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#### Get ready for big crowds this summer

Summer holidays are usually pretty busy in Bream Bay, but this year looks like breaking all the records. Ann-Marie Able, Manager of Bream Bay's biggest camp ground the Ruakaka Beach Holiday Park, with 350 sites and a capacity of around 2,100, said the camp was booked solid for the busiest time between 27 December to 6 January by the end of October, a month earlier than is usual.

Lucy Trist, manager at Camp Waipu Cove, said school holidays started earlier this summer and people are booking in for break at the beach now while there is still space available. Baring cancellations Camp Waipu Cove is booked out from Boxing Day right through until Auckland Anniversary Weekend on 26-28 January. At capacity Camp Waipu Cove holds around 1500 people.

Cindy Hosking, who manages the Ureitit Department of Conservation campground, said she has had to turn at least 300 people away for the optimum camping period at Uretiti from 26 December to 2 January. She is not sure where all those would be campers went instead. This camp has also been far busier than usual in the weeks before Christmas

"Camping is definitely on the rise", Cindy said.

She said it depends a lot on the weather and a couple of storms are expected to come through which might send some campers home earlier than they had planned. At capacity the Uretiti camp caters for 1000 people.

Add to this official freedom camping sites at Ruakaka Beach, the Waipu Caves and Marsden Bay, unofficial



# **Christmas parade showcased some of the great features of the Ruakaka community**

The Ruakaka Christmas Parade held on Saturday morning 15 December showcased some of the great features of the Ruakaka community.

The Ruakaka Fire Brigade was there with two of its trucks and some of its volunteers. There was a tinsel-decorated St John Ambulance along with St. John volunteers with baskets of lollies for the children who lined the roadway. Marsden Lions, which organizes the parade, had children with water pistols aimed at spectators and both the Ruakaka and One Tree Point Primary School floats had children waving. One Tree Point School - A great Kiwi school" were the words emblazoned on a banner

The Bream Bay College students in the school's steel pan band, The Panimals beat out their celebratory rhythms from the back of a truck and parents, children and teachers from the Ruakaka Educare pre-school centre crowded onto the deck of a big Toll curtain-sider.

Two proud flag bearers marched in front of a Ruakaka Scouts float and there was a colourful entry from the Marsden Yacht and Boat Club with a big sign inviting people to join its *Learn to Sail* programme.

A float some may have been wondering about was from The *Takahiwai Friends of the Berm*. This consisted of a black station wagon covered in ferns and road cones towing a trailer with a sign which read "Caution road clean up in progress". Hanging from the trailer were old milk bottles, plastic bags and other bits of rubbish members of this group habitually pick up from the roadside. There were chainsaws used to clear away weeds and in the trailer was a selection of fruit trees

they plan to plant in their place.

The work of this neighbourhood group gets my vote as one of the best things to have happened in Bream Bay this year. The Takahiwai neighbours successfully lobbied for signage to warn traffic about the presence of people walking and riding bicycles and horses on their road. They tided up two school bus shelters and enlisted the help of children from One Tree Point Primary School to paint colourful murals on them and they hold regular roadside clean ups.

Sue Tisdall, one of the members, told me proudly that Takahiwai Rd. has been judged by Council staff as the cleanest in the whole of the Ruakaka area.

I think the *Takahiwa Friends of the Bern* have developed a model that we could all adapt to the roads we live on. I have done quite a bit of ranting about the laziness, stupidity and selfishness of people who treat the world as a rubbish bin but where does that get you? Those people are unlikely to listen and change their ways.

You can hold big public rubbish collections on the messiest roads or agitate and get Council or NZTA staff to come out and do clean ups but two weeks later there are more chip packets, coffee cups, drink bottles, cans, plastic bags, tissues and baby wipes etc. strewn about. It takes community ongoing commitment to really make a difference.

Are there any other neighbourhoods in Bream Bay with enough people feed up with the mess to follow this wonderful example?

#### Kids are smarter than we were

As Christmas is almost upon us, I thought it time to look at a few things from this year and maybe reflect on them. Firstly, how refreshing to read a recent letter suggesting we let kids do the things on the beach that we enjoyed when growing up. Are they really doing any harm? Kids seem to have a few clues these days, so if refuge areas are clearly identified they will usually be respectful. They are smarter than we were, just look at the majority who have the sense not to smoke etc.

