Is there support for a regular Bream **Bay to Whangarei** bus service?

The Northland Regional Council is considering trialing a CityLink bus service to Ruakaka and Waipu as well as to Hikurangi and Whangarei Heads.

These trials would cost Whangarei District ratepayers each an extra \$2.50 per year, so will need to have public support if they are to go ahead.

Asked how the proposed bus trial to Ruakaka and Waipu would operate, Dean Mitchell, the NRC's Transport Project Officer said to begin with this would likely be a shoppers bus making two return trips a week.

Perhaps a bus run from Waipu and then through Ruakaka on to Whangarei on Tuesdays and Thursdays from 9.30am and then a return trip leaving Whangarei at 2.30pm. People need to realize this is not a taxi service and you need to plan your day around the bus timetable. We would need more than just one or two people using it to keep in running."

He said the trip is likely to take around 45 minutes to an hour each way so people are unlikely to choose the bus over their private cars.

Mr. Mitchell said, if Bream Bay people want this service, they should "take the time to speak up." The proposal is part of the Northland Regional Council Long Term Plan, which is open for submissions until 17 April.

Isa Inui was horrified when she learned that the stand of totara trees behind the Indian Restaurant at the corner of The Centre and South Rd in central Waipu was being cut down.

Council, the Urban Tree Alliance, Greenpeace and anyone else she could think of but found the 17 large totara had no legal protection.

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EDITORIAL

Local children are lucky to have people who support them

With the Pukapuka Party in Ruakaka on Saturday and the Take Kid Fishing morning at the Waipu Boat and Fishing Club on Sunday, last weekend was all about children.

This is refreshing, as with so many retirees moving here and multiple retirement villages being built in the area, it can sometimes seem like the balance of young and old has got a bit out of kilter.

Both the Pukapuka Party and the Take a Kid Fishing morning were actually about adults interacting with children. I believe children need lots of responsible adult input. The more careful guidance and affection children can get from those who have lived a bit longer than them the better. I think a laissez faire – (go outside and play with your mates and don't come back to bother me until tea time) attitude to bringing up children leads to disaster.

Our local children are lucky to have so many older adults who are prepared to spend time with them and to support them in so many ways (including the many businesses which donated all those goodie bags at the Pukapuka Party and prizes at the fishing day). I am sure the adults enjoy the interaction as well.

While I don't think this is a fight she can win but I admire the courage and insight of our tree warrior Isa Inui who sat on the stump of a large totara tree, one of 17 in a grove, which has been chain-sawed down behind the Indian restaurant in Waipu. Isa sat there preventing the last trees being felled until Constable Martin Geddes issued her with a trespass notice.

Trees are important. Big old, majestic trees have a life and value of their own that goes beyond human values. Cutting down even one such tree, let alone 17, should not be taken lightly.

With land values as high as they are and residential sections getting smaller and smaller there is no longer space for people to plant trees around their homes, especially not trees that will grow to any size. If we are to continue to enjoy trees in urban areas we need parks to plant them in. It is a bit disturbing then to see, in the same week as we lose those 17 big totara, what was marked as a recreational reserve on the Nova Scotia estate up for sale for subdivision into six house lots. Elderly people or people with busy lives perhaps don't

want to be bothered with big sections to look after but are likely to enjoy sitting or walking in a park now and then. I think, if developers are to be allowed to sub-divide land into smaller and smaller lots, then the payback should be areas set aside and planted in trees. What do you think about this latest addition to the informal car park and ride area at the Ruakaka State Highway One roundabout? First impressions count and what a great introduction for people arriving in the Whangarei District either being dropped off by bus or calling in to the adjacent petrol station to see this mess! This abandoned vehicle has been in this state at this location for at least three weeks. I really wish our local authorities would demonstrate some leadership here and reach an agreement with the landowner that this area has potential as a useful public amenity. If it were kept tidy and secure with some CCTV coverage then more people might be encouraged to car pool or use public transport which is something I think both the Whangarei District and Northland Regional Councils have an interest in promoting.

Car racing and drifting on Peter **Snell Rd. raises** safety concerns for children

Peter Snell Rd. is being used for drifting and car racing and there are concerns for the safety of the many children who play on the street.

