Back to school

Most of Bream Bay's children were back at school last week after weeks at home in Lockdown.

Julie Turner, Principal of Waipu Primary said it was lovely to welcome them all back.

Ninety two percent of the children had returned last week although some parents had decided that they enjoyed the experience of home schooling and were intending to continue with this.

During the two weeks of Level 3 at first nine children, whose parents were working in essential services attended but this grew to 19, which Mrs. Turner said was good because they could split the children into two groups, one junior and one senior.

Back at school under Level 2 there were a few new arrangements in place. There is a lot of hand washing going on. Drinking fountains cannot be used. Children are asked to bring their own water bottles.

Parents waiting after school to collect children are asked to social distance on the footpath outside the school and teachers take the children outside to meet them.

Lists are kept of children getting on and off the school buses.

Some of the children were a bit anxious so teachers are making sure to get routines up and running again. Most however were happy to be back and excited to see their friends again.

Val Klink in the office at One Tree Point Primary said the school had "hand sanitizer for Africa."

Children were being spaced out as much as possible and parents entering the school had to sign in.

Some parents had said their children were "not quite ready to return" to school yet. On Monday of last week

EDITORIAL

Battling over mangroves - another local sport to get up and running after Lockdown

Is this another popular local sport, which people can engage in now that the strictest regulations of the COVID 19 lockdown have been lifted. I mean all the arguing over the subject of mangroves – should they stay or should they go?

I have friends and people I like and respect on both sides of this battlefield

I think both groups have genuinely held beliefs but if anything I have to come down on the side of the mangroves. I understand they are spreading and taking over places they never grew in the past. Look at how widespread they are at Oakleigh! But they are there for a reason. They are an example of Mother Nature doing her best to put right the damage us humans have caused.

Mangroves grow in silt and they help hold back the nutrient laden silt that flows down our rivers and streams and into the sea.

If mangrove proliferation is a problem then cutting and plucking them out at the estuary is at best a shortterm solution and could have some negative consequences. Its hard to find a definitive explanation as to why all that red seaweed forms in large rafts with increasing frequency in summer in Bream Bay and then washes up in a thick, smelly mess covering the sand at Waipu Cove but a likely cause is an excess of nutrient run off from the land.

As I made my way out over the mud flats to take the photo of the mangrove pluckers last Saturday morning I noted how densely little mangrove plants are itat for this species. Keeping the mangroves at bay is likely to take many working bees over many, many years.

I think the cause of the mangrove spread and the ultimate solution lies inland along the banks of our rivers and streams. We need some comprehensive riparian plantings and revegetation of eroding hillsides. This could be a project to gainfully employ some of the local people who will lose their jobs in all the post lockdown restructuring of local industry. But where would the money come from? The Northland Regional Council is cutting its proposed rate increase from 4.6% to 2.2% so will have less money to spend on projects to safeguard our environment.

These are uncertain times. The COVID 19 epidemic was one thing but now we have to face some of the economic fall out. Our two biggest local employers the Marsden Point Refinery and the Carter Holt Harvey LVL plant are both looking a bit shaky. To be fair both of these plants were facing problems before COVID 19 but the lockdown seems to have pushed them over the edge. I hope people who lose their jobs as these two industries restructure can find new perhaps more purposeful occupations. It was interesting to talk to Garth Mortensen the force behind the North Sawn Lumber timber processing plant in Ruakaka. He said as his company is smaller and not as specialized as the LVL plant he can find opportunities and niche markets in this post COVID environment. This is certainly a time of change and if we are to be successful and thrive we need to be adaptable and nimble on our feet.

The battle of the mangroves - back on

The perennial mangrove battle is back on. Six years ago the Ruakaka Parish Residents and Ratepayers Association gained Northland Regional Council consents to chainsaw mature mangroves and pluck out baby ones from a defined area between Princess Rd. and the Ruakaka Beach Holiday Park.

Last Saturday after receiving a notice from 25 May members returned with weedeaters to cut out clumps and a team of supporters to pull out the small mangrove plants, which are coming up thick and fast amongst the glasswort and seagrass.

