New supermarket in 2021

Ruakaka is to get a new, larger supermarket.

Ken Orr of Ruakaka Town Centre said, "We will build a new supermarket at over double the current size on the grass between Educare and the Ruakaka Tavern. Takutai Place will be extended through to Sime Road behind the new Supermarket. The build will start in 2020 with the supermarket opening in 2021.

Signs informing people of the new development went up alongside the tavern and at the eastern end of the town centre last weekend.

The new store will have a floor space of 2,500 square metes with another 1,000 metres reserved alongside should this be needed for a future expansion.

Grant Egan and Michelle Alison, the owner operators of FreshChoice Ruakaka will be moving their business into the new premises some time in mid to late 2021.

Grant said with twice as much space they would be able to stock a much larger range of products. The new supermarket will have its own bakery, a "serve over" delicatessen and possibly also a butchery with staff ready to help customers. There will also be self service check outs and a "click and collect" option (available from some time next year before the move takes place), for customers to make their orders on line and then call in and pick up their boxes of groceries. A delivery service may also be set up. More parking space will be built in front.

Extra staff will be needed for the newbigger supermarket so there will be a few more jobs on offer.

Grant said the area is growing so quickly that the current supermarket is just not big enough to serve the population, particularly over the summer holiday period. The same specials and price structure as exist in the current supermarket under the FreshChoice branding will remain. FreshChoice supermarkets are owner operated under franchise agreements with Wholesale Distributors Ltd., a division of Woolworths NZ

EDITORIAL

Start compiling your lists

I met a woman in the Eco Store in Whangarei last week. She had blue eyes accentuated by a sky blue shirt she was wearing. She spoke with an accent and when I asked her where she was from she told me she was originally from Germany but had arrived here on a yacht 30 years ago after having lived for several years on tropical Pacific islands.

She said on stepping off the boat she had seen a giant oak tree, now gone, on the waterfront. She had watched a breeze blowing through its branches and had decided this was where she wanted to live. She hadn't realized until she arrived here how, while living amongst all those coconut and banana palms, she had missed big, old trees. I imagine she arrived here in the spring, when the grass was still green and coolness still in the air. She made me realize how much I love this place.

At this time of the year with wild roses and grapevines rampant on the side of our country roads, the beans in my garden growing so fast I can almost see their tendrils stretching and unfurling, the sea water warming up, there is nowhere I would rather be.

If all those momentous events the guest speakers at the Ruakaka Economic Development conference at the racecourse on Friday 29 November spoke of come about then some big changes are afoot in Northland and, in particular, in Bream Bay.

One of the business leaders at the REDG conference asked me, with a note of suspicion in his voice, where I stood on all of these announcements. I think I am cheering them on but with some reservations.

The upgrade of the rail, in particular, I think would be good thing. Trains are more efficient than trucks. Fewer trucks and more trains mean lower carbon emissions. If the line from Auckland into Northland is upgraded, the inland port built in west Auckland and the rail spur to Marsden Point constructed then we will see fewer trucks on the road

I was impressed by the presentation given by Greg Miller, CEO of KiwiRail. Mr. Miller said the railway upgrade and extension to Marsden Point would need to be in place before all those new port functions could be moved here and explained what is needed to make the Northland rail line capable of handling all the freight that would need to be sent from Marsden Point to Auckland. He said recesses would be set on the new line so that the system could be electrified at some time in the future. Those of us who believe we need to do everything we can to lower carbon emissions and avert the most extreme effects of climate change should be lobbying for the electrification of the rail

network sooner rather than later.

If Ports of Auckland moves to Marsden Point, it will bring with it more industry. This will mean more houses, more people and more pressure on our beaches and coastline. We are not doing particularly well at present in looking after our dunes, rivers and estuaries and I think we will need to step up our efforts to ensure this accelerated development doesn't result in further degradation of our most valuable assets. The environmentalists amongst us will need to speak louder and work harder to get our concerns acted on and the Department of Conservation, the Whangarei District Council and the Northland Regional Councils will need to step up and make some bold decisions and allocate resources to back these up.

We need to plant lots of trees, along the banks of all our waterways and to replace all those weeds in the back dunes of Bream Bay with native species.