Mirella Aprea and Linda Wells told Whangarei District Councillors and staff at the public meeting on the Council's Long Term Plan in the Ruakaka Recreation Centre on Tuesday 13 March, that some form of traffic slowing engineering is urgently needed for the street.

Mirella said Peter Snell Rd. is wide enough for four lanes and this seems to encourage dangerous driving.

Mirella said some of the people who indulge in this have children themselves but don't seem to care about the danger they are putting them and their neighbours children in.

"Children are playing on the street, sometimes until quite late at night and it is easy to imagine a car leaving the road and ending up on the footpath and squashing a child."

She is also concerned about the example these irresponsible drivers are setting.

"They are showing those kids that it is cool to drive fast and dangerously."

A petition was launched last year to ask the Whangarei District Council to take some action and Mirella and Linda say they will find out what happened to this and see if they can gather more signatures.

They understand the Whangarei Racing Club will need to be consulted about any proposed traffic calming measures as trucks transporting horses to the racetrack travel along the road.

A woman died in Auckland Hospital on Monday 12 March after being flown there with critical injuries as the result of an accident on Peter Snell Rd. The car the woman was driving left the road, rolling into a horse paddock at around 11.10pm on Saturday 10 March. Two other people in the car suffered serious injuries. Police say early indications are that speed and alcohol were factors in the accident.

With most of the trees already felled on Thursday afternoon 8 March, she decided to put her body on the line in protest and sat on the stump of one of the fallen trees to prevent the chainsaw gang felling three which were still standing.

She argued with the work men telling them big, old, majestic trees were important to the health and well being of people living in urban areas and that Waipu, without its trees, would become as ugly as Auckland.

Contractor Glenn Taylor phoned the property

owner Murray Kinsella to tell him what was happening and Waipu Policeman Martin Geddes was called in. He issued Isa with a trespass notice and she left the property.

Isa is now concentrating her efforts on a further seven totara trees which she believes are about to be felled in the Caledonian Park on the other side of the fence. The trees have been marked with pink crosses, which Isa believes identifies for the contractor to quote for their felling.

David Moon, of the Waipu Caledonian Society said that; yes some of those totara trees would be felled because that part of the park was needed for a new pavilion for the fast growing Waipu Croquet Club. He said these were mostly trees that had self seeded which had no heritage value and that more trees would be planted

to replace them.

Raele Kinsella, who owns the restaurant property with her husband Murray, said she had heard about Isa's protest.

She said a branch from one of the trees had fallen and damaged the restaurant roof. The grove had been assessed by an arborist who had told them the trees were of "no merit."

"They were planted very close together perhaps as a shelter belt. Also we had been asked by the croquet club to get rid of them as their needles were falling on the croquet lawn. We will be planting some more suitable trees."

On the arborist's advice one totara of rhe former grove has been left.

Funding in Long Term Plan to purchase land for a Ruakaka Cemetery

The Whangarei District Council's draft Long Term Plan sets aside funding to purchase land in Ruakaka for a cemetery but this would not be available until the later years of the plan, \$82,000 will be set aside

for land purchase for a new cemetery in Years 4-6 of the plan (2021 -2013) and \$1,547,000 in years 7-10 (2016-2018).



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Land earmarked for Waipu recreation park goes up for sale



The land now up for sale for subdivision into six house lots was marked as future reserve or open space land on the Waipu 20 year Structure Concept Plan, leading nearby residents to believe it would never be built on.

An area of land adjacent to the Waipu River, which has been marked as future reserve and open space in the Waipu 20 Year Structure Plan Concept is up for sale and has consent for six residential house lots.

The land is part of the Nova Scotia Estate subdivision on the left hand side of Nova Scotia Drive heading towards the highway and just before you get to the Waipu Boat and Fishing Club on the right.

People who have already built their homes in the subdivision say they had understand this area was a designated recreation reserve and would never be built on. They say they are "flabbergasted 'at the council giving permission to build on land which is part of a flood plain and which they have seen underwater many times."

Stu Abercrombie, one of the Nova Scotia Estate developers and current owners of the land explained that the area had been marked as a possible site for a recreational park with hard surfaces for a range of recreational activities. He said the Nova Scotia developers had tried to reach an agreement with the Whangarei District Council to the effect that some of their development fees could be used for the purchase of this parcel of land for the park but the WDC had not agreed to this proposal.

He said local developers pay a lot of money in fees, not much of which comes back to this area.

