"Patience does pay Poll result means skatepark will be built in the Waihoihoi Park this summer

The votes in favour of a youth activity zone at the western end of Waihoihoi River Park out numbered those against by about five to one in the poll conducted by the Whangarei District Council earlier this month

As a result, construction of a small skatepark alongside the existing children's playground is planned for this summer.

A total of 1043 Waipu, Waipu Cove and Langs Beach residents aged between five and 93 years old took part in the survey held on 6 and 8 August. Of these, 852 voted yes, 159 voted no and 32 votes could not be counted because names and addresses were not provided, the voters were under the age of five or no vote was marked on the voting form.

The Council's senior landscape architect Tracey Moore said, space would be left a pump track and half court to be built at a later stage and that new picnic tables, seating and planting will also be included in this summer's upgrade.

She said, "Plenty of space would be left for dog walking or quiet contemplation."

Retaining spaces for quiet contemplation was the main argument put forward in opposition to the skatepark. The Bream Bay News invited several people who did not support a skatepark at this location to comment on *Continued on page 6*.

EDITORIAL

Something speicial about the Waipu to Waipu Cove Cycle and Walking Trail

If any further proof was needed of broad community support for the Waipu to Waipu Cove Cycle and Walkway, the crowd of people who turned up to help plant trees and flax there this morning (Sunday 23 August) was a strong testament. There were close to a hundred workers and, with many hands making light work, the task of getting all those plants in the ground was over in the matter of a few hours.

There is still a way to go (almost four kilometres) to complete the trail and to join up the already built sections at each end, from Waipu to Riverview Place and from Waipu Cove to McLean Rd. There are difficulties to be overcome in finding safe road crossings and

a route where, in some places, the boundaries of private property stretch into the roadway. But the support shown at this morning's working bee along with the generosity of the Brown family, who have granted access for the trail across their land has given the project a strong impetus.

Up in Whangarei there are cycleways being built with Whangarei District Council and New Zealand Transport Authority funding with very little community input. The Council is supportive of the Waipu project and has taken care of the legal side of establishing easements but the projects initiation was by local people including some Waipu

Primary school children. The community has made a big fundraising effort and local contractors have been generous with their skills, machinery and time. The project continues to be run by a team of dedicated local people who serve on the Waipu to Waipu Cove Cycle and Walkway Trust. It's taking a long time but all this effort and community goodwill makes the Waipu to Waipu Cove Walking and Cycling trail something very special.

It's getting well used too. This morning, driving along beside the Riverview Place section, I counted 20 people cycling, pushing little children in strollers, taking their dogs for a walk and walking on the trail. It's not just Waipu people either. I recently met a young couple who had driven over from Ruakaka for a morning walk and then a coffee in Waipu. A suggestion to Sue Forsyth, who in a Letter to the Editor on Page 4 complains, with some justification, about all the Council money that goes to Waipu projects in relation to what gets spent in Ruakaka: I think a walking trail in the back dunes from Mair Rd. at Marsden Point to Te One St. in the Ruakaka Village. might be a worthwhile project. Stop all those people dumping rubbish and wrecking the dunes with their trail bikes and turn it into something beautiful for the community to enjoy. Is anyone interested in forming a committee to get to work on this?

The global pandemic has made it more important than ever before to have strong, functioning communities. I heard a comment by a kuia up in the far north about how nice it was to be surrounded with so much aroha with her neighbours bringing her gifts of food and phoning to check on her well being. By way of contrast, in today's Herald there is a front page article about the luxury cruise ship, The World - Residences at Sea, on which some extremely wealthy people spend three to six months each year floating around the world in their \$14 million apartments. While the country was at Level 4 Lockdown in April, this ship was apparently denied entry to New Zealand after it was asked to

Waipu Rugby - Northland champions for the second year

Waipu RSC President Stephen Cunis - "Players, sponsors, supporters and committee members have all gone through so much, so to see a great game of rugby between two stanch rugby clubs was just fantastic"

Waipu Rugby has the Northland premiership title for the second year in a row after beating Mid-Northern in a close fought match at the Caledonian Park on Saturday afternoon 22 August.