When they arrived they were met by a group of people holding placards.

Roberta Jones of Bream Bay Coastal Care and the Royal Forest and Bird Protection Society is strongly opposed to what she sees as destruction of native trees and habitat in a designated wild life refuge.

Warren Daniel, secretary of the Ruakaka Ratepayers argues that mangroves never grew here in the past, is spreading rapidly and are taking over a salt marsh area that provides habitat to specialised species.

He sent out an email notice to supporters with a copy going to Mrs. Jones expressing glee that the group could once again get to work on the mangroves after the COVID 19 lockdown (with approved hygien and distancing rules).

He said in the notice, "We feel that the results of the work we have done in our permitted areas have been very worthwhile. The saltmarsh grasses and other plants are really thriving, and there has probably been 150 to 300mm of muddy silt washed out with a more sandy stream bottom and sides becoming apparent. We do not believe that we have ruined any bird habitat - in fact, it is probably enhanced."

Mrs. Jones has asked the Department of Conservation to put a moratorium on the mangrove destruction and spent Saturday morning acting as a watchdog on behalf of the Forest and Bird Society. She had a clipboard with a map showing a shaded area the Ruakaka Ratepayers consent related to and was checking no mangrove removal occurred outside this area.

Up near the bridge on Ruakaka Beach Road the protesters held up their banners for passing traffic to see and argued with the mangrove pluckers working below alongside the river under the bridge.

Their placards proclaimed that mangroves have been here for at least 19 million and that they have an important role to play in cleaning the river water before it enters the sea.

The Ruakaka Residents and Ratepayers plan more mangrove control working bees are for 6 and 7 June and 21 and 22 June.









Footpath blockade to stay until Level 1



This blockade across the footpath outside the Waipu Four Square will remain in place until the Government announces a move to Level One in its COVID 19 response plan. Jodie Ansell the Four Square owner said under Level 2 the store was requied to have no more than 10 customers inside at one time and if people queuing outside in the opposite direction they would be blocking the delivery truck entrance to the east of the store. Jodie said she understood the blockade forced people to walk behind angle parked vehicles which needed to back out onto the road, but said there was not much which could be done about this until the move down to Level One.

No Ruakaka Racing until January 2021

It appears there will be no more racing at the Ruakaka track this year.

Bill Colgan, General Manager of the Whangarei Racing Club said, "Given the circumstances, every sport is facing a different second half of the year than in previous years, with many dramatic changes to the calendar of sporting fixtures. NZ thoroughbred racing is no different, and for the Whangarei Racing Club it appears there will be no more racing this year. The Club had its last meeting on January 4th.

He explained the sport of racing is now under the leadership of a body known as the Racing Industry Transition Agency which has replaced the NZ Racing Board, and this body has recently circulated a draft racing calendar for the period 1 August 2020 to 31 July 2021. The Whangarei Racing Club has not been allocated a race meeting in the 2020 period. However what he says is "a very pleasing six" meetings are allocated from January to the end of July 2021.

"The Club believes that allocation ensures its future."

The challenge now however will be maintaining the facility and training centre over the rest of 2020 without the income generated from race meetings and race sponsorship.

Charities such as Hospice and local school and sports clubs, which fundraise by helping to run race meetings will also be impacted.

A farm access road or a link to SH1?

A long running neighbourhood dispute at Takahiwai took another turn last weekend when some local people protested with banners and claimed, on a Maori Television News item, that farmers Jim and Don Fraser had unlawfully formed a farm track into a "two lane metal road.'

A facebook page entitled Takahiwai Road Extension, We Say No has been launched with photographs of people holding placards at the protest. The Facebook Page says the formation of a road from the farm track has linked Takahiwai Rd. to the Fraser farm access at Cotton Rd. and from there to State Highway One and warns this would have a number of negative impacts on the Takahiwai community.

"Our generally quiet rural area will be impacted on by traffic flowing back and forth from Cotton Rd -State Highway One connection to One Tree Point all day long."

"Rate increases will immediately come into effect and impact on all landowners at Takahiwai to account for upgrading, road widening and footpaths."

