuna were there at that time."

Mr. Jones said earlier archeological studies of this area have shown occupation to date back to around 1500 AD and it would be interesting to see if this site conformed to that pattern.

A third site identified in the earlier assessment drew a blank. The land here had a very flat appearance and there was a drain nearby, so possibly any midden here may have already been cleared away.

The team was about to get to work on a fourth area.

At the completion of the work the archeologists will prepare a report, which will be handed over to Heritage NZ. A list of accumulated archeological reports is available on line with the reports themselves available on request.

Mr. Jones said, "We can never know for sure the answers to the questions we have about all these finds. We can only make informed guesses. But it all helps to build up a picture of what settlement was like here all those centuries ago."