Asked about the land in question being flood prone, he said the developers had worked with the Northland Regional Council to find an engineering solution to this problem and the land would need to be raised before it was built on.

Mr. Abercrombie said the land at this point had not been sold and if the Waipu public was interested in it being retained as a recreational area this was still a possibility.

Growth makes ocean wastewater outfall more likely

A Ruakaka ocean wastewater outfall has been labeled as the "most likely scenario" for long term waste water disposal in Bream Bay.

Growth in the Ruakaka and One Tree Point area has been faster then anticipated and is expected to continue in the foreseeable future.

To quote from the Council's draft Long Term Plan, "The most likely scenario is to undertake a staged upgrade of the Ruakaka Wastewater Treatment Plant to keep pace with grown in the interim with a major investment in a new ocean outfall from 2018.

The estimated cost of the outfall based on current is \$60 million, twice the amount the Council is proposing to spend on its new civic centre.

In the meantime a significant amount has been budgeted for upgrades of both the sewerage net work pipes and the treatment plant.

- \$12.6 million for an upgrade of the Ruakaka treatment plant.
- \bullet \$2 million for upgrades of the One Tree Point Ruakaka network
- In Waipu, which has also been experiencing strong growth,
- \$1.35 million is allocated to an upgrade of the treatment plant.
- \$10.65 million to upgrade the Waipu Cove /Langs Beach network

The Whangarei District Council already has a resource consent for the ocean outfall, which was applied for some years ago as a *just in case* measure. However the Council's Waste and Drainage Manager Andrew Carvell said a lot of technical reviews would need to take place before a decision was made to build an outfall pipeline with the high cost of such a project a strong incentive to look for other solutions.

At present the Ruakaka treatment plant and wastewater disposal system is at appoximately half its consented capacity and Mr. Carvell said there were measures that could be taken such as reconfigurating the treatment ponds and installing aerator platforms that would make it more efficient.



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
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Police Report

Drink driving charges

On 9 March at 10.30pm a 32-year-old Whangarei man was stopped while driving on State Highway One. He allegedly recorded a breath alcohol level of 600 micrograms of alcohol per litre of breath. The legal limit for drivers 20 years of age or older is 250 micrograms.

On 7 March at 11.30pm a 27-year-old Auckland man allegedly recorded a breath alcohol level of 610mcg of alcohol.

Both of these men will be appearing in the Whangarei District Court.

Over the past fortnight Bream Bay Police have been called to ten family violence incidents. Sergeant Simon Craig commented as this was less then one incident a day it was a lower than usual rate.

No funding allocated for proposed Ruakaka Multi Generational Facility

There is no specific allocation in the Whangarei District Council's draft Long Term Plan allocated to the proposed new Multi Generational Facility proposed for Ruakaka alongside the existing Ruakaka Recreation Centre.

When Andreas Thirling asked about this at the public meeting on the Long Term Plan held in the Recreation centre on Tuesday 13 March he was told by Jill McPherson, the council's Acting General Manager of Strategy and Services that funding could be sought for this project from a contestable community projects fund. This fund will make available \$200,000 in the first year of the plan and \$400,000 in subsequent years to community led projects and will be contestable across the district.

The Ruakaka Multi purpose building has been costed at \$6 million. Christina Thirling the Ruakaka Recreation Centre manager said the recreation centre committee is asking for a third of this amount to be funded by the Council. Christina said that without this seeding funding it is difficult to get grants from other funding agencies. She said the committee had made a presentation to councilors about this project last year as they were formulating the draft LTP and it was disappointing funding for the building had not been allocated. Christina is encouraging people who would like to see the new Ruakaka facility built to make submissions and has photocopied a submission document asking the council to fund the project for people to sign.

"If they get enough requests they won't be able to just ignore us", Christine said.

She said the recreation centre is unable to accommodate all the requests it gets for people who want to run activities in the building.

"The Council seems to want all of its facilities to be up in Whangarei but there are many elderly people living in Ruakaka who can no longer drive as well as young families who can't afford to drive up there."

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Questioning the need for a new civic centre

A big ticket item in the Whangarei District Council's spending plan for the next ten year 2018 – 2028 is a new civic centre to replace Forum North which would has been budgeted at \$37 million.