But Don Fraser said he and his brother have no intention of linking the farm road to Cotton Rd. The road the work was carried out on remains as one lane and it was classed as a restricted farm road before his family took ownership of the land it sits on in 1992.

The Hilton family, who own two blocks of land accessed over the road in question, have been at loggerheads with the Frasers for many years.

Leigh Butler (ne Hilton) has made multiple applications to the Maori Land Court regarding the status of the access road and a block of land the Frasers purchased from Wati Tito (an uncle of the Hilton family). In 2005 Mrs. Butler took a case to the Maori Land Court claiming that the road, remained Maori Land in her family's ownership. However, Judge D.J. Ambler ruled that the road was part of the block the Fraser family company had purchased with an easement across it to the Hilton's land.

In another claim, Mrs.Butler said the block purchased by the Frasers from her uncle was Maori Freehold Land but Judge Ambler ruled this became General Freehold Land before it was sold to the Frasers.

Mr. Fraser said he is getting too old for all this conflict and would like to sell the land but the protesting and Maori Television coverage is not making this easy. He has sought legal advice about claims being made, which he says are simply not true.

The Fraser family, which arrived in New Zealand as migrants from Nova Scotia, has owned land in the Takahiwai/Cotton Rd. area for 106 years. 319 hectares of farmland in nine titles, owned by the Frasers is now being advertised for sale on Trade Me. Don

Fraser said his preference would be to sell the land to a farmer and a possible house site sits alongside the upgraded road.

Last month Bream Bay Police received a complaint that under Covid 19 Lockdown Level 4, work had been carried out on the road, which was graded and that metal had been trucked in and spread.

Sergeant Simon Craig acknowledged receiving the complaint but said Police did not act on it as farm related activities were allowed to continue under Lockdown Level 4.

A call was also made to Heritage New Zealand to alert this organization to the possibility that the excavations involved in grading the road may have disturbed archeological sites. Mrs. Butler told the Bream Bay News that Heritage New Zealand had advised every landowner in the vicinity that earthworks should not be carried out without an archeological survey first being undertaken.

Mrs. Butler said she suspected the work was being undertaken when no one was around to witness it. But Mr. Fraser said the upgrade of the road was necessary so a water supply to cattle could be maintained. He said the work was simply maintenance of an existing farm road and the machinery used went nowhere near a pa site on the property.

He said aerial photographs being circulated and included in the television item, which appear to show extensive earth works on the pa site and over the whole property may have been photoshoped as the pa site is currently covered in green grass.

Bill Edwards Area Manager of Heritage New Zealand in Northland said, as with many coastal areas in the north, there are numerous sites of interest on the Takahiwai coastline. Once COVID 19 Lockdown rules eased to Level 2 he had engaged an archeologist to inspect the roadworks. The archeologist had reported back that no damage to a site had occured with the recent work.

LVL plant workers facing mulitple redundancies

One of Bream Bay's biggest employers, the Carter Hold Harvey Future Build LVL plant announced last week it would be cutting back production at its Marsden Point plant which would likely result in redundancy for around half of its 325 workers.

Carter Holt Harvey (CHH) chief executive Prafull Kesha said on an RNZ News report, the LVL export business was unprofitable and the plant would concentrate on its domestic market. Exports accounted for around 70% of the plant's production.

He said Carter Holt Harvey had started its consulta-

This news comes on top of an announcement by another big local employer NZ Refining Ltd. that its operations are under review

ANXIETY

It is normal to feel anxious from time to time, however when those feelings interfere with normal daily life it is time to seek help.

Anxiety facts

Anxiety disorders affect about 15% of the population and 'generalised anxiety disorder' is the most common. The other types of anxiety disorders include: Panic attack

- Phobias
- Obsessive compulsive disorder Post-traumatic stress disorder

People with generalised anxiety disorder get extremely worried about things, and may feel overwhelmed with fear and anxiety even when there is no reason to worry.