Some strong-arm action needs to be taken to stop all those trail bikes, which are destroying our dunes. Perhaps with all the new industry about to arrive someone will fund a dedicated trail bike park on private land for these thrill seekers to use.

That proposed multi generational facility the Ruakaka Recreation Centre committee is talking about suddenly looks a lot more viable and, while we are at it, what about that heated, swimming pool? Membership of our sports clubs will increase and there will be pressure for more playing courts and fields and larger clubrooms.

All the public entrances where people park their cars and walk down onto the beach are already in sore need of upgrading.

To get down to some particulars we urgently need upgraded public toilets and changing facilities at Ruakaka beach alongside the surf club. That tiny little toilet block is grossly inadequate for all the people: visitors and locals, who come to swim, picnic and walk on this section of beach.

With the large population increase at One Tree Point and Marsden Bay, Mair Rd. is now a frequently used beach location and is likely to be the venue of a national volleyball championship this summer. The portable toilets located there will be a bit embarrassing if this event gets national media attention.

This is just a start. I urge all the residents of Bream Bay to think long and hard about this. If all this development is about to come our way what can we do to make sure some of the new investment goes into protecting and enhancing what we value most? Start compiling your lists.

A public meeting on the Kāinga Ora, **Transitional Housing**

The Ruakākā Parish Residents and Ratepayers Association has organized a public meeting to discuss the proposed Kāinga Ora transitional housing development on Te One park in the Ruakākā Village. The meeting will be held in the upstairs lounge of the Ruakākā

Recreation Centre at 6.30pm on Monday 9 December. Representatives of Kainga Ora will be present to respond to people's questions and the ratepayers have also invited spokespersons from Bream Bay College, the Bream Bay Medical Centre, The Bream Bay Police and the Bream Bay Community Trust to put their particular concerns. Whangarei District Council planning staff have been asked to attend to explain the District Plan and the consenting process. Whangarei's Member of Parliament Shane Reti has also been invited.

The representatives of each of the above organisations will be given five minutes to speak and there will also be an opportunity for residents who live near the proposed housing development to ask questions. However, Warren Daniel, the RPRRA secretary asks that people phone him prior to the meeting with their questions so he can ask Kāinga Ora to prepare answers and prevent the same question being put multiple times. Warren's phone number is 09 432 7268.

He said the objectives of the meeting will be to:

- · Ascertain the communities opinion as to whether the proposal should either go ahead, be stopped or amended.
- · Seek public notification of the Application for the Resource Consent
- Strongly object to the lack of community consultation before the proposal was announced
- · And hopefully appoint a community based Steering Committee to oversee any appropriate future action(s). Warren will be bringing along a cowbell to ring when a speaker has used up his or her allotted time. He expects it will be put to good use

Two big log trucks on the One Tree **Point Primary School field**

Children at One Tree Point Primary got to climb into the cabs of some big log trucks last month. On Thursday 21 November Keith Newey of Newey's Transport and Shane Laurence of Aysha Logging drove two giant log trucks with trailers onto the school playing field. Representatives of Hancocks Foresty Management also came along wearing their high visibility safety clothing.

Ian Newey made a short presentation to each class of children about how to stay safe on and around roads when big trucks are travelling along them. He told the children big vehicles have blind spots where drivers cannot see and they should keep their distance.

"If you cannot see the drivers face in the rear vision mirror than he hasn't seen you.'

He showed the children a forearm pumping action to use when you want a truck driver to sound the horn. He suggests that if you are unsure if a truck

driver has seen you, you should do this and wait for the horn to be certain.

He told the children they should wear bright clothing when riding bikes on the road and keep well clear of the road edge when walking.

When a pilot vehicle with a flashing light indicates an extra large load is coming they need to stand well back and wait and they need to be aware that big vehicles take extra space when turning corners, sometimes taking a double lane to get around a roundabout.

After the lesson the children filed out onto the field to count the number of wheels on each truck, climb into their cabs and pull their horns.

Where are the permanent homes for people in Kainga Ora transisitonal houses to go?

Kainga Ora, sounds exactly like a government entity. The ordinary person on the street has no idea where they are or what they do. Has this formula been used anywhere else and has it succeeded? If it has not been tested there should be a lot more thought and preparation before launching this initiative.

I understand this initiative is designed to provide temporary housing for people in poor living conditions and to prepare them for permanent living. This could work if there was somewhere for them to go when ready. I would presume that preparation would include permanent employment.

