Three arrests after **Police search home** of Waipu School **Principal**

Police have made three arrests after carrying out a search warrant on what the Bream Bay News understands to be the home of Waipu Primary School Principal, Jo Brown in the Braigh, in central Waipu on Friday morning 25 January at around 8am.

Early morning commuters reported a number of police vehicles including a Police van, Police dogs and dog handlers outside the address.

Police arranged for the warrant after a series of burglaries in rural Waipu targeting jewellery and firearms.

A quantity of jewellery, electronics and firearms were recovered from the house along with a significant amount of methamphetamine and other drugs.

The three people arrested have been remanded in custody and police enquiries are continuing with further arrests possible.

One of those under arrest is Chris Ngarino, whom the Bream Bay News understands reside in the house with Ms. Brown. He has been charged with two counts of burglary, possession of cannabis, possession of methamphetamine, possession of methamphetamine for supply and possession of firearms. Mr. Ngarino has been remanded in Ngawha Prison. He has applied for bail and this request was due to be considered in the Whangarei District Court on 31 January.

EDITORIAL

The world would be a better place if grandmothers took charge

I am addicted to American politics. My favourite leisure activity at present is watching youtube news clips on the subject of the American government shutdown and the special investigation into Russian influence in the 2016 election as one after another of the associates of Donald Trump are hauled before the courts. Nancy Pelosi, the Democratic leader of the American House of Representatives, who stood firm against President Trump's threat of maintaining the government shutdown for years if necessary so that he could get funding for his border wall, is my new heroine. I was astounded to learn that that elegant, smart and forceful woman is 78-years-old. Finally here is someone who has the measure of Donald Trump. I have long held the view that the world would be a better place if grandmothers took charge.

Our own local government elections are coming up. Election date is set for Saturday 12 October 2019. So now is the time for anyone who might consider standing for a seat on the Whangarei District Council or the Northland Regional Council to firm up his or her plans.

I really need to turn my attention away from what is happening in America and look at the political scene closer to home. There are parallels and lessons to be learned though. The first is that people need to pay attention. A knowledgeable engaged community is likely to end up with better political representation than one that doesn't care and is looking the other way.

The second is that politics are much more important than game show entertainment. The politicians we elect will be making decisions in the real world and there will be consequences for real people. The Whangarei District Council spent approximately \$183 million of public money in the 2017/2018 year. How effectively this money is used can be seen in the state of our roads, the reliability of our waste water treatment, the safety and reliability of our freshwater supply and in community assets such as parks, libraries, footpaths, walkways and cycleways, which contribute to the health and well being of us all.

We need to be wary of meaningless slogans and people who shout a lot. "Build the Wall," and "Make America Great Again" appealed to a certain kind of conservative American but where were the realistic plans to make these things happen?

Don't be misled by conspiracy theorists. For the most part politicians are not evil geniuses hoodwinking the rest of the populous so they can manipulate the world to their own ends. Most are hard working and trying their best to make things better for their fellow citizens. Political aspirants who run their campaigns on the underlying theory that all the sitting councilors are stupid and corrupt are not very credible in my eyes. I would place much more trust in someone who showed respect for the work our councilors do but who is asking for the opportunity to demonstrate they have the skills and personality to do better.

It's a tricky business getting re-elected every three years, especially when most voters don't have any idea about the conditions and constraints politicians work under.

Former President of the USA Barack Obama once described politics as being like a game of American football. Most of the time there are defenders blocking your progress "but every once in a while, you'll see a line. And then there's open field."

He said to make progress at all you have to take lots of punts. So perhaps we should be measuring the success or otherwise of our local government politicians in the number of punts they take on our behalf and not just on the number of times they make it to the goalpost.

Nancy Pelosi though is a different kind of politician. She is someone who has been around a long time, works hard, who knows the system and understands the democratic principles it is based on. Crucially she has a good understanding of human nature, even the very strange nature of President Donald Trump.

With our own local government elections in mind, can I ask: are there any savvy seventy-plus-year old women out there with energy to burn, ready for a new challenge?