Other signs of this anxiety disorder include feelings of restlessness, a sense of dread, feeling irritable, having difficulty concentrating, headaches, irregular heart beat and poor sleep. The signs can come on slowly or quickly and left untreated, the feelings can build up so much that people lose their confidence and avoid socialising out of fear or dread.

The feelings of anxiety may be a sign of some other underlying condition so it is important to talk to your doctor. There are a variety of options for treating the signs of anxiety including:

Talking therapy or cognitive behavioural therapy by a psychologist or mental health specialist.

Anxiety management and relaxation techniques such as hypnotherapy, meditation, breathing exercises and counselling.

Anti-anxiety medication may be required for a short time but they are not recommended for long term use. Depending on any other signs and underlying conditions, other longer term medications may be recommended.

Tips for self-management

Exercising regularly can improve mood and wellbeing.

Cut down on caffeine, sugar, and energy drinks. These can speed up the heart and interfere with sleep.

Cutting out or reducing smoking and alcohol, as these have been shown to make anxiety worse.

Talk to your friends and family for support, and ask us about support organisations in the area.

Read books, use online programmes and anxiety apps that help you learn about anxiety and how to overcome it.

Second Auckland Ferry Terminal berth on its way from SPIND workshop

A second berth and gangway built in the SPIIND workshop in Marsden Point Rd. for the Auckland ferry terminal extension was barged to Auckland on Tuesday. This will be berth 5. Berth 6 also built at SPIND and sent to Auckland in October is already in use.

This will leave five more sections of the new terminal still to go, with two already underway in the workshop.

Paul Hebberd SPIIND Managing Director said the COVID 19 lockdown slowed things down with the workshop shut with just a few people working on essential maintenance engineering projects for the duration. Level 2 distancing requirements continue to make things difficult as only a few tradesmen can be at work on an project at any one time.

"But it's a necessary evil", he said.

The ferry terminal work is expected to be completed in October and the next big project is a training simulator for the Australian defence force. Mr. Hebberd said he could not be too specific about what this was.

Refinery continues to operate at reduced capacity

The Marsden Point oil refinery will continue to operate at a reduced capacity for at least another week and people living nearby will see a change in flaring. Due to lower demand for fuel, the refinery is operating in a cyclical mode, where process units are operated in turn.

Ellie Martel the refinery's Government Relations Manager said, "This 'stop-start' mode is a rigorous process which will result in some flaring for safety reasons."

She said, "Refining NZ works hard to minimise our impact on the environment and the community, and to keep flaring as short and as infrequent as possible."

Two oil tankers remain out in Bream Bay unable to come into the refinery wharf to discharge their cargoes of crude oil. The Ocean Lady arrived on 11 April and is not due to come into Jetty 1 at the refinery until 4 June.

The coastal tanker Matuku has been in the bay since 21 April and on the Northport website is not scheduled to come into the refinery jetty until 10 June.

Refining NZ is currently undergoing a review with four options on the table: Continuing the current "refinery model", altering this "model" through adjustments to processing and distribution agreements, separating the refining and infrastructure assets, or converting to an import terminal.

The company says some of its assets and capabilities could help New Zealand's transition to a lower carbon economy, for example in the production of liquid hydrogen and biofuels.

The company's profit margins have fallen due to new competitive refineries coming on stream in South Korea, China, Singapore and India.

There has been another burglary from an industrial site in Ruakaka. On 9 May two batteries were stolen from a forklift in Innovate Road, off Marsden Point Rd. This is the eighth in a series of reported thefts of batteries and scrap metal from Ruakaka industrial sites.

(18 May) the roll was down by 30 but by Tuesday there were just 21 absences. During level three four children whose parents were working in essential services came to school.

Ruakaka primary had just one child and one teacher attend school during the two weeks of Level 3. Last Tuesday (19 May) 60 children had still not returned and as at Waipu Primary, some parents had decided they quite liked the home schooling idea. To home school a child in New Zealand you must apply to the Ministry of Education for an exemption from enrolment at a registered school. The Ministry will then assess your application to see if it meets the legal requirements that your child will be taught as regularly and as well as in a registered school.

