# **One Tree Point** seawall badly damaged in New year storm



The wooden seawall at One Tree Point along the side of Manaia Veiw Rd. suffered extensive damage in the New Year storm and will get some temporary repairs as soon as the tides allow.

Four sections of the 23-year-old wall have been washed away after seas came crashing over the wall during the storm. Peter Furze who lives nearby said posts and wooden planks were left floating in the harbour with some retrieved by local people and thrown up onto the bank behind the wall.

Sue Hodge, the Whangarei District Council's Parks Manager, said she had visited the damaged wall with representatives of the Northland Regional Council and

# An exciting new industry for Ruakaka

It was thrilling to be shown over the new Royal New Zealand training barge built at the South Pacific Industrial Ltd. workshop in Marsden Point Rd. before it was trucked to the port in the early hours of Tuesday morning 16 January to be towed by sea to Devonport. Paul Hebberd, Managing Director of SPIIND, invited me down to view the barge, while it was still in the yard at the workshop.

It is huge. It is almost a frigate just lacking the hull and the engine. It measures eight metres tall, 11 metres wide, and 35 metres in length and weighs 160 tonnes. I climbed up several steep high ladders onto the lower then the upper decks: a bit scary for an old lady like me but I had just seen a trophy awarded for safe work practice in the SPIIND reception counter so I knew the ladders had to be secure.

The barge has most of the equipment of a naval frigate including lifeboats, a Hiab crane and assault ladders and it is surely a big accomplishment on the part of the company's management and its tradesmen to have built something as big and as complicated as this.

I declined an invitation to come down to the workshop at 2am to see the barge lifted onto a truck but I did go down at around 4.30am to watch it move slowly down Marsden Point Rd. and onto the Port Marsden Highway. I am glad I made the effort as I think this was a significant, historic occasion for our district.

Lieutenant Commander Angela Barker, RNZN who oversaw this project for the Navy said it was pleasing to find a New Zealand company capable of building the training barge.

SPIIND has also built an onshore training facility for the Navy with replica patrol boats inside a big shed at the Devonport Naval base.

This was not my first experience on board a brand new naval vessel. In 1997 when I ran a newspaper in Devonport, I along with lots of other media people, was invited to board the frigate Te Kaha for her arrival at the Devonport base. That ship was built by Tenix Australia.

Mr. Hebberd said his company is now receiving enquiries from all around the world to supply military training equipment. So here is an exciting new industry for Ruakaka.

If there are any young people out there wondering about a future trade they might do well to consider becoming fitters and turner. People who can build machinery, bolt things together and make them work must be amongst the most valuable people in our society. As someone who has trouble changing a car tyre, I certainly consider them so.

I imagine to be part of the SPIIND construction team would be exciting and very satisfying. There must be so much skill and pride involved in constructing such a piece of equipment.

I think our local college should recognize this and be looking at how it can prepare capable and interested students for this role and for jobs in some of the other progressive industries we are lucky enough to have in Bream Bay. Despite the tendency for school administrators to run for cover when they hear the words "health and safety requirements" there are still a few secondary schools in New Zealand brave enough to offer workshop technology classes to their students.



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# Solving a dust problem at One Tree Point

A group of 20 One Tree Point residents angry at dust blowing into their homes from the WFH Properties Ltd. development - The Landing @ Marsden opposite called a meeting on Monday morning 15 January with representatives of the Whangarei District and Northern Regional Councils and the site supervisor for J.W. Neill Contractors which is building a road network on the site for the developer WFH Properties Ltd.

Brian and Carol Puckey said the dust has blown right through their One Tree Point Rd. home.

"It's a horrible sticky sort of grit. We can't live in a house full of dirt so we have been cleaning it up."

Mr. Puckey is annoyed that the Northland Regional Council has not been more pro active in requiring the developer to control the dust. He said they seem to be more interested in helping the developer then protecting the residents who already live here.

" It shouldn't be up to us to complain before they take any action. "

He said the developer had been attempting to control the dust with a water truck but this hadn't worked very well. Next a dust suppressant coating was sprayed over the problem area and this was having better effect. However, he isn't looking forward to the next stage of the development when ground is cleared for house sites.

Mr. Puckey was also annoyed at a suggestion from the contracting company that the property owners should file claims with their insurance agents if they wanted to be compensated for the dust nuisance.

He said this puts the residents to a lot of trouble and in most cases would cost them their no claims bonus or the excess amount on their policies.

Roger and Shirley Neal have also been having dust problems. They had not long had their house painted when a particularly strong south-west wind on 20 December covered it with the sticky brown dust.