Dr. Jill McPherson, the Council's General Manager of Strategy and Governance said at a public meeting on the Council's draft Long Term Plan in Ruakaka on Tuesday 13 March, there are three options on the table • To upgrade the current forum north building

• To upgrade the current forum north building

• To develop the RSA building site, which the Council has already purchased

• To look for and purchase new land somewhere in the CBD for the new centre.

She said price wise these options were similar with the upgrade of Forum North estimated to cost around \$2,miilon less.

building saying that another option might be to allow and encourage more Council staff to work from home. He said this is a growing trend as technology allows this to happen more and more.

With more people working from home there would be less traffic congestion in Whangarei.

Mr. Chatham said he had left Auckland to get away from such congestion but now found congestion was occurring in Whangarei as well.

He also asked if it wouldn't make sense for the Northland Regional Council to share premises with the Whangarei District Council so services could be more integrated.

Mrs. McPherson said an invitation to share a new building had been extended to the NRC but this had been declined.

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Proposal for district wide funding of sports facilities in the NRC's Long Term Plan

Malcolm Nicholson, CEO of the Northland Regional Council travelled to Ruakaka last week to explain the basics of the NRC's Long Term Plan.

He said NRC staff and councilors had been talking to people at some of the local markets and had hit on four major items for the plan These are:

• More management to improve fresh water quality. The draft LTP proposes to spend an extra \$2.2 million each year on this, which would amount to an additional \$15 per ratepayer per year. In total \$27 per ratepayer per year would now go into this. Measures taken would include - riparian plantings, an expansion of the Flyger Rd nursery, which grows poplar saplings,

• Improved pest management - this encompasses plant, marine and animal pests and involves an extra \$2.3 million spend a year. The plan is to make each of the 23 major forests in Northland best free aiming at the first seven of these becoming pest free in a decade. The total cost per annum per ratepayer would be \$28 per year.

• The third big item is flood protection schemes. Mr. Nicolson said that some communities such as Pungaru were very impoverished and couldn't afford to pay for such schemes. He said a relatively small amount of money, around \$500,000 would be needed to complete the scheme here.

In other places the NRC might ask the community to pay 50% of the cost. One proposal was for flood mitigation in central Whangarei. Although a big retention dam at the top of the catchment had made a significant difference when there was heavy rainfall, there was still more work to be done with more dams to be built. This project would be undertaken in conjunction with the WDC. The proposal is that 50% of the cost of this work be met by the regional council and 50% by a targeted rate in the Whangarei area.

• The fourth big item was improving the level of transparency on how the NRC spends the money it receives. In addition to the amount spent on overheads six separate categories for work undertaken will be used.

Other items mentioned by Mr. Nicholson were:

• An end to funding for Creative Northland. He said a three-year trial for this had been completed.

• Charges for Toll Stadium, which has cost Whangarei District Ratepayers \$28.50 (Far North and Kaipara Ratepayers \$5) a year would be paid off this year but the NRC is proposing to continue to charge a rate of \$17 across the region for the funding of major sports facilities.

NRC Councillor Rick Stolwerk urged people to make submissions. He said the NRC preferred it if these were made on line but paper submission forms were also available. He said people should not just tick boxes but also make comments on the various proposals and reminded everyone that the cut of date for submissions is 17 April.



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Plastic rubbish on the beach



Rubbish collected from one and a half kilometres of Bream Bay shoreline by members of the Bream Bay Coastal Care Trust during Sea Week

The beach may seem clean of rubbish but if you look up along the high water mark you can find lots nylon fishing line tangled in the seaweed, bottle tops, plastic bags, plastic food wrappers and millions of tiny fragments of coloured plastic scattered amongst the sand.

This is the conclusion of members of the Bream Bay Coastal Care Trust who conducted a beach clean up along the shores of Bream Bay to mark Sea Week from 3 -11 March.

