Sand dredging would destroy Bream Bay's recovering scallop fishery

If McCallum Brothers bring their sand dredge into Bream Bay it will put an end to the scallop fishery here say several commercial scallop fishermen.

Brad and Dagny Leggott of the Whangārei based company Fish to Fish said after having been prevented from trawling for scallops here when a moratorium was placed on the fishery two years ago it would be very annoying to say the least if an Auckland company is now permitted to come in and excavate sand.

Patrick Chaplin, who has been a fisherman for 45 years, supplementing his west coast wet fish catch with trawling for scallops between Bream Head and Mangawhai said after the McCallum sand barge went to work off Mangawhai there were no longer any scallops to be found there. He saw in his boats depth sounder where the dredge had made huge rectangular holes in the seafloor sometimes around half a kilometre long and leaving logs that had been buried exposed on the sea floor. Mr. Chaplin has made a huge personal sacrifice in the interests of saving the fishery. His own surveys and those of other scallop fishers had indicated the fishery was healthy and capable of sustaining continued commercial harvest. Based on this evidence, which was supplied to the Ministry of Primary Industry Mr. Chaplin took out a loan to purchase a second trawler and lost

EDITORIAL

What's wrong with the assertions made in The Treaty Principles Bill?

Did I hear this correctly? I was cooking dinner while watching, or mostly just listening, to the TVNZ news one night last week and thought I heard the results of one of those text in polls being announced. The question that had been put was, "Do you support the Hīkoi mō te Tiriti? The result was 56% "no" and 44 % "yes".

I have been trying to hunt this down but can't find it anywhere. Perhaps I was mistaken but I wouldn't be surprised if this was the result of such a poll.

David Seymour's Treaty Principles Bill might have more support than it would seem from listening to or reading media reports. This is certainly the impression I get with my ear to the ground around here.

When it comes time for public submissions on the Treaty Principles Bill those of us who follow the TV news and read the mainstream newspapers might be taken by surprise as we were by the re-election of Donald Trump as President of the United States.

What's wrong with the assertions set out in principal 3 of Mr. Seymour's bill: "Everyone is equal before the law. Everyone is entitled, without discrimination, to the equal protection and equal benefit of the law; and the equal enjoyment of the same fundamental human rights"?

Or those set out under Principal 1:"The Parliament of New Zealand has full power to make laws, in the best interests of everyone; and in accordance with the rule of law and the maintenance of a free and democratic society." Are these ideas so terrible?

I am not sure though that they need to be articulated under the heading of *The Treaty Principles Bill.* This is neadlessy antagonistic. Couldn't we just have a set of principles about the rights of all New Zealanders without making it seem like a challenge to Māori rights under Te Tiriti or are these two sets of presumed rights incompati-

ble? I sincerely hope they are not I heard Nick Smith, the Mayor of Nelson and a former Minister of Conservation in the John Key Government, on Q and A a few weeks ago. He said he could appreciate that many New Zealanders hold strong and sincere beliefs in democracy and equality of opportunity. Then he said we also need to recognize and adhere to the Treaty of Waitangi. He commented that this debate needs to be toned down a peg or two with more respect for opposing viewpoints.

He said scallop fishers working in Bream Bay had voluntarily made substantial reductions in their catch take in order to keep the fishery going. McCullum Brothers Ltd. a sand dredging company based in Rosebank Rd. in Avondale, Auckland is applying under the Coalition Governments Fast Track legislation for a 35 year consent to dredge sand from the seabed of Bream Bay

Replacement of decaying Kepa Rd sewer pipes an unexpected multi million dollar expense for the Whangārei District Council

The replacement of leaking sewer pipes in Kepa Rd. has turned into an unexpected multi million dollar expense for the Whangārei District Council. A major project is now underway to replace 300 metres of decaying concrete pipes with new 450cm PVC pipes. The old pipes are 300cm in diameter.

There have been a number of sewer spills in the Kepa Rd. area over the past few years due to the condition of the pipes and manholes. The high water table in the area due to the heavy and constant rain of 2022 and 2023 hasn't helped the situation.

Simon Charles, the Council's Waste and Drainage Manager, attended the Ruakākā Residents and Ratepayers meeting with Council wastewater engineer Paul Alexander on Tuesday 12 November to explain what was happening.

He said a Silverdale Based Company CDS had been granted the contract for the job. A fenced off worksite alongside the new Ruakākā Recreation Centre contained a directional drilling rig which would be used to prepare a tunnel to pull the new pipes through. He explained the project is a challenging one, as the Kepa Rd. area is very flat and it is critically important to get the gradient right.