When we look at the actions of people like Ms. Margaret Hicks (I assume she is a Ms), who believes lifestyle blocks are a blot on the landscape. The problem with a lifestyle block is that they attract lots of native birds for their owners family to appreciate, but you don't get any free curtains in the deal. It seems to me that she is happy to feed stray cats that kill native birds, but it seems the only way she will ever be happy is for no people to be allowed on the beach at all. Earlier in the year she blamed the people who live in Princes Rd. for spring tides flooding. They cannot control nature. The progress association removed mangroves both legally and with historic photographic evidence of improvement elsewhere. This was a huge, labour intensive task done by volunteers in the belief of tidying up a popular picnic area. Good effort for my money.

It is good that people like her are keen to preserve some ideals, but not at the cost of stopping the people from leisure hours, no doubt well earned.

I congratulate all those people devoted to the cycle/walking tracks around our coast, but let's not lose focus on everything else.

Lastly, unusually, I do believe Peter Hope is correct when he suggests many campers do indeed bring their spending to the area. The age group he refers to are usually older and very respectful of their surroundings and required standards. The only problem I still believe is major, is the lack of rubbish facilities where camping is popular. If you are heading south with no idea where to go, Uretiti waste transfer station has no signage on SH1. If you are a tourist, where are you supposed to put your waste? We suggest all campers use transfer stations, but good luck finding the local depot if you are not local. If it wasn't for irresponsible locals dumping household waste, we could afford to have more bins. I trust everyone has a safe and happy Christmas. Cheers.


# **Every culture should celebrate its** heritage

Every culture should celebrate their heritage and each culture should appreciate the other. It is worth noting here that the Nova Scotian migrants chose this area to settle, not only

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# Longtime volunteer for Ruakaka Fire Brigade is Ruakaka's 2018 Citizen of the Year

Long time member of the Ruakaka Volunteer Fire Brigade, Terry Baylis is the 2018 Ruakaka Citizen of the Year.

Terry joined the brigade in November 1976, so has clocked up 42 years of service to the community.

Within the brigade Terry is a peer support person offering firefighters someone to talk to after they have attended disturbing incidents.

His community work includes: taking part in Fire Brigade displays at school gala days, installing smoke alarms in private homes, teaching fire safety throughout the community including taking the Firewise programme to local schools.

Since 200 he has been a Fire year's winner Peter White Awareness Intervention Prac-

titioner educating young people with a propensity to light fires about the dangers of fire, the speed it spreads, and how easily accidents happen.

The Ruakaka Library Committee received eight nominations for this year's award.

The other six nominees were:

- Jackie Boyd who founded Ruakaka Dog Rescue, which works to educate and support dog owners in Ruakaka
- Tracey Collins who has set up four Sharing Sheds in One Tree Point, Ruakaka and Waipu where people can drop off surplus produce and help themselves to whatever is in the stall.
- Jo Hindley, who is an AA driving instructor and in her spare time volunteers to provide driving lessons for local young people.

- Ngaire Kramer, who was until recently the local co-ordinator of the Linking Hands service which transports people who have no means of transport to medical appointments. Ngaire remains as a volunteer driver for this service.
- Kirstin Orr, who runs Bream Bay Ballet and teaches dance classes for local children four and sometimes five nights a week and every year puts on a dance production in full costume for the community to enjoy.
- Bobby-Jo Paikea, who was the instigator of the Villy Day Out, where all the food and games were free. Billy –Jo wanted to give the Marsden Village a happy time to come together as a community after a number of sad events and funerals it had experienced this year.
- Graham Allen, a dedicated volunteer for Coastguard Whangarei.

camping sites at Mair Rd., in the carpark alongside the refinery and the roadside rest area at Uretiti, usually vacant holiday homes in full use and tents on front lawns, people are likely to be queuing at the grocery stores and driving around searching for car parking spaces in Ruakaka and Waipu.

The 2018 census figures are not yet available but in

2013 the total resident population of Bream Bay including: One Tree Point, Ruakaka, Waipu and the rural surrounding areas was 6,099. This figure is expected to have grown over the intervening five years but, even so, 4,600 plus extra people is a significant boost to the local population.

because there was enough land to accommodate them as a group, but also because they would not be displacing anyone, as they had been displaced in their homeland. Waipu is an historic village and this is one of the reasons that new people are drawn here. The museum and its story attract many visitors seeking their connectedness with our history. Surely it would therefore be better to build on its historic aspects. As far as the Hammer Hardware building is concerned, a far better use for and by the community might be a drop-in centre for young people, which could perhaps incorporate free Wi-Fi and activities such as martial arts training. I'm sure there are many other practical ideas for learning and exercise, homework help, etc. for our young people that others in the community would be happy to supervise in this space.