With both teams tied at 16 points the game ran into 20 minutes overtime with two ten minutes sessions played from either side. With just two minutes of extra time remaining Ben Macken nailed a penalty goal to give Waipu both the game and the championship title. Club President Stephen Cunis provided this rundown on the game.

"The team showed real guts, perseverance and determination to win on Saturday. With Waipu's usual captain, Sam McNamara, on the sideline due to concussion protocols and various other players being unavailable through injuries and/or COVID restrictions, it was really stacked against us, right from the start.

"We had some stand out performers; Pisi Leilua at fullback, was rock solid in defence and always dangerous on attack; Phillip Manako carried hard in the midfield and made great yards each time, and was also very strong on defence; Wiseguy Faiane took on the role of second five eighth and defended stoutly, and, of course, the ever-reliable Ben Macken, who played with heart and slotted the crucial penalty with two minutes of extra time remaining.

"For me, however, the three players that epitomised what the squad is about were Luatangi Li, Sean Mc-Cully and Ben Tou – the front row. These men played 100 minutes of rugby and at every scrum, dominated the Mid Northern pack. They carried hard, they defended with absolute commitment and they well-and-truly were the three most influential players on the park.

"Without a doubt though, it was a true team, squad and club effort – not just on the day, but also during the entire season. It can't be underestimated how difficult things have been due to COVID, but our community stood up and showed real pride in the club. Players got in behind the club during the season, whether it was for the B's or for the A's, and that's the reason we won on Saturday – it was because of club spirit."

Mr. Cunis also wanted to comment on the club's coaches and managers; Marley McKay (Premier Coach), Phil Halse (Premier Assistant Coach), Matt Abraham (Reserves Coach), Leon Clyde (Reserves Assistant Coach), Duncan Rhind (Manager), Truman MacCarthy (Assistant Manager) and Neil Holmes

"Their commitment and efforts cannot be understated. And finally, our supporters and sponsors – they make our club and without them, we'd be a fraction of the club we are."

He said the Covid 19 situation had impacted the season "hugely".

"It's been really tough on our community, on all communities, but people have found a way of getting through things. The club has got through this because of our community support. Players, sponsors, supporters and committee members have all gone through so much, so to see a great game of rugby between two stanch rugby clubs was just fantastic – to be honest, winning was just a massive bonus.

Mr. Cunis commended the Mid Northern, opposition. "Led by Jordan Olsen; their community has also faced a lot of challenges due to Covid and to come from from 9th last season, to beaten finalists this season, is a reflection of how they have are rising to the challenges within their rugby community."

Asked about the difficulties of hosting a live final under Level 2 Covid 19 response conditions, Mr. Cunis said, there were a lot of protocols to follow and it was a lot of work setting the day up.

"We needed to have security fencing around the field to ensure the 'field bubble' only had 100 people, including players. We needed the 'clubrooms bubble' to be separate from the 'field bubble' – again no more than 100 people. We had to have contact tracing for each bubble. We couldn't sell from the bar or kitchen because of hospitality protocols. We needed security and management for each 'bubble' We had to establish plans for live streaming and Grassroots TV.We had to establish plans for speeches and presentations."

The expense for all this had to be met by the Waipu club but Mr. Cunis said, "But we don't need to worry about that – we said we'd host the final so with that comes costs."



Concern over poultry dumped at Uretiti weigh station

I am writing as a concerned citizen regarding the hens and roosters that get dumped on SH1 Uretiti rest area, at the truck weigh station.