Last week there was an orange *Caution Advised* bubble beside a photo of the Piroa Water taken from the Falls on the LAWA *Can I swim here?* website. river supplies the town

So far this summer the site has been given either a red - *Unsafe to Swim* or the orange – *Caution Advised* rating and, in consultation with the Northland District Health Board, the Kaipara District Council has put up a sign warning people against swimming in the pool under the waterfall.

This mirrors what happened last summer when Northland Regional Council weekly water tests consistently showed high levels of E.coli in water samples taken from the pool.

If anything the contamination appears worse, as so far this summer there have been two instances when the level of E.coli found in 100mls of sample water reached 2,400. Water is deemed to be unsafe for swimming when the E.coli level is above 550 per 100mls.

Last summer (2017 -2018) was the first time Piroa Falls had been included in the because of the way the pipeline is configured

E.coli is a Faecal Indicator Bacteria (FIB) which points to the presence of faeces from warm blooded animals including humans and birds. The presence of E.coli in water indicates that harmful pathogens may also be present.

Last summer's consistent high E.coli levels at this site triggered further investigations by the NRC and water samples from the pool were sent to a laboratory for testing to identify the likely source of faecal contamination. The tests found that the E.coli present in the water came from both avian (bird) and ruminant (cattle, sheep or goats). Seepage from septic tanks can be ruled out, as the E.coli identified are not from the intestines of humans.

NRC staff have visited the catchment to see if they can pinpoint the problem. A large free-range chicken farm has come under scrutiny and was visited by an NRC officer. There are also farms, which graze cattle in the catchment.

Colin Dall, the NRC Group Manager Regulatory Services, said additional sampling will be done further up the catchment in an attempt to pinpoint the source of the contamination.

Piroa Falls is located on the Ahuroa River in the Waipu Gorge, 7km west of State Highway One. It can be reached via a short track down from the road and is popular picnic spot. Swimmers enjoy diving under the waterfall. A photograph of the falls appears on the cover of the Bream Bay local directory phone book.

The falls are upstream of a Whangarei District Council public water supply intake and treatment plant on the Ahuroa River near Waipu.


She said," I was utterly shocked by the search and until that point, I had been completely in the dark."

She said she has been supporting someone she considered to be a friend, with physical health issues, to find "his way in the world and starting a carving business." This man had been using space in her house and had access to the shed and the house.

She had been away for several weeks over the summer holidays and during this time a number of people had been staying at or had access to the house. These people had been involved in criminal activity.

Andrew Venmore, the WDC's Water Services Manager, said about half the Ahuroa River water ends up in Ruakaka. Most goes to the Marsden Point Refinery because of the way the pipeline is configured but some also ends up in the Ruakaka town water supply.

Mr. Venmore gives assurances that there is a robust four-step water treatment process at the Ahuroa plant. First chemicals are added to bind with any particles; the water is filtered and then treated with both chlorine and ultra violet light.

"We know that sometimes we can have these problems so we have this belt and braces approach to treatment."

Mr. Venmore said however that it is always better if the water taken for the public supply is of good quality and he will be raising the matter of the contamination at Piroa Falls at his next regular meeting with Mr. Dall.

Northland Regional Councillor Rick Stolwerk said he believes the problems with water contamination at Piroa falls may have existed for some time but only become apparent since the Northland Regional Council began testing the water there last summer.

He has looked at the free range chicken farm in the catchment and said at the time this didn't appear to be the source of the problem but has agreed, due to public concern, to take another look.

He said the regional council is being pro-active in trying to solve water quality problems around the region with tree planting programmes to reduce erosion on steep hill country.

Mr. Brown's email was followed by a message to parents from the Waipu School Board of Trustees, which read:

"In relation to the email you will have received earlier today from Jo Brown, the board of trustees (BOT) were advised by the NZ School Trustees Association (NZSTA) on Friday that there was no further action the board should take until we are contacted by a regional advisor from the NZSTA this week. Once the board has received further guidance from the NZSTA we will meet to consider the facts and recommendations and will inform you of any update to the situation at that time."

"The board's priority is to ensure that a safe environment exists for Waipu Primary's students and its employees."