Museums have a very specific core purpose - that is to protect a story and house a collection of documents and objects, and most unique of all in this case, the enormous family tree that is the genealogy database. This is the living, breathing heart of the Waipu House of Memories, which has put it on the world map and is keeping it there. It has ultimately earned a coveted "Memory of the World" UNESCO listing, no small feat!

We must consider the most popular consultation option of a single-site museum extension. We need to return to the plans that have been on the drawing board for a number of years and which make much more sense for our village. We need to minimise staff, volunteer and operational costs which will be substantially increased by operating two sites.

We need to extend to the back of the museum, and grow the heritage precinct as well. Develop that which enhances our unique story!

We need to take heed and learn lessons from others' mistakes, and for that we do not have to look far.

Two more Sharing Sheds have been set up in Bream Bay.

Waipu now has a Sharing Shed, located outside the Waipu Playcentre in St Mary's Road and a second Ruakaka shed has been placed at the front gate of Ruakaka School on Sandford Rd. just off State Highway One.

People are invited to drop off fresh produce or other food items they have a surplus of and to take what they need from the stalls.

Since October Sharing Sheds have been in place outside the Lifepoint Church in One Tree Point Rd. and outside the Bream Bay Community Trust in Takutai Place, Ruakaka.

Tracey Collins, who instigated this project in Bream Bay, won a nomination to the Ruakaka Citizen of the Year Awards for this initiative.

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#### Northport maintenance dredging in January

Maintenance dredging will get underway for Northport on January 7. Work to remove sediment build-up in the ship turning basin near Snake Bank, along Northport's linear berth and at Refining NZ's Jetty 1 berth pocket will continue for most of the month.

Northport stressed that the work has nothing to do with either its vision for growth, unveiled earlier this year, or Refining NZ's proposed channel deepening programme.

"The operation will be highly visible so we wanted to head off at the pass any concerns that it has anything to do with either of those projects," said Jon Moore, chief executive of Northport Ltd.

"It is purely to bring the depth of these operational areas at the harbour entrance back down to consented levels."

This is the first dredging the port has undertaken in

17 years.

The work will be carried out by Dutch Dredging NZ using a specialist trailing suction hopper dredger, the Albatros, which is being brought up to Whangarei Harbour from Nelson.

Boaties are asked to give the dredging operation a wide berth. The Albatros will be displaying the international navigation day shapes for a vessel engaged in dredging operations and therefor restricted in its ability to manoeuvre; ball, diamond, ball and two black balls at the side on which vessels must not pass. The vessel will only be operating during daylight hours.

The Albatros will be pumping dredging spoil ashore at the western end of Northport's linear berth. Some of this material will be used by Northport as landfill for its southwest development project

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#### It's taking a while for Waipu to get back to normal after the fire

It's taking a while for Waipu to get back to nor- gestion of cars in front of the new chemist mal after the fire that destroyed three shops in the town in the early hours of Sunday 30 September.

The Waipu Pharmacy has re-opened in temporary premises behind the Waipu Bakery. A fire. The ANZ bank has been searching building was relocated here for the purpose at the end of October by Louise and Paul Wickham and Angela and Rick Stolwerk whose company, The Centre Waipu, owns land and buildings across the road from the big hold in the town left by the fire.

The Ministry of Health issued a license for a pharmacy to operate out of this building on Thursday 13 December and the pharmacy has now reopened, which must be a great relief to pharmacist Brenda Wells, who has been driving up to Russell each day to make up prescriptions at a pharmacy she co-owns there.

The building owners, however, are concerned that it could get chaotic if customers attempted to drive up the access way to the new chemist and then have to back out onto the main street. Louise Wickham said, "We want to stress that parking in front of the new pharmacy is for tenants only and that we ask everyone to respect this for the safety of the pedestrians who will be walking in this area as well as avoiding con-

building."

An ANZ Automated Teller Machine (ATM) machine, which was located outside the pharmacy, was destroyed in the for an alternative location and has agreed to install a new machine outside the Wild Tiger specialty food and gift shop at the eastern end of the town.

Siobhan Enright of the ANZ said the new machine would be installed this Friday 21 December.

The town has also been without its electric car charging station since the fire. The station was connected to a Spark public telephone booth outside the pharmacy. The fire destroyed the Chorus phone line to the phone booth, and the power to the booth was disconnected as a result.

Last week Nathan Beaumont, a media contact person for Chorus, confirmed Chorus had completed repairs to the telecommunications part of this and the phone is now working.