All parents and visitors coming into Ruakaka school was asked to write their name and time of arrival in a book at the entrance to the school office.

Wayne Buckland Principal of Bream Bay College reports that on Monday 18 May, 510 of the school's 580 students attended. The morning assembly, which was held via a zoom link with students watching in their whanau classrooms. Students are asked to sit at assigned desks and the desks are being frequently wiped down. Rolls are being kept of students riding on the school buses and no standing on the bus is allowed.

The school grounds are being kept closed for the first two weeks under level 2 for everyone but staff and students.

A young One Tree Point footballer hasn't let a viral pandemic stop him competing in the game he loves.

Max Whitehead, 15, a year 11 student at Bream Bay College was looking forward to his first year playing for Bream Bay United's senior men's football team in the Northland premier league – but instead of kicking a ball on the field, he's started the season beating the competition online.

When New Zealand went into Level 4 lockdown and all football games and training were cancelled for the foreseeable future, the Auckland and Northland Football Federations organised an E Sports competition with three age groups: junior, youth and senior in both PS4 or X-box divisions.

Max was one of 48 players entered in the PS4 youth (14-19 years) division and has so far won all his games reaching top four in his grade, with a semi-final game scheduled for this week.

Max says his competitive streak and online gaming experience stood him in good stead for the competition but even so is slightly surprised by his success. "I went into it with high hopes," he says. "And I thought I would be pretty decent but assumed there would be someone really good out there."

All players compete in the game FIFA 2020, and can choose any country's team to play with. Each team's players are graded equally, so games rely on a player's skills and strategy rather than having a team loaded with top players. Max has played with his favourite team, the French National team in each game, and has enjoyed taking them to victory every time. "I think in one of the games I was down 2-0 but came back to win 3-2 which felt pretty good."

An avid follower of the French team for about five years, Max hopes to one day see them play live, maybe at the World Cup in 2022 in Qatar. "That would be amazing, it would be a dream come true."

Max hopes to take the French team all the way to the top in this competition. His semi-final on Wednesday against Auckland player Jacob Woolford from Bay Olympic will be live-streamed so an audience can watch, but Max is not putting too much pressure on himself. There are no prizes up for grabs, just the glory of winning. "I haven't been too nervous so far – it was just for lockdown fun," he says. "I don't think anything can replace real football."

He says what he has missed most about football is the fun of being part of a team. The main drawcard of getting back to school last week was the chance to kick a football around at lunchtime with his mates – although they have to disinfect the ball regularly – and last Friday Max had the good news that real-life football training would start up again this week.

Linking Hands back on the road

The Linking Hands service, which drives people with no other means to medical appointments, is back in action after closing down for the duration of the Level 4 and Level 3 COVID 19 lockdown.

Wayne Wrack, chairman of the Linking Hands board, said the service could not operate under the lockdown, as it was not deemed essential under the terms of the COVID 19 Level 3 and 4 rules. Linking Hands holds no contracts with the Ministry of Health and people who needed transportation for urgent medical attention could use the ambulance service. Also, it would have been impossible for drivers to keep the required safe distance from passengers.

Linking Hands is based in Maungaturoto and operates in Mangawhai, Maungaturoto, Kaiwaka, Waipu, Ruakaka and One Tree Point. The service has seven vehicles, one of which has a hoist for wheelchairs. Two cars are kept in Bream Bay, one in a garage at the Ranburn retirement complex. Linking Hands is currently in search of garage to house its Ruakaka vehicle. There are a total of 70 Linking Hands volunteer drivers. New volunteers are always welcome, and are particularly needed at present in Kaiwaka, Maungaturoto and Mangawhai.

Anyone interested in becoming a volunteer or in booking a ride to a medical appointment should phone 09 431 8969 between 10am and 4pm week days. It is best if people book their rides as soon as they are given an appointment they will need transport to.



it was just terrible. I really felt for them." Throughout lockdown, Dunkerton kept himself busy in the garden, and monitored his swimmers as they worked to keep their fitness levels up at home. They emailed him their week's activities and he sent them back comments. With the season's one remaining competition in their sights, NZ Short Course Championships scheduled for October in Auckland, that dry land training over lockdown has kept the swimmers' fitness levels up to a reasonable standard, he says. Dunkerton hopes to take 10 swimmers, all his top squad, to the October competition. Twenty-eight swimmers are now back training location in the standard in a substantial standard.

they really were," he says of their first training session after lockdown. "And it was huge for me."