The initiative should be to eradicate dependency on the public purse. These people need to have employment and a sense of belonging. Belonging can only be achieved by having permanent employment and ownership of a property.

These houses should be built to a more permanent specification and the people given solid incentives to

own. The gravy train should be on a siding not on the rails going from failure after failure.

You do not have to look too far into the past to find a time when there was good paying employment and ownership was a possibility. This type of housing should be supplied where there is employment opportunity both urban and rural.

Then there is the Ruakaka infrastructure. First, the human waste disposal system. The exiting system is in need of overdue updating. To just dump another 30+dwellings onto the system is a recipe for disaster. Then there is the roading, medical services, transport services, schools and recreation.

I hope Kainga Ora has a robust and immediate system to monitor this incentive.



More thoughts on the termination of the Waipu Primary Life Choices programme

I'd just like to share a few thoughts about the recent decision to cancel the Life Choices values programme, a 60 year old tradition at Waipu Primary School.

This is from my perspective of being one of a team of Life Choices teachers for 16 years. It is a privilege and a pleasure to have contributed to the community in this way. The children, teachers and school governing bodies have been welcoming and supportive. The programme supports all the values which are so much a part of the lovely little town of Waipu, including its school, which those of us who have been here long enough to appreciate, can attest to.

These values include respect for people and their property, caring, helping others in need, not judging on appearances alone, standing for what is right, dealing with bullying, working together, using our talents and abilities, appreciating and caring for nature, diligence, commitment, honesty, being confident, facing our problems, having the right attitude, having courage. . . the list goes on. All these values are foundational to decent, well-functioning community as we have here. Life Choices also has lessons on famous NZers and their contributions to our nation. Two examples are: Sir Apirana Ngata, (who graces the NZ \$50 note), famous for his services to Maori Affairs.

Kate Sheppard (graces the NZ \$10 note), who campaigned to obtain the right for women to vote in par-

liamentary elections.

I am aware that the voice of secularism is growing and that different worldviews are being expressed and accommodated and in this age of inclusiveness and diversity, this is to be expected. Christian ethics are an important part of our society and heritage. Waipu's heritage is very much Christian based.

I am motivated to write only because it is suggested that those who would like Life Choices to remain, haven't spoken up. Yet, from the surprised reactions I am hearing from Waipu citizens, of all ages, from children to great-grandparents, it seems they were not aware of the imminent cancellation and therefore saw no need to have made their views known.

Other valued, long-standing Waipu traditions such as Highland Games, Christmas Float Parade, Tartan week, etc. are presumed to continue until they are either unsupported through lack of volunteers or voted out by a majority.

How do we want our community to look in 5, 10, 15 years and beyond? The more support we can give the community by endorsing these values, the better.

It is well known that being taught and versed in Judeo Christian ethics tends to contribute to good character. In communities where these values are not generally upheld, the social ills can be numerous and difficult to overcome. It is no accident that Waipu is, in general, a healthy, law-abiding community. It is easy to take this for granted. People who have experienced other dysfunctional communities will appreciate what we have here.

In this time of increasing social ills and many challenges facing youth, it is extremely important to reinforce to young people a sense of their worth. Judeo Christian values and ethics support the idea of self-worth and are foundational to the Life Choices program.

Proportionally, most parents seem happy for their children to participate in the Life Choices program, evidenced by the number of pupils who attend. Are the more vocal, minority deciding for the majority?

Amongst a number of people who have raised their concerns to me re the decision, are two parents of different, unrelated families who said they go further to have their children attend Waipu Primary School, partly because of the Christian based ethics program. They appreciate these values being reinforced.

The values and ethics embodied in the Life Choices program represent the Christian side of our culture. The Judeo-Christian heritage of New Zealand is part of our history and therefore valuable to our society both now and moving forward.

It begs the question, If the Life Choices program is beneficial to the school and community, which the majority seem to indicate that it is, why would it be discontinued?

Sail GP catamaran tested on Bream Bay waters this month

Keep an eye out for a Sail GP racing catamaran, which will be tested in Bream Bay from December 3.

This is the latest F50 boat to be built at Core Builders Composites in Warkworth for the Sail GP series. It will be stored at Northport and lifted in and out of the water by the port company's 100-ton mobile harbour crane, at a purpose-built pontoon and mooring area.