However, the charging stations is yet to be switched back on.

There were 11 family harm incidents in the period from 3 December to 17 December


#### Two extra police officers

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

#### McLeods Breweries pledges ten years of sponsorship for the Waipu Highland Games

McLeod's beer is now sold nation wide and the brewery has been named in the top three breweries in New Zealand Brewers Guild of New Zealand for two years in a row



#### **Beach Ambassadors needed**

We are looking to recruit Beach Ambassadors for this summer season which begins on the 22 of December running for a couple of months.

Ambassadors will have training around use of the Gator, identifying dangerous sea conditions and responding to emergencies. Ambassadors are not encouraged to enter the ocean to save lives but rather be the point of contact at the scene relaying vital information to emergency services

The key roles of the Ambassador are around prevention and education. To assist with this we have safety

pamphlets in Chinese, English and Korean.

The hands on personal approach is what makes this initiative work.

A typical patrol will start with logging on at the Ruakaka Surf Club where the Gator is kept. From there patrolling along the beach stopping and talking to groups and individuals handing out pamphlets and advising on beach safety and etiquette.

The Patrol shift begins around 9.00am and ends at 1.00pm. The next shift runs from 1.00pm through to about 5.00pm.

We are looking for a commitment of four to six shifts over the summer season. Some patrollers may be able to contribute more than that, there is some flexibility around these shifts.

DOC Technical Advisor Threats Tony Beauchamp said,"This breeding season has been disrupted by a higher number of lows across the central Tasman that have delivered repeated high wind events. Last year we had five chicks fledge but we are likely to have fewer chicks this season."

#### Stories at the Ruakaka Library

There will be four story time sessions at the Ruakaka Libirary over the summer holidays.

On four Friday mornings on 11,18 and 25 January and then on 1 February from 10.30am in the morning for around half an hour there will be story reading by some local book lovers.

Stories will be aimed at under eightyear-olds but one of the readers, Janet Woodward says they can adapt what they read to the types of children who turn up.

Parents are welcome to stay and it is recommended they do stay if their children are pre-schoolers.

Janet is a professional storyteller. She was once employed by the

London Borough of Lambeth to tell stories to children in local parks.

Janet said it was the strangest of interviews. She climbed up to the top floor of the Council building where the audition was held in a room that was bare but for a few chairs.

"I was asked to tell a story and so I did. I was a solo mother at the time and I really needed the job."

What story did she tell – "The emperors new clothes."

The job entailed going to parks in the borough and calling out to nearby children inviting them to come over to hear a story. There were four story tellers in total each with their own repertoire.

Janet recalls taking her four-year-old son along on one story telling venture and him complaining very publicly when she told the same story twice on the same day.

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# Pourāhui to mark boundaries of Mair and Marsden Banks shellfish taking ban

The Patuharakeke Te Iwi Trust's Rohe Moana Committee has been working on signage and pourāhui (decorative posts) to mark the boundaries of the area at and around Mair and Marsden Banks, which has a legal closure on the taking of shellfish. These were due to be installed at a ceremony on Wednesday afternoon 19 December. People will be able to judge that when they have walked past one of the pourāhui on the beach, they have entered the no-take area.

On 28 June 2018 the Ministry of Fisheries gave formal notice that the gathering of any species of shell-fish including: pipi, mussel, tuatua, crab, octopus and squid from a defined area on and surrounding the banks is prohibited for at least two years under

Section 186A of the Fisheries Act.

Over the past ten years pipi, which were once plentiful on the two banks, have declined in numbers by more than two thirds. Research has not yet come up with a conclusive reason for this decline.

Patuharakeke, along with NIWA (the National Institute of Water and Atmosphere) and others have been monitoring pipi health and populations annually and find that although a rāhui (customary closure) on the taking of pipi has been in place since 2011 on Marsden Bank and on the wider area including both Mair and Marsden Banks since 2014, the beds haven't recovered sufficiently to reopen them for harvest.

Moreover, in November 2015 a healthy adult popula-

tion of kūtai (mussels) had regenerated after many decades on the northwestern part of Mair and Marsden Banks. However by the end of 2016 most of this colony had been completely harvested.

Patuharakeke believe that closing the area will allow a robust and sustainable mussel population to re-establish, which will then be less vulnerable to harvest pressure.

Fishing for finfish is still permitted in the area and, while vehicles are permitted to drive on the beach alongside, Patukakeke request that visitors please avoid driving on the pipi beds.

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