Three years ago I started noticing stray chickens and roosters at the road side in this spot on my daily drive to work, and feeling concerned during the height of summer with absolutely no water available I started leaving water out for them. The numbers have decreased and increased, there have been clutches of tiny chics hatch to beautiful protective mother hens only to last a couple of days succumbing to aggressive predators in the area, (of concern to native wild life right?) A few weeks ago there were just three hens, then two more young roosters arrived, a few days ago two new hens.

Prior to our first lockdown in March I witnessed a man with young kids in his car dumping three large roosters out at this area, I was absolutely gob smacked. It was all a bit of a joke to him when I asked him a couple of questions. What a fine example to set to these young kids! Funnily enough these second two roosters exactly resemble the first lot dumped.

I have taken a number of these birds and rehomed them to some very kind local citizens, some just disappear - I am guessing predators (of all kinds,) kill the large adults as well.

At present there are five hens and two very virile roosters, soon again there will be countless baby chics running around the road etc. Some say I'm too soft hearted, 'let them be,' this way of thinking doesn't sit well with me and I don't apologise for it.

SPCA and all animal shelters/rescues are overwhelmed with super serious animal welfare issues and do not have the resources to deal with this.

Come on people - take care of your own back yard and the creatures within, why make it someone else's problem? No matter how great or small.

Covid 19 testing at Northport

A Covid 19 testing station was set up in the visitor centre at the Marsden Point Refinery on Saturday 15, Sunday 16 and Monday 17 August.

Following an order from the Ministry of Health all people who work at t the port who might come into contact with ship's crews were tested.

Media Spokesperson for Northport Peter Heath, said the Northland District Health Board had already planned to set up a testing station there on Tuesday 18 August but this was brought forward to the weekend. Mr. Heath said, there is very limited interaction with ships' crews but that Northport frontline staff, North Tugz, stevedores and other port users have been or are being tested.

He said at a later point in time, and on the advice of Northland DHB, the mandatory testing may be expanded to include all port workers, or all port results over several months.' workers with possible symptoms.

"With respect to contact tracing, COVID-19 QR Codes are displayed at every entrance to the port, all staff have been asked to upload the App, and Northport's entry system records all people entering and leaving the facility."


Mr. Heath stressed, "Northport has a thorough and well-observed protocol in place to cover operations at different Public Health Alert levels. This includes distancing requirements, self-isolation requirements and other measures designed to prevent the spread of infection. This protocol includes at all levels the requirement for personnel to stay home and be tested for COVID-19 if exhibiting any symptoms. Therefore, although this was the first time we've had access to a dedicated Marsden Point-based testing station, many port workers have been tested and delivered negative


Change of dates for election meetings

POLICE REPORT

Family harm incidents

In the fortnight 10 August to 24 August Bream Bay Police dealt with 18 family harm incidents, which is an unusually high number

Five motor vehicle crashes

There was also more than the usual number of motor vehicle crashes. Police were called out to five separate minor crashes. Mostly these were vehicles running off the road in the wet weather. There were no serious injuries.

Stolen vehicle

A vehicle was reported stolen from One Tree Point at 7pm on 14 August and was found at 11pm on the same night crashed on its side in a ditch on One Tree Point Rd. Enquiries are ongoing as to the identity of the driver.

Drink driver

A 37-year-old Ruakaka man will be appearing in the Whangarei District Court after he underwent a breath alcohol test which recorded a level of 970 micrograms of alcohol per litre of breath. This is more than three times over the legal limit, which is 250 micrograms.

Vehicle clocked at 154 kmph

A vehicle travelling on State Highway One at Ruakaka was stopped by Police on 21 August at 6pm after it was clocked travelling at 154km per hour. A 47-year - old Whangarei man will be appearing in the Whangarei District Court charged with speeding offences.

Worms

Worms are one of the most common conditions that children catch, occasionally from pets, but usually from themselves, or other infected people. There are several types of worms that can affect humans, but in New Zealand the usual culprit is the threadworm.

You catch worms by eating the worm's eggs which hatch in the intestines to produce the worm. This worm will then travel out the intestines and lay further eggs around the anus, causing itching. If the area is scratched the eggs may lodge under the fingernails. They are then spread by touching food or other people, infecting either themselves again or others.