Mr. Alexander said there had been several attemps to break into the site and he asked local people to keep an eye on the situation and to report any suspicious behaviour to the Police. He said a major concern is vandalism of the work in progress.

The pipes would be coated in a clay mixture to make it easier for them to be pulled into the prepared tunnel.

Mr. Alexander said the expected life of concrete sewer pipes is 100 years and the Kepa Rd pipes are only around 50 years old. He showed photographs of the pitted interior surface of the old pipes and said it is possible that this might be due to some prohibited substance being flushed through them.

However Keith Newey, who owns and operates a truck depot in the area, said he thought a more likely cause was the quality of the product used.

Ruakākā Wastewater Treatment plant approaching its consented capacity

Mr. Charles also spoke about the upgrade of the Ruakaka wastewater treatment plant.

He said due to rapid development in Ruakākā and One Tree Point the plant is reaching its capacity at a faster rate than was anticipated and it is necessary for the

Whangārei District Council to start work on the design and build of the plant's upgrade including new treated wastewater disposal option if it is not to breach the plant's resource consent.

The current plant is consented to receive a maximum of

There are some measures we can take such as putting in some additional aerators to increase the plant's capacity but disposal of the treated wastewater is an issue.

The proposed new plant with an ocean outfall disposal system already has consents in place and this is the basis that Ruakākā and One Tree Point Development has been permitted to continue. However the consent has 106 conditions attached to it, one of these being to explore every alternative

means of treated wastewater disposal before opting for the ocean outfall.

Mr. Charles said it would be difficult to find a necessary 300 to 400 hectares of land in the vicinity, which would be needed for a disposal site. He said discussions are being held with Meridian energy, which has land nearby for the development of its solar farm but after the closure of the Marsden Point Oil Refinery the Council is wary of relying on an industry "which 25 years down the track may be out of vogue."

Asked about the quality of the wastewater that would go into the ocean, Mr. Charles said it would be treated to a very high level, although not to the level of drinking water, which has a very high requirement He said it would be a treated to a higher level than what comes out of the Kioreroa Road plant.

Councillor Couper said the water would be treated to a higher level than that in most domestic water tanks. The sum of \$80 million has been allocated in the Council's Long Term Plan for the new plant and treated wastewater disposal system.

Asked how this amount would be raised, Councillor Halse said the Council holds considerable funds raised from development contributions and the largest part of the \$80million would come from this source.

Keeping Channel Infrastructure oil recovery systems clean the best way to protect seagulls nesting nearby

Channel Infrastructure is making an effort to keep seagulls from getting coated in oil in its oil interception pond.

Laura Malcolm of Channel Infrastructure said, "Despite having tried different options over many years, there isn't much we can do to stop the gulls nesting in sensitive areas on our site. However we have a standard cleaning protocol to keeping the oil recovery systems clear and free of oil, which is an ongoing process and can be impacted, among other things, by inclement weather.

"The birds are protected so there is only so much we can do – and we have tried all of the usual mechanisms, from scarecrows through to water spray, to discourage them from nesting on our site. At one point, we even received permission from DOC to remove their nests and eggs but even that didn't work. The most effective thing we can do, and what we are now focused on, is keeping the oil interceptors clean.

She said,"It's worth remembering that they (the seagulls) have chosen to nest in our stormwater basin due to how clean, well maintained, and safe the area is for their breeding."

Department of Conservation's senior Whangārei Ranger Nigel Miller commented,"We appreciate

the complex nature of the situation, and the efforts Channel Infrastructure have taken to try and fix the problem. As Channel Infrastructure has noted, the birds are protected, and we are working through our compliance / legal process. In the meantime, we will continue to monitor the situation and the birds"

Closure of Sime Rd dump station causes problems for motor home travellers Council staff considering a temporary station at Marsden Bay

The temporary closure of the Sime Rd. dump station while the sewer lines there are being replaced is causing problems for motor home users.

Alan Alcock said at the Ruakākā Resident and Ratepayers meeting last week that driving his motorhome north the recently he had found the Warkworth dump station to be out of action, leaving him no alternative but to drive up to the Kioreroa Rd. station in Whangārei to empty his motorhome holding tank.


Mr. Alcock said a solution to this problem would need to be found before the busy summer holiday season

begins.

Peter Hope commented that the access into a dump station at Langs Beach was so narrow that anything larger than a pram would not fit.

Andy Keith, the Whangārei District Council's Wastewater and Stormwater Operations Manager, has meanwhile proposed setting up a temporary caravan disposal alongside the public toilets in the Marsden Bay reserve.

Mr. Keith said, once he gets a green light he could have this set up in a week.