Shirley said window sills in their home were black and there was brown dust all over the kitchen floor.

"I had been doing some baking and I commented to Roger that I didn't remember spilling all that cocoa."

However she believes the contractor has been trying to solve the problem and that sand and dust and sand, which had covered the road in front of their home had been cleaned up.

Darren Jackson, the site supervisor for J.W. Neill Ltd. said he had been doing his best to contain the dust problem. On 20 December he had engaged an extra water truck to try to keep the dust down but the wind had been so strong this hadn't been effective.

"I think the water did help a bit. Without it the situation would have been a lot worse."

He commented other contractors working in the area had similar problems on that day.

He said any compensation would be through the company's insurance agent. "That's what we have insurance for, why we pay a premium."

Told that some years ago, when excavations at the Marsden Cove Marina had caused a similar dust problems, Hoppers Development Ltd. had cleaned down the houses of nearby residents and, in some cases, had paid for commercial cleaners to clean out their homes, he said, "I can't speak for what other companies do."

He later phoned back to say he had been speaking with the company owner who had agreed that it wasn't fair that the neighbouring property owners should lose money because of the dust problem.

# Learning about how to care for the beach environment



Laura Shaft, Coast Care Co-ordinator for the Northland Regional Council, with the help of Ayla Wiles of the Department of Conservation and the Bream Bay Coastal Care Trust volunteers held a beach education day at Ruakaka on Thursday 11 January.

Children were given free iceblocks, water bottles and games along with information about seabirds and dune protection.



Mr. Jackson said, "I will be knocking on their doors tomorrow morning to let them know that we will be covering any clean up costs through our own insurance without them having to pay any excess."

He also gave assurances that when J.W. Neill finishes its work on the civil amenities in the subdivision in a few months time all excavated areas would be either paved or grassed.

Mr. Puckey also phoned back to say he had been talking with Mr. Jackson and was now satisfied the company was genuinely doing its best to solve the problem and to look after the affected neighbours.

Tess Dacre, Compliance Monitoring Manager with the Northern Regional Council, said the resource consent for the development had conditions to control dust nuisance. Northland Regional Council officers had made site visits to check that these conditions were being met and would be continuing to monitor the site.

with four more due to fledge in the next few weeks. One of these is at Waipu and three are at Mangawhai.

One late chick was born at Pakiri two weeks ago. Department of Conservation communications adviser Abigail Monteith said, "The chick at Pakiri is a real success story given the nest site was under water during the storm (of January 3 and 4). The eggs were collected and were kept in an incubator with dummy eggs left in the nest when the site was not inundated. Following the storm the birds returned to incubate the dummy eggs, which were then swapped with the real eggs. The egg hatched on the Monday night /Tuesday morning 8 or 9 January.

Two chicks died at Papakanui during the storm.

Abigail said, "As the chicks become more mobile prior to fledging it is a good time to remind people to be vigilant when on the beach, observe no dog signs and keep well away from any fenced nest sites as the chicks may be wandering outside them."

One of the Waipu sandspit fairy terns hasn't been seen since her two chicks were found dead in their nest.

The chicks were sent for autopsy and the verdict was the likely cause of death was predation by a Norway rat.

This year there The young female adult bird was photographed on 5 December with a mysterious cobalt blue stain on her forehead with a fish of the same colour in her beak.

> who is the Department of Conservation's fairy tern The photograph, taken by Fairy Tern Ranger Ayla Wiles, was sent to the Northland Regional Council and an investigating officer came to Waipu the following day to see if he could find something in the estuary which would have stained both the fish and the bird's head. He found nothing and wondered if the blue colour could be just a trick of the light.

The bird is a young female, just three years old, who spent last season at Waipu but did not nest. This was her first year of nesting.

The Department of Conservation's acting operations manager, Lesley Judd declined to pass the photograph of the bird with the blue head to the Bream Bay News saying that, "Given the length of time since the event I don't think there is value in asking the public for help in tracking down the spillage as it couldn't be located the following day."

She said, "We don't know for sure that the female has died, all we know is that she hasn't been sighted at Waipu since the event."

NRC Compliance Monitoring Manager, Tess Dacre said the bird was sighted before she disappeared without the blue colour on her feathers and it is likely her disappearance from Waipu is due to the death of her chicks. The missing bird's male partner has been sighted since the chicks were predated.