You can detect if your child has worms if they have the thread-like worms in their poo or suffer from an itching bottom, particularly at night, where the small eggs may be seen.

Treating worms is generally simple. Most people are treated successfully by preparations available from your community pharmacist. However, not all worm preparations are safe for all, so you need to seek advice about whether worm treatments are suitable for everyone in your family. It is usual to treat all family members, in case the infection has spread beyond the affected person. If you cannot be treated for any reason, then you should be careful to practice good hygiene, keeping fingernails short and well-scrubbed, especially after touching an infected person or their belongings. Affected skin, particularly around the bottom, can be soothed by protective creams used for nappy rash.

If you believe that you or anyone in your family may have worms, consult your community pharmacist for treatments and advice on how to prevent reinfection.

Another youth activity zone supporter Malcolm Norton said, "The result is a great outcome and having been involved since 2002, I am still coming to terms with the fact that the Activity Zone is now going to be a reality. Patience does pay off."

Trapping workshop to encourage more people to help protect Brynderwyn kiwi

A trapping workshop to be held in the Waipu Celtic Barn on 6 September aims to encourage more local people to join in the effort to protect kiwi and other native birds in and around the Brynderwyn hills .

"It's a great way to build fitness, meet some new people and feel like you're making a difference" says Graeme Giles, who co-ordinates the trapping-group.

"Our rosters mean that we only need to go out on the traplines for about four hours, one day a month or fortnight, depending on availability and weather. We've been going out for over two years now and it's rewarding to know the number of kiwi are increasing"

Locals are also reporting more frequent sightings of kereru, kaka and bell-bird in the Mangawhai and Waipu areas.

Landowners are also getting in on the act running trap lines on their land. In the last 12 months an estimated 5,000 stoats, weasels, possums, rats and other pest animals have been removed due to their combined efforts.

The group is supported with funding by the Northland Regional Council which recognises the area as having high conservation values.

The workshop will run from 1.30pm to 4pm with trapping specialist Todd Hamilton from Kiwi Coast covering the essential on how and where to set traps for mustelids and possum . Graeme and other Waipu Kiwis volunteers will be on hand to discuss how to join an existing roster or to form a new group

One Tree Point Primary School has a new wood carving which will go display at the foyer entrance to the school alongside the office reception area.

Len Webb carved the image of a whale's tail out of puriri. School Principal Julie Winters explained how consulting with local iwi she had learned that the One Tree Point School is located on land known as Te Ara Kahika or Pathway of Chiefs being the route Nga Puhi chiefs took when they journeyed south.

She also learned that a name of Whangarei Harbour is Te Renga Paraoa, resting place of whales and that whales are synonymous with chieftainship.

The whale carving is therefore an appropriate symbol for the school and the koru patterns carved into it represent the schools four values, which are: confidence, respect, aroha and encouragement to form the acronym - CARE.

The carving was blessed by kaumatua Paraire Pirihi.

Mr Webb would not take any payment for the carving so the school made a donation to the Whangarei Coastguard of which he is a member. Initially the presentation was to have taken place at a full school assembly but under Covid 19 Level 2 restrictions the ceremony took place in the staff room on Wednesday 19 August.

Celebrations at Ruakaka School

When Marilyn Dunn took on the principal's job at the school in July 2005, just 78 students attended the school. "By August we were up to 100 and on 3 November 2015 we got to 200," she says. Five years on, the school hit the 300 mark in mid-August.

After months of building delays due to the Covid-19 lockdown, the school's new pool has also just been completed. Mrs Dunn decided to combine the pool opening and roll growth celebrations in one event. Students voted to wear pyjamas for their celebration day and all classes made hats. The school's garden to table group, under the supervision of teacher Jennifer Hay, produced 300 cupcakes.