Request for Share the Road signs on Waipu rural roads



The Waipu Residents and Ratepayers Association has asked the Whangārei District Council for Share the Road signs like the sign on Takahiwai Rd. for Shoemaker Rd. and South Rd., both of which are well used by cyclists and occasionally by horse riders.

Any progress on the Ruakākā Cemetery?

When will the Whangārei District Council get to work on the establishment of the Ruakākā Cemetery?

This question was put to Councillors Phil Halse and Ken Couper at the Ruakākā Resident and Ratepayers November meeting last week.

Warren Daniel said from the latest census figures there are now 8,000 people living in the Ruak $\bar{a}k\bar{a}$ and One Tree Point areas and a community of this size should have a cemetery. Councillor Halse pointed out that 75% of people opt for cremation rather than burial.

Mr. Daniel replied that there really should be some simple facility for local people The Whangārei District Council purchased land alongside One Tree Point Rd. near the intersection with Port Marsden Highway from Bruce and Gay Cann in 2023. The then Manager of Parks and Recreation Sue Hodge told the Bream Bay News in May 2023, "Yes, we now own the land. I have scheduled a design meeting for stage 1 next week so I can't say what is being developed or how much it will cost. Budget in 2023/2024 is \$374,000. This will fund detail design and any un-spent budget will be carried forward. We will complete the works in the 24/25 financial year ready for burials we hope in 2024."

The Councillors told the meeting the hold up was because of NZ Rail, which had not determined the route of the rail spur to Marsden Point. They gave assurances that money for this project is allocated in the Council's Long Term Plan

The sum of S970,000 has been allocated in the WDC's Parks budget for development of the Ruakākā Cemetery so we asked the Council's new Parks and Recreation Manager Louis Rattray about how the establishment of the cemetery was going.

He said the landscape architecture firm Littoralis and an engineer have been engaged to undertake the design, however progress has been delayed while the Council negotiates with Kiwirail, which requires a portion of the land for the rail corridor. However he said, "We should still have design completed by end of this financial

year. There is capital budget in Year 2 of the Long Term Plan (2025/2026) for construction to start. We anticipate the first burials from 2026/27."

The Whangārei District Council's current financial year will end on June 30 2025.

Home owners frustrated at lack of justice over what they see as theft of part of their land by Eb Developments



The homeowner came home from work to find topsoil from their land was scrapped away, to leave it below the level of the road and car parking area alongside



The owners of a house alongside a subdivision in Marsden Bay are feeling frustrated by a lack of justice over what they see as theft of part of their land by Eb Developments, which has a 20 lot subdivision underway alongside their home in One Tree Point.

One of the owners (whose jobs in the public sector prevent them being named in this article) returned from work in February 2023 and was stunned to find the fences along their southern and north western boundary had been removed and top soil from 3 metres of the land inside their southern and 1.5 metres of land on the northwestern boundary had been scraped away to a level below their garage foundations to allow for Eb Developments to construct the new private road and concreted parking area alongside. There had been no consultation with the homeowners prior to this happening.

With the land now falling away sharply at the end of a wooden deck the homeowners can no longer use this area as part of their garden. In heavy rain, stormwater floods onto their property and under their home. Eb Developments has built a small bund adjacent to the southern boundary in an attempt to mitigate this problem.

Eb Developments are now proposing to build a 1.8 metre high fence to replace the

fencing, which was removed, but the homeowners say this will hem them in and block light and sunshine. One of the homeowners uses a walking frame and the deck is important to her being able to access the outdoors.

The couple, ask what is the difference between stealing a bicycle and stealing the topsoil from our land? However when they made a complaint to the Police they were told this was a civil matter and Police could not get involved. While in an email from the Whangārei District Council acknowledged in an email "Earthworks have been undertaken across the boundary of your section to create a level section," but then further advised the couple, "This is not an RMA issue, but a civil matter." The homeowners point out that building consents for the Eb subdivision were issued by the WDC

The Eb Developments website claims that the company "builds communities."

Property owners living alongside the One Tree Point development say that the company's lack of consultation and consideration for neighbours belies this claim. The Bream Bay News phoned and emailed Eb Developments inviting the company to comment on this article and advising of the deadline but had not received a reply at the time of sending the paper to the printer on Monday afternoon. 18 November.

Update on Meridian Energy's Ruakākā projects

Rebecca Knott, Meridian Energy's Head of Renewable Development:

Has advised, "Work on Meridian Energy's battery energy storage system continues at pace. Operations will commence in early 2025 and in preparation for this we now have a full-time site manager in place.

now have a full-time site manager in place. She said, "We hope to begin construction of the solar farm and to enhance the resilience of Northland's energy system. While we are currently addressing two appeals in the Environment Court first, we are hopeful of a positive outcome."