Combining the work of two sets of beach cleaners, the first covering approximately a kilometre and a half of beach from the Ruakaka surf club entrance north towards Uretiti and the second from the Uretiti camp northwards for approximately 500 metres the following items were picked up from the sand:

• 10 pieces of nylon string or rope

• 7 plastic bags

• 1 piece of polystyrene around 20cm across at widest point (possibly a broken boogie board)

- 5 pieces of heavy clear plastic
- 28 pieces or whole items of plastic food packaging such as: chip bags, chocolate bar wrappers etc.
- 2 pieces of paper
- 3 nylon fishing lines
- 5 hylon fishing files

- 1 barnacle encrusted black plastic gasket
- 1 hunk of melted plastic
- 1 piece of plastic coated wood veneer
- 1 heavy plastic cap (from a fuel container?)
- 1 (10cm across) piece of white plastic woven sack
- 7 plastic rings off drink bottles
- 4 flat caps from the top of drink bottles
- 2 baby wipes

• 104 pieces of unrecognizeable plastic fragments of various sizes

Nick Bamford, Environmental Monitoring Officer, Coastal, for the Northland Regional Council filtered this data and summarized:

"In total, 237 rubbish items were collected, the majority of which was plastic. The likely source of the various material classes, e.g. plastic, was assessed using the Sustainable Coastlines Beach Litter Source Categorisation table. Of the five categories Food related items made up 78% of the rubbish collected, Household and personal (8.9%), Fishing (8.4%), Construction (3.8%) and Vehicle (0.4%)."

Mr. Bamford said, "This serves as a reminder that food and associated packaging should be disposed of correctly, or ideally have reusable containers. Other considerations are dispersal (wind, rain, river and ocean). If you see any litter, especially plastic, please pick it up regardless of where you see it. This will help reduce the amount of litter getting into our waterways. Rubbish can take many years to break down in the sea and many plastics degrade down into micro-plastics but never truly disappear. " The beach cleaners also found two washed up crab or crayfish pots. Neither of these were named despite a Ministry of Primary Industry requirement stipulated in Fisheries (Amateur Fishing) Regulations 2013 that the owners surname and intitials be "legibly and permanently" marked on all pots and bouys. The Bream Bay Coastal Care members suggest phone numbers also be marked on t pots so their owners can be contacted when they wash up on the beach.

Coffee morning for young mums

Summer Teleiai runs a coffee morning at the Ruakaka Recreation Centre for young mums.

Summer became a mother at 17 to one-year-old Payton and wants to meet other young mums for mutual help and support. The sessions are held on a fortnightly basis from 10am to 12 noon but it is proving a bit of a struggle to get other young mothers to come along.

Summer says many just want to hide away at home. There is a stigma attached to being a teenage mum and it takes a big effort every time you want to go out. "Even if it is just for ten minutes you have to get your child ready as well as yourself."

Also many young mums can't afford to own and run cars and there is no public transport in Bream Bay

There was just one other young mum, who had come along with her sister and young daughter, at the last session on Friday 9 May.

Jadeen Tahana had her first child when she was aged 15 and now also has a two- year-old daughter Mialeigh. Her son lives with his paternal grandparents in Invercargill. She misses him a lot.

Jadeen has no car so Summer had picked her and her sister and daughter up from their home in Marsden Point Rd. Summer said she has only just managed to buy a car herself.

She knows a lot of other young mothers, just about all the girls she went to school with have had children, but they all live up in Whangarei, so it is difficult to meet with them.

It can be very lonely staying at home on your own with a young child. Summer has her mother living nearby so says it is not as difficult for her as for some others.

There are local playgroups they could join but Summer says often the women who attend these already have their established social groups and a teenage mum can feel a bit left out.

The tea and coffee for the sessions is sponsored by a company called *Data Maps* whose owners Summer met through the youth group at Lifepoint Church. The group also has the backing of *Family Start*, a Ministry of Health initiative, which provides home visits with the aim of improving "children's health, learning and relationships, family circumstance, environment and safety." Summer has giveaways and information to hand out and now and then someone from *Family Start* will be there to answer

questions.

Summer arrives early to set out pens and paper for children to draw on and sometimes play dough to keep them occupied while their mothers talk. If the weather is nice they might wander down to the nearby park.

Jadeen has moved up to Ruakaka because her father, sister and a brother live here. She doesn't want to go back to Rotorua where her mother lives because she says she is subject to some bad influences there.

Both young women say having children has made them more focused and determined to achieve something with their lives.

Jadeen would like to study and gain some NCEA qualifications but has no way of travelling into Whangarei to a Northtec course. Her long-term ambition is to work in early childhood education. Summer's aim is to achieve a social work degree.

The next coffee morning is scheduled for Friday 23 March at 10am. All young mums or soon to be young mums are welcome.

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
Take a kid fishing day at the Waipu boat and fishing club