The new pool, funded by the board of trustees, is three times larger than the old 30,000 litre pool and is also heated - no doubt to the envy of all former Ruakākā students who suffered through swimming lessons in the school's tiny and frigid old pool built in 1957.

"We were going to make the old pool better, but it was ugly and would cost too much," she told students at the opening. "So we brought in a bulldozer and started again - every part of it is new."

Many schools no longer have pools, she says, but she

feels it is important for Ruakākā children to learn to swim, especially because they live near the beach. "If you can learn to swim in this pool, hopefully you will be safer when you swim in the sea."

The pool is just the latest in a series of development and improvements Mrs Dunn and the school's board have initiated since her arrival and will not be the last.

Next on the agenda is a shade sail over the netball court and a new outdoor learning area and the school is waiting on two temporary classrooms which Mrs Dunn hopes will arrive in the next school holidays. With the roll predicted to continue rising, a large two-stage Ministry of Education-funded redevelopment of the school is in the final planning stages.

Stage one, due to start towards the end of next year, will see a new nine-classroom block and administration block added, while the old office area and a classroom block will be gutted, for a net gain of four new class-

In stage two, within five years, the school will gain another classroom block plus a large hall and library space.

Weekly bus service to continue

The weekly passenger bus service between Kaiwaka and Whangarei with pick ups and drop offs in Mangawhai, Mangawhai Heads, Langs Beach, Waipu Cove, Waipu and Ruakaka will run for another year. The Northland Regional Council has contracted Leabourn Passenger Services for another 12 months to run the service.

Anita Child, the NRC's Transport Project Officer said the service had proven successful with an average of 15 passengers on the bus for each journey. Lyndon Leabourn said he is really pleased and surprised at how well the service is going. He said if not for the Covid 19 lockdown when passenger numbers dropped the average number of passengers per trip would be 20 or more.

He said the service is very well supported in Kaiwaka, Waipu and Ruakaka but for some reason not so much in Mangawhai. However, the NRC had wanted to keep including Mangawhai in the route for another year's

Mr. Leabourn said some used the return service to Whangarei and back every week and, surprisingly, these regulars included young people as well as retirees.

The New Zealand Transport Authority and the Northland Regional Council subsidize the service. A return trip to Whangarei from Langs Beach costs \$10, from Waipu - \$8 and from Ruakaka - \$7.

Four Square footpath blockade causing problems for elderly

The pedestrian footpath, which runs along the front of the Waipu Four Square has once again been blocked forcing pedestrians to walk behind vehicles angle parked in front of the supermarket.

Beryl Wilcox, a resident of Saorsa Village said she complained about this arrangement to the store manager.

Beryl said, "An elderly person with or without a walker is forced behind the parked cars" when they exit the store. She pointed out that many elderly people, some of whom are deaf, shop at the Four Square and regularly walk along the footpath to get to the rest of the Waipu Shops.

Beryl put in the complaint around 1.30pm on Thursday 20 August to the day manager. She went back at 3.30pm but "nothing was altered."

She said, "I wonder if that manager would have any concerns if some one is hit by a backing car. Just a little more thought has to be put into this and why it is blocked to start with I have know idea as our response level with Covid 19 has not changed very much."

Waipu Four Square owner Jodie Ansell said the blockade would remain as long as we are under Covid 19 Response Level 2. She said that under this level only ten people are allowed in the store at a time and the cones and tape are in place to narrow the store entrance so numbers can be controlled.

Asked if it is legal for a business to block off a public footpath she suggested the issue be taken up with the Prime Minister who she said put in place the rule about how many people could be in the store under the Level 2 response.

Jodie said," Our entrance is an automatic door. If four people converge on it at once, which happens all the time with people coming in all directions then we are not achieving our physical distancing"

She said, "The cones are not ideal. I have a mother in a mobility scooter myself but it is the only option we can do to keep following the protocol and to keep our shop as safe as possible."