The Northland Regional Council granted resource consent for the 172 hectare solar farm to be built alongside State Highway 15, McCathie Road, Marsden Point Road and Rama Road in September. • The Royal Forest and Bird Society's has lodgedan appeal on the grounds that the solar farm should not be built within a wetland area and that there is no functional need for the solar farm to extend into this area. Meridian has proposed to create 18.86ha of wetland across the three sites to offset the permanent removal of these wetlands

• Shaun Erikson has lodged an appeal concerned that there will not be proper monitoring or mitigation of a "heat island" the solar farm could generate.

More than 4,000 more people now living in Bream Bay since 2013

Its pretty plain to most of us who live here that the population of Bream Bay has beengrwoing quite a lot.

The 2023 census figures for areas such as Waipu and Ruakaka are now available and show the population over the whole of Bream Bay has increased by 1818 since 2018. Based on 2013 census figures there are now an additional 4,179 people living here.

. Waipu's population (as measured by the 2023 census) was 3,261 with 1,392 living in the Waipu urban area and 1,892 living in what is termed Rural Waipu but includes Waipu Cove and Langs Beach. The 2023 census counted 8,407 people living in the rest of Bream Bay including Ruakākā and One Tree Point.

The proportion of those over the age of 65years

was 19%, which is a just above the national average for which is 16.6%. However in One Tree Point the proportion of people over the age of 65 years was 30.4% and in the Waipu urban area the proportion or retirement aged people was 41.4%.

The 2023 census found 28.9 % of people living in the Waipu rural area were over the age of 65 years and, in Ruakākā, the proportion of people in this age group was 26.5%.

Looking at the figures for those under the age of 15 years Bream Bay and One Tree Point recorded 18.6 % in this age bracket, Ruakākā recorded 17.8%, the Waipu urban area 13.8% and Waipu Rural -13.6%. The Infometrics website gives the qualification that these figures only measure the people who filled out their census forms or were able to be imputed from other administrative data sources.



Certificate in Fencing (Level 4) - Ben Fisher

"I decided to do the course to support the idea, it's pretty new and there hasn't been accreditation for fencers before," says Ben Fisher, NorthTec graduate. "It's helpful to be accredited for many reasons. It shows you know what you're doing and can give the client peace of mind."

Ben was already self-employed running his own fencing business, but that didn't mean there weren't things to learn.

"The tutors were great. They had great insights into the industry and a lot of experience to pass on. It was also great to meet others that are in the same industry to connect and network."

"The course is mostly online and that made it easy to fit in around my work and family. I'm not really a computer person, but I managed to figure it out so I think it would be pretty accessible to most people."

St. John volunteer Rocky Powell - Its rewarding to be able to help people on the worst day of their lives By Carole Munford

Rocky (Rochelle) Powell's family couldn't be prouder of her – and for good reason.

In 2021, Rocky found herself as a bystander at a roadside cardiac arrest.

The following day, one of the responders reached out to check in on her. Though Rocky has always had a strong drive to help others, she expressed her frustration at not being able to assist that day.

Sensing her genuine desire to make a difference, the responder suggested she consider joining Hato Hone St John as a volunteer ambulance officer. The invitation resonated with Rocky.

With four young boys at home, Rocky had thought about volunteering in the past, especially with her neighbour – already a Hato Hone St John volunteer – encouraging her. However, it was this cardiac arrest experience that became the true catalyst for her to take action.

"Having my family's support was essential," says Rocky.

"Knowing my boys are in safe hands allows me to fully commit to the job."

After completing her training and studies, Rocky was partnered with experienced ambulance officers and took her first shift.

Her first call-out was unforgettable: responding to a patient trapped in a difficult situation.

"Being able to comfort, reassure, and ultimately transport that person safely to the hospital was incredibly rewarding," she recalls.

Rocky finds profound fulfillment in helping people "on the worst day of their lives." The look of relief on a patient's face when the ambulance crew arrives is immensely satisfying, she says. The role requires both mental and physical resilience, and Rocky appreciates

the unwavering support from her team to maintain that strength.

"We have the most amazing team here," Rocky says, with clear admiration.

"Everyone understands the highs and lows of the job, and we all support each other. Working through challenges together is so gratifying."

Rocky usually aims to complete two shifts a week, though there's no pressure if she can't. She and her team also deliver the 3 Steps for Life programme in the community, a free, one-hour workshop that familiarises the public with CPR, defibrillator use, and ways to assist an ambulance crew in an emergency.






