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Proposed big rate increases for higher valued properties

The Whangārei District Council rate increase is set for 2025/2026 at 10.5% however a proposal to decrease the Uniform Annual General Charge by 39% from what would have been \$909 per property results in a 44% increase on the portion of the rates we pay based on land valuations. To calculate what this means for you multiply your land value by \$0.0039342 and add on the UAGC of \$500 as compared to \$0.0027338 for the 2025 -2026 year when the UAGC was \$821. To calculate the difference if the Council adopts an alternative proposal with an UAGC of \$909 multiple your land value by \$0.0029438.

The Council has stated its preferred option is for the \$500 UAGC and the higher rate based on land value. Each property's proposed rate will also be impacted by any valuation increase or decreases.

In addition there are targeted rates increases of 3.2% for wastewater and 5.7% for water.

There is also a proposed stormwater rate – which was unfunded in the current 2024-2025 year as the Whangārei District Council waited to find out the implications of the coalition government's cancellation of the Three Waters arrangements and replacement by its Local Water Done Well proposals. Two options are under consideration – a district wide rate of 0.0003696 per dollar of land value or a set rate of 172 per separately inhabited part of a rating unit.

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Honoring our heroes: a reflection on Anzac Day



ANZAC Day, what does it mean for you? For me, it is one of the most important days of remembrance we could have in our New Zealand history.

For my father-in-law, he grew up knowing that he would always have the day off on his birthday, and he got to share it with his family who fought for this country. Personally, I find myself thinking about the sacrifices made by our brave soldiers. April 25th marks the anniversary of the first major military action fought by Australian and New Zealand forces during World War I at Gallipoli in 1915. It is a day that I believe brings us together in remembrance and gratitude.

On Anzac Day, the soldiers who landed on the beaches of Gallipoli faced unimaginable hardships. They endured grueling conditions, fought valiantly, and many made the ultimate sacrifice. EDITORIAL

Who are the winners and losers in the Whangārei District Council's proposed new rate calculations?

I have been trying to work out who will be advantaged by the Whangārei District Council's stated preferred option for rates over the 2025/2026 year, which is to lower the Uniform Annual General Charge from what would have been \$909 to \$500 and then make up the difference by a higher charge based on the land value of each property.

I looked at various land values of properties at various parts of the district and found that a residential lot in the Ruakākā Village with a land value of \$350,000 gets a \$63 annual advantage if the UAGC is lowered to \$500.

A residential property in the Nova Scotia Estate with a land value of \$385,000 is at a slight \$27.69 disadvantage, so the tipping point is somewhere between these two values.

A Waipu ten-acre lifestyle block with a land value of \$710,000 would be paying \$300 a year more if the lower UAGC and higher land value calculation is applied. The pain really starts to hit in, though, on the higher valued properties.

A Langs Beach property, for example, with a land value of say \$1,750,000 would pay an extra \$1,324 on an already hefty rates bill if the lower UAGC and higher land value charge is applied.

I suspect this lower UAGC higher land value charge is to the disadvantage of most Bream Bay residents as sea views and closeness to the beach make for higher valuations.

I am not sure why our local government rates for both the Northland Regional and Whangārei District Councils are based on land values, which can vary for all kinds of reasons that have no basis on the incomes of people living on those land lots. If the lower UAGC is an attempt to help people with less money at their disposal it seems like a pretty clumsy way to do this.

Some of the lowest value properties are owned by landlords, so will the rates advantage flow on to tenants? This seems unlikely.

In addition to the jump in our rates bill many of us will get by dint of this new calculation method, we are all now for stormwater management. This wasn't applied in 2024-2025 while the Council came to grips with what the Coalition Governments abandonment of the previous administrations plans for Three Waters management would mean.

This is still a bit unclear with our Council saying, while it is willing to co-operate with the other Northland councils, its preference is to go it alone. Regardless it's going to cost.

I am looking out my office window at the water from the recent heavy rain, draining from our property by way of a little stream into the river at our boundary. The Council has nothing to do with this arrangement.

Roadside drain maintenance could perhaps justify this charge and it's easy to see how the costs could mount up here. Last week we had full - blown traffic management with hundreds of metres of road cones, trucks with flashing lights and people at each end with Stop/ Go signs, while a noisy, clanking digger (loud enough to be heard and to warn approaching traffic of its presence for some distance), scrapped out sections of drain.

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
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Menopause

Every woman's experience of menopause is different. And whether you suffer from hot flushes, mood swings or sleeplessness, this "change of life" does not have to mean the end of your way of life. Menopause is the natural process of your periods becoming irregular and eventually stopping. This means your body has ceased pre-



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paring every month for pregnancy - your ovaries stop releasing eggs and your hormone production decreases.

How do you know if you are going through menopause? The symptoms for menopause are varied and vast. You could experience any or all of the following symptoms:

- hot flushes
- night sweats
- irregular periods
- loss of libido
- vaginal dryness
- mood swings.

Other changes during menopause may include fatigue, hair loss, sleep disorders, dizziness and weight gain. As bones can get thinner due to hormone changes, some woman are also at risk of developing osteoporosis. Talk to your community pharmacist about managing the possibility of weakening bones.

Many women do not seek treatment for menopause but those that do often experience severe symptoms. Hormone replacement therapy (HRT) is the most common treatment and comes in the form of tablets, creams, patches and implants.

Menopause is generally manageable if you make a few adjustments to your lifestyle. Ask your community pharmacist for advice which may include:

- sticking to a health diet
- getting plenty of exercise
- doing weigh-bearing exercise
- avoiding stressful situations
- getting enough sleep
- stopping smoking
- not drinking coffee, or exercising, before you go to sleep
- · sleeping in a well ventilated room
- using lubricant during sex.