Dunkerton trains two squads of older swimmers, while his daughter Tiana Birchall trains a junior development group. He and Birchall worked with Sport Northland and Sport New Zealand on the best way to manage coaching under Alert Level Two and Dunkerton says holding training at a private pool makes it easier to control than if they were at a public pool. Bream Bay Swimming Club's annual prizegiving, usually held in May, is postponed until restrictions on group gatherings ease.





Fresh Choice donates to local foodbanks

Earlier this month (15 May) Fresh Choice Ruakaka gave away \$1,000 worth of groceries to local food banks. The donation went to three recipients: The Lifepoint Church, The Bream Bay Community Trust and Phil Paikea who has been working with the Salvation Army to give out food parcels to people in need. Phil says close to 400 people came up his drive in Peter Snell Rd. in Ruakaka to collect food parcels.

"We asked them to stay in their cars and just gave them a big smile and an elbow bump.

Many of the recipients were people who had been laid off work for the COVID 19 Lockdown.

Phil said these people were finding the sudden drop in income hard. The Government wage subsidy paid 80% of people's wages with rents and feeding their families to cope with.

Five Filipino men who worked for a subcontractor at the refinery called in for parcels.

They told Phil they had been fishing everyday to feed themselves and had wide smiles when they were each handed a food parcel.

Phil purchased a trailer with sidewalls to transport all the supplies from Whangarei. As well as the Fresh Choice contribution he received regular donations of unsold buns from Ruakaka's Country Bakery.

The Paikea family bundled the food up into packs for singles, couples and families. People came from Mangapai, Ruakaka, One Tree Point and Waipu. A woman from Waipu collected food packs to deliver to elderly members of that community.

Phil said, "There was no need for people to be embarrassed about needing help. There have been times when me and my wife have stood in that line."

Phil belongs to an organization called Safe Man Safe Family, which works to stop family violence, and each food pack contained a leaflet with the phone number 1737 for people to call if they needed to talk to someone.

The demand for the parcels is slowing down now that people are back at work.

Climbing asparagus, a killer of our native bush

Climbing asparagus is one weed that just ruins the native bush said Prioa/Brynderwyn weed action co-ordinator Sara Brill.

"While it climbs, it winds its way around tree trunk and stems stopping their growth and causing weak points where the tree will break in a wind. Not content to kill the big trees, it also smothers the ground and any small seedlings trying to come through. A real forest killer."

Climbing asparagus has small berries in late spring and the seeds are happily dispersed by birds.

This doesn't happen over night though. Back in the days of the first few batches and gardens in Waipu through to Mangawhai it was a popular garden plant providing a soft green backdrop for more colourful flowering plants. Owners could leave it for months at a time it and it would still survive. The latest drought has made much of it look dead – but its just waiting for the autumn and winter rain to burst into life and begin its devastation again through spring and summer.

Weed Action Piroa Brynderwyn is asking residents to keep an eye out for this in their gardens and properties and take action to destroy it.

"Check your neighbours too and form a neighbourhood group to 'find and destroy' it in your area."

Climbing asparagus plants have a 'crown' - where the stems join the roots. Small plants and infestations can

have the crown cut out and hung in the tree to die. This can be done at any time of the year.

Herbicide is much quicker and easier solution for larger areas. During autumn and winter in coastal areas is the best time to control with herbicide. Weedbusters recommend glyphosate at 10mls per 1 litre water with no penetrant if you need to spray against tree trunks. In spring and summer you will need to double this rate. Make sure there will be no rain for 24hrs after treatment.

"It's a little bit scary to think about what might happen if we go backwards and go into lockdown again. I'm trying not to think too much about that but to focus ahead."