The Board of Trustee email suggested people who had any questions regarding this matter should contact Ms. Brown or a member of the Board of Trustees.

Just two fairy tern chicks this summer

There are just two surviving tara-iti or fairy tern chicks this season.

This is the lowest breeding success rate for New Zealand's rarest breeding bird for 27 years and severely impacts on the species chances of survival. In the 2008/2009 season the fairy tern recovery programme reached a high point

with 12 successful fledgings but since then the most chicks to fledge in a summer has been six.

A female bird, half of a breeding pair went missing from the Waipu sandspit last summer after she was photographed by Department of Conservation ranger Ayla Wyles with a mysterious blue substance on the top of her head and holding a blue dyed fish in her beak. The photograph was sent to the Northland Regional Council, which investigated but found nothing, Investigating officers wondered if the blue colouring may have been a trick of the light. However, the blue-headed bird hasn't been seen since this incident and her two chicks left without a mother, subsequently died.

There remains just one infertile pair of fairy tern nesting on the Waipu sandspit. This pair is used as foster parents and successfully hatched a chick taken from a nest with two eggs on the Mangawhai sandspit this summer.

A chick also hatched from the single egg left in the Mangawhai nest but has since disappeared, which illustrates the important role the Waipu fostering pair play. The second remaining chick is at Pakiri beach.

Another female half of a breeding pair recently died at Papakanui and a second pair, which has historically nested there has disappeared. So with the loss of three breeding pairs, just five pairs remain.

The Department of Conservation employs fairy tern rangers to manage nesting sites on the Waipu and Mangawhai sandspits each summer and the Fairy Tern Trust pays for trapping programmes and provides volunteers to monitor nests.

Fairy tern were once widespread along the east coast of the upper North Island but largely but are very vulnerable to predators that sniff out their nests disguised amongst shells on the sand and to disturbance by humans and dogs.

Auckland Zoo has helped the Department of Conservation with incubation of eggs from time to time but as tfairy tern rely on fishing in an estuary they cannot be cared for in a captive envionment.

Waipu Surf Lifesaving Club takes the water safety message to unpatrolled beaches around the North

Members of the Waipu Surf Lifesaving Club having been touring Northland beaches helping to spread the work about water safety. They visited un-patrolled beaches in the Far North where there were drownings last year.

The trip was funded by an AMI community grant which Emma Baker, the Junior Club Captain won in a competition and was also supported by BP and the Northland Regional Council. Subway, Dargaville also provided them with lunch.

Eleven lifeguards and four junior surf members spent four days visiting the Kai Iwi Lakes, Matai Bay, Cable Bay, Taupo Bay and Matapouri Bay.

They demonstrated different rescue techniques using rescue tubes, boards and the Inflatable Rescue Boat as well as CPR, how to help someone who is choking and how to spot a rip. The also ran some water safety

games and obstacle courses for children.

They educated groups on how to keep their children and themselves safe by knowing their limits and spread the message: "If in doubt, stay out."

They told their audiences to always keep young children within arms reach in the water and to check the conditions first for hazards such a boats launching, surfers, river outlets and weather.

"No one is stronger than a rip," and if you do get caught in one remember the three Rs: Relax and float, Raise your arm, Ride the rip.

Club Captain Kath Manning said, "The tour was rewarding in many ways. It was great to help those rural communities that don't have a surf life saving presence, educating holiday makers about potential risks and how to stay safe, as well as being great development and team building for our lifeguards."



Police Report

Located at a residential address after fleeing Police

On Monday 14 January at 8am, a vehicle was driven away at speed when Police attempted to stop it in One Tree Point Rd. Ruakaka. The driver and vehicle were located some time later at a residential address in One Tree Point. Waipu Premiers' Rugby Coach Graham Dewes staying on for another season

After taking his team to the Northland finals last year Waipu Premiers' rugby coach Graham Dewes has agreed to stay on for another season.

The team reached the semi finals in 2017, so working on past results, this year should be an exciting one.

"I have a good bunch to work with. The majority of the boys I worked with for the last few years are still around", he said.