"We need to restrict numbers in our store by Law. This is not negotiable and only when we reach Level 1 again will people be free to come and go as they please." The store also has lines painted on the footpath and spots for people to stand at the checkout to preserve the required two square metres distances between customers.

Have the godwits arrived early this year?



The photos above and below were emailed to the Bream Bay News by Kevin Wigmore of Ruakaka on Thursday 20 August.

Kevin said, "I was just enjoying breakfast this morning when we noticed a large flock of birds over the Ruakaka beach and estuary area in from of the Hen. I quickly took some long range photos from where we are and then took off down to the beach to get closer and see what birds they were because they were not the normal gulls or gannets and so on. Once I got down to the beach and river mouth I was delighted to see large numbers of godwits and was able to get a bit closer than normal. Usually you cannot get within cooee of them. I think it may have been because they were still exhausted from their huge migration flight. This was exciting and I took some photos with my big lenses."

Bev McCracken also sent in a photo of a flock of godwits at Marsden Cove.

However Simon Ellison, a long time observer of the shorebirds at the Ruakaka estuary, said the godwits migrating from Alaska don't usually arrive here until mid-September and he thinks the birds seen at the Ruakaka estuary on 20 Thursday may have been juveniles, which overwinter here, gathering in Ruakaka due to an extreme high tide which forces them off their usual roosting sites.

We sent Kevin's photos to the Miranda Shorebird Centre and Keith Woodley from the centre backed up Simon's theory but also allowed the possibitly that these could be early arrivals of the migration flock.

He said, "On an initial assessment, many of the birds may have been pushed off other roosts by high tides. This is supported by some of the birds seen in flight being in wing moult i.e. replacing their flight feathers. This would indicate birds that have been here through the winter (mainly immatures -We had over 500 godwits in the Firth over winter.) Arriving birds do not begin their wing moult until they have been here for a few days.

"On the other hand, two observers did see newly arrived birds on the Manukau Harbour at the weekend. So there may well be new birds up your way as well."

Kevin has sent through a high resolution photo of the Ruakaka godwits for the experts at Miranda to examine. Around 3,000 bar tailed godwits (of the approximate 90,000 which migrate annually to New Zealand) return from Alaska to the Whangarei Harbour each spring. They arrive here having completed a 11,000 kilometre,

eight to nine day journey across the central Pacific Ocean from their breeding ground in western Alaska. This is the longest non-stop journey recorded for any bird.

They spend the summer feeding on molluscs, crabs and worms in the intertidal zone, storing up body fat in preparation for their return journey in the autumn.

Kevin calls the Godwits the "Pinocchio" birds because of their very long beaks in relation to the rest of their body.



thank Katie Hirst and Alison Rodgers of the Carter Holt Harvey LVL plant who have been operating the programme from the Rama Rd. plant. Tomascio Paul, who works at the plant, recently passed his restricted driver's license test on his first attempt after receiving instruction from volunteer driver mentor Trevor Robson.

Tomascio said it took him 20 years to get his learner's license and then another 20 years to pass his restricted. With the

help of the driver mentor programme it might not take quite so long to gain his full license.

Gillian Archer of the Northland Road safety Trust said she had tried for many years to get the programme, which assists people through the stages of achieving their full driver's licenses and had kept running into brick walls. But last year at the Bream Bay Jobs Expo held at the Ruakaka Recreation Centre things had begun to fall into place when she met Katie who offered to help. At a meeting shortly afterwards of Ray Whites Bream Bay had offered to provide a vehicle

John Williamson the chairman of the Northland Road Safety Trust said this was the fifth community driver mentor programme to be set up in Northland and he thanked Gillian for her work. He said when young people are stopped by the Police and receive fines for not having a driver's license this could start their whole lives to spiral downwards.

Katie and Alison will both be leaving their employment at the LVL plant at the end of this month as production is being cut back to around a quarter of its former output. The driver mentor programme will be transferred to the Bream Bay Community Trust.