It is also critical that you get support from your family and friends during menopause. Their help will assist you during this change in life. Menopause can be managed with the help of health professionals, talk to your community pharmacist about the appropriate treatment options for you.

Drink drivers



Gwyneth Scotland looks back on an adventurous, busy life shared with her late husband Dick. Gwyneth remains involved in her community

Gwyneth Scotland moved up from Tauranga with her husband Dick and their three children David, Ian and Alison to take over the Waipu Cove Store 52 years ago. A fourth child Andrew was born after the move north.

Gwyneth recalls how they came here quite by chance. They were visiting friends Anne and Brian Sellar in Auckland and were invited to come along to have a look at businesses this couple were interested in buying.

Gwyneth said she took the children to the beach and didn't even come and look at the store.

But Dick was won over by Waipu Cove and he and Gwyneth sold a stationery shop and a kiwifruit orchard they had in Tauranga and went into a ten-year partnership with their friends.

Alongside the store there was a service station, some cabins, three flats a campground and a Rural Delivery run

Gwyneth was born Gwyneth Williams in Northampton. She was an only child. Her father was a Word War 1 veteran and worked for the railways, so the family moved around a lot. However, when she reached grammar school for the sake of her education they settled in Bristol.

After leaving school at the age of 17 Gwyneth began training at the Exeter Hospital.

"I had always wanted to be a nurse. I made up my mind when I was just four years old and I never waivered."

However, she discovered she was allergic to surgical spirits, which in those days was used to rub on patients' backs.

"They didn't know what to do with me so I was sent to help in the physiotherapist department."

One of the physiotherapists there suggested she train in this profession so Gwyneth applied to The London Hospital and luckily had good enough grammar school grades in the right subjects to be accepted.

Gwyneth said the training she received at The London was "excellent".

"We spent the first six months in the classroom and then for the next two years half days in the classroom and then in the wards with patients. The final six months was spent full time with patients."

Gwyneth met Dick, who was from Tauranga, when he was on his OE in the UK. They became engaged but she waited 18 months to finish her training and spent a last Christmas with her parents, before travelling out to join him in New Zealand. She wanted to see as much of the world as she could on the way out so came with P and O via Gibraltar, the Suez Canal and Adelaide and then overland to Sydney, as there was a seafarers strike on at the time, before continuing on to Wellington on board the MS Wanganella.

Dick's family had a stevedore business so Dick was able to come on board to meet her. They walked off together so Gwyneth never went through immigration.

"It never mattered until around ten years later when I applied for a passport." She was able to show her marriage certificate as evidence she had been in NZ all that time.

The physiotherapy qualification was put to good use. Dick's mother disapproved saying a married woman should not go out to work but this didn't deter Gwyneth. She worked right up until the birth of her first child and then for most of the time she had young children both for the Tauranga Hospital physiotherapy department and in private practice.

The physiotherapy work continued when she moved north. Waipu's Doctor Teh called into the Cove store one day saying he had heard there was a physiotherapist working there and he arranged for Gwyneth to work at the Waipu Medical Centre. In 1974 she took a trip back to the UK to introduce Andrew, her youngest child, to

her parents. When she returned she began a routine working two days a week in Waipu and three days in Maungaturoto as well as making home visits with referrals from the Whangārei Hospital physiotherapy department.

Back at the Cove things were busy as well. With the help of Brian, who was a builder, they built the Waipu Cove motel. Gwyneth recalls how in the middle of the construction, New Zealand's measurements changed from imperial to metric and they had to quickly buy up all the available imperial measure concrete blocks to finish the job.

The partnership purchased a motel in Russell, which the Sellars took over as their share of the business with Gwyneth and Dick retaining the Waipu Cove assets. Both Gwyneth and Dick were very involved in the local community. Gwyneth recalls selling tickets at the Ruakākā Racecourse gates to raise money for scouts and being a timekeeper for the Bream Bay swimming club.

"Well you get involved with whatever your children were doing."

Dick was President of the Lions and for a time District Governor. He was President of the Waipu Golf Club. He played a lot of sport. He took part in the Auckland to Suva Yacht race a couple of times. Sailing was in his family."

Dick worked alongside drain layer Bert Worthy, mostly to remain fit, but as Bert neared retirement Dick qualified as a drain layer in his own right,"

Gwyneth said her story couldn't be told with out a big part of it being about Dick. "We did a lot of travelling. We just generally worked in together."

Gwyneth and Dick sold the store but kept on living at the Cove moving into town at in the Nova Scotia Estate just four years ago.

"We were in a three storey house on a hilly bit of land and not getting any younger." In a tragedy felt by the whole of the Waipu community their youngest son Andrew, a builder and Waipu Volunteer Fireman was killed in a hang glider accident in the Remarkables near Queenstown in 2009 while at a Fire Brigade competition. Dick died in February 2023.

At 86 years of age Gwyneth still keeps up a fair amount of community engagement, serving on the Waipu Library Committee and volunteering at the Waipu Museum. She works making chips - sometimes for longs hours on the Waipu Lions food stall at public events.

Until fairly recently there were no women members in the Lions.Gwyneth said, "We women were just the rent-a-crowd when they needed a good-sized audience for a guest speaker. Now thanks to Juanita (McGoldrick) who had been in the Lions in Whakatāne, women can join so I am now a member in my own right." "We always did a lot of the work of course."

Gwyneth has 12 grandchildren and 8 great grandchildren. She keeps a list of all their birthdays and ages and sends them all birthday presents.

Was that a good decision to leave England to marry Dick all those years ago? Gwyneth has no hesitation in saying it was. She has a painting with the pohutukawa in bloom at Waipu Cove by Waipu artist Carol King hanging in her entrance hall. She says all those years living at the Cove were "wonderful" and she and Dick had an eventful, adventurous life together.