Three players: Taniela Koroi, Michel Lea and Ropate Rinekama have picked up overseas contracts. They have landed places in a Singapore, Asia Pacific Barbarians team, which will compete in the new Global Rapid Rugby series sponsored by the Australian billionaire Andrew Forrest.

Graham is pleased for them. He says they have demonstrated that through playing good rugby for Waipu there is a pathway to becoming professional.

Two years ago he selected Sam McNamara, who grew up in One Tree Point and was just 19 at the time, as captain of the Waipu Premiers. Asked what he saw in Sam to choose him for this role, Graham said Sam is very humble.

"I like that about him. He works hard and he doesn't say a lot but when he does talk he is worth listening to."

Graham was born in Fiji but moved to Auckland when he was eight-years-old. His father is a kiwi and his mother's family is from the island of Rotuma, which is a dependency of Fiji.

He was a member of the Fiji team, which reached the quarter- finals in The Rugby World Cup of 2007. In fact, he scored the winning try in the 38 - 34win against Wales and became an overnight hero in Fiji. Before moving to Waipu in 2015 he played for Counties Manukau in Auckland.

Graham made the move because he wanted to advance his career in the building industry. The Waipu Rugby Club helped him into a job with Oliver Tuck Construction. He said his partner Tilila has kept him grounded and encouraged him to think about his future once his rugby playing days are over.

Coastal Care volunteer features large on NRC vehicle




Ruakaka woman Sue Jolly has a larger then life image of herself printed on both sides of an Northland Regional Council vehicle.

Total Fire Ban

A Prohibited Fire Season or total fire ban across the whole of Northland was declared on Northland Anniversary day, Monday 28 January. There is now a ban on the lighting of any fire in the open air.

Fire and Emergency NZ says the hot dry conditions make lighting fires extremely risky and it will only grant permits on the rare occasions that a fire is necessary to reduce risk in a serious emergency.

It is an offence to knowlingly light or allow someone else to light a fire in the open are without a permit or not in accordance with the conditions of a permit in a prohibited fire season.

No shorebird chicks at Ruakaka but mixed success at the Waipu Estuary

Shorebirds have had a disastrous season at the Ruakaka estuary.

Lucina Cummings, who looks after nests on the south side of the rivermouth is watching over five oyster catcher and one dotterel nest but says, despite two of nests being in place before Christmas, she still hasn't seen any chicks. She wonders if due to the high number of people on the beach the parent birds have been disturbed and left their eggs to overheat in the sun.

There have been no successful shorebird nests at the Ruakaka estuary for the past wo summers

David Lourie, who has been keeping a watch at the Waipu Estuary reports a better outcome there.

Since the beginning of the shorebird-breeding season around September, David has been fencing off shorebird nesting sites and putting up signs to stop vehicles entering the shorebird breeding area on the northern side of the river mouth.

David said, "On the inner beach opposite Hamon Road nine oyster catcher chicks hatched of which six survived.

He found two dotterel nests as well as two more pairs of dotterel exhibiting nesting behaviour and saw two dotterel chicks close to fledging.

On the ocean spit on the north side of Waipu River, two dotterel nests each had two eggs, one was predated although it had a protective steel mesh cage placed over it that allowed the parents to enter and leave but keep out cats, dogs and possums. Two of these steel cages have been stolen. The second dotterel nest appears to have been washed away in the seasonal high tides. There was also an oystercatcher nest on the landward side of the spit but David is unsure of the outcome for this nest.

He said," This year has seen some improvements. The reduction of disturbances has seen more nests put down on the spit. We need to maintain monitoring and persist with fencing and signage to see the nests produce fledged chicks in the coming seasons."

David said a combination of fencing and security patrols saw a decline in the number of dog incursions evidenced by pawprints. Vehicle incursions have much reduced although there is a persistent hard core who place their individual freedoms above the rule of law and don't recognise the threat their vehicles pose to wildlife or simply don't care. Although the fencing that protects nesting areas has generally been respected.

He thanks the trappers and locals and visitors who have repaired damaged fencing and all of the people who have helped him care for the refuge.




Waipu Cove Surflifesaving IRB teams second at Northern Regional Championships