Just before they fledge, fairy tern are fitted with different coloured leg bands so individual birds can be identified. Bream Bay News Page 5

This four-wheel drive vehicle crossed the centre line and crashed into a car travelling in the opposite direction, injuringtwo people in the car. The accident occurred at around 4.30pm on Friday 5 January. A 30-year-old Whangarei man has been charged with two counts of careless driving causing injury.

This was the most serious of many crashes that occurred during wet weather at the end of the first week of 2018. Senior Sergeant Simon Craig, Officer in Charge at the Bream Bay Police Station, said people need to remember to drive to the conditions and watch their following distances behind other traffic. He said people should be aware that road surfaces can become greasy when there is rain after a prolonged dry period.

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# Defence forces from around the world show interest in the new RNZN training barge built by SPIIND in Ruakaka

It took 20,000 man-hours and a year to build. It weighs 160 tonne, is eight metres high and 35 metres long. "Oversize load" was a bit of an understatement for the new Royal New Zealand Navy's training barge when it was transported from the SPIIND workshop in Marsden Point Rd. 4.3 kilometres down the road to Northport early on Tuesday morning, 16 January. Three sets of power lines had to be disconnected to let it pass and a few log trucks and shift workers were held up as it made its slow passage down the road.

Paul Hebberd, Managing Director of the industrial engineering company South

Pacific Industries or SPIIND, said the move to Northport and into the sea went smoothly but bad weather prevented the barge being towed down to Auckland until Saturday evening, so she was moored at Northport in the interim. The barge was expected to arrive at Devonport on Sunday morning after a 15-hour journey

SPIIND formerly (SPI) built the barge at its Ruakaka workshop. It replicates a naval frigate with a fully operational Hiab Crane, watch pilot ladders, assault ladders and a lifeboat for trainees to practice lowering into the water.

The death of Abel Seaman Byron Solomon, 22, who got trapped under a lifeboat on a training exercise on board the HMNZS Canterbury off Cape Reinga in

2007 has driven the project.

Lieutenant Commander Angela Barker RNZN said it has taken a few years to get to this stage. SPIIND has already built a "landside" training facility at the Devonport training base with some replica patrol boats housed in a big shed.

The new barge, which has yet to be named, will be moored alongside the Naval base with a bridge (also built in Ruakaka by SPIIND) leading from the land to the ship.

Lieutenant Commander Barker said the training barge represents "a real step forward" for the Navy.

"It can be difficult to give trainees the time they need to practice using equipment on an operational ship. This will be a fantastic safety resource. Essentially it is a little ship. Our trainees will be able to use the equipment as many times as they need to become familiar with it."

The barge has a viewing deck at the top where instructors can observe the trainees. There are emergency stops they can use if they see an unsafe practice.

She said many naval forces around the world don't have anything like this and was pleased that a New Zealand company was given the job of fabricating it and that the company can now develop a niche market in this area.

The new Navy training barge is expected to be in operation by April this year. Mr. Hebberd meanwhile is in negotiation with other defence forces from around the world. SPIIND has also built a full-scale forward section of a Boeing 777 for the New Zealand Security Intelligence Service (SIS) and Anti Terrorism Simulation Training equipment is another specialty the company is receiving strong international interest in

contracting company Broad Spectrum to see what temporary repair measures could be carried out under the WDC's existing consent.

### RUAKAKA SCHOOL ENROLMENT SCHEME Effective 23 July 2018



In order to avoid overcrowding, or the likelihood of overcrowding, the board of Ruakaka School has adopted an enrolment scheme which has been approved by the Ministry of Education.

Under this scheme, effective 23 July 2018, students will be enrolled if they live within the home zone described below.

Travelling along State Highway 1 south from Whangarei, the zone starts at Totara Road and includes all properties on that road. The zone travels overland to include 284 Springfield Road and continues east to 978 Springfield Road. The zone runs east along Ormiston Road until it reached Kukunui Road; then it travels overland to the intersection where Applecross Road meets Mountfield Road and includes all properties on Mountfield Road east of this intersection.

The zone continues eastward to cross State Highway 1 to include 325 and properties northwards including all properties on Rosythe Road and McLeod Road.

The zone then runs northwards along the coast to meet 478 Marsden Point Road. The zone continues overland to include 94 McEwan Road. It continues west along McEwan until it reaches One Tree Point Road to include property 776

The zone then travels overland to meet the Whangarei Harbour so the zone includes all properties on Hewlett Road, Gilbert Road and Johns Road.

The zone finishes on State Highway 1 at Hewlett Road. The zone excludes:

properties on Takahiwai Road

### **Special Programmes - Maori Bilingual Unit**