Bream Bay residents with a view of the bay watched the six original Sail GP craft, speeding across the bay as they were tested here last summer. The boats were then transported to Sydney, where racing began in the first set of a series that went on to San Francisco, Cowes and Marseille.

A new modular wingsail will also undergo testing on the seventh boat, in preparation for being fitted to the entire SailGP fleet before the 2020 San Francisco SailGP. A first-of-its-kind system, the wing comprises of sections that can be assembled in varying lengths initially from 18 to 24 meters with the future ability to go to 29 meters - to enable the F50s to compete in a range of weather conditions.

GP Sail boats are identical so that racing success comes down to sailing ability rather than technological

Once testing has been complete a new international team will be announced.

A team of approximately 30 Core Composite staff and yachtsmen will be based here testing and training on the boat through to January 17.

The Sail GP competition was initiated by Larry Ellison, the founder of Oracle and yachtsman Russell Coutts. Each boat is assigned to an international teams In 2019 these represented Australia, Japan, China, Great Britain, France and the United Stages, with the Australian team taking the prize money in a match race at the culmination of the inaugural series.

The teams and boats and the boat building company in Warkworth are all owned by Mr. Ellison who has undertaken to fund the venture for five years with the intention that it become self funding after that.

Northport CEO Jon Moore said, "While this is very different to our core business and isn't a commercial endeavour, we hope it will ultimately drive economic growth. Kāinga Ora replies to BB News questions

The Bream Bay News sent some questions to Kāinga Ora, the state owned agency which is planning to build 33 transitional houses on Te One Park in the Ruakaka Village by June next year.

We asked, "How can local people be assured that the support networks in place for the transitional housing tenants will be adequate to meet their needs and insure there are not negative impacts on the local communi-

We said, "The Karawai Lodge nearby with 12 rooms for rent is already used for transitional housing and the people living there have in the past caused disturbances requiring frequent police attention."

In response, Chris House, a spokesman for Kāinga Ora said, "The Karawai Lodge is privately run and is not contracted to the Ministry of Housing and Urban Development for transitional housing.

"The proposed development at Tamingi and Te One Streets, Ruakaka, will be operated by an experienced housing and social service provider. It will be responsible for managing the tenancies and the properties ensuring they are maintained, the site operates to a high standard and people comply with the terms of their tenancies. They will also be responsible for ensuring tenants get the support and services they need. Once a housing provider is contracted they will make themselves known and be the point of contact for the community."

To a query about the ownership and the lease arrangements, Mr. House replied, "Kāinga Ora does not own the site of the proposed transitional housing. The land is currently owned by Land Information New Zealand (LINZ). Negotiations are underway with LINZ to lease the site. The lease term is part of this process." To our third question: Is Kāinga Ora willing to conduct a public meeting in Ruakaka to answer some of the questions local people have about the development? Having already agreed to attend a meeting arranged by the Ruakaka Residents and Ratepayers Association Mr. House replied, "Yes. The three agencies responsible for delivering transitional housing - Kāinga Ora, the Ministry of Social Development and the Ministry of Housing and Urban Development - will be represented at a public meeting on 9 December at 6:30pm at the Ruakaka Recreation Centre, Takutai Place. This meeting is open to the community and will be a good forum to hear more about transitional housing, how it will be operated and to ask questions about the development."

Pair in custody facing 15 burglary charges

Nathan Solomon and Rangi Ormsby of Ruakaka are facing 15 charges of burglary. The pair were arrested on 9 November and Police carried out a search of their Karo Street home three days later recovering a significant amount of stolen property including: jewelry, power tools, sports gear, household appliances, stereos and television sets, building supplies, whiteware, clothing and furniture. Police are endeavoring to return these goods to their rightful owners and urge anyone who has suffered a burglary in the Bream Bay area from as far back as the beginning of this year to report it on the Police non-emergency number 105.

Mr. Solomon and Ms. Ormsby are both remanded in custody and due to appear in the Whangarei District Court on December 9.

Housekeeper finds intruder watching TV in client's house

At 2pm on 29 November a housekeeper turned up to clean a house in Marsden Point Rd. to find an unknown man inside watching television. He was in an intoxicated state and she phoned the police. A 37-year-old local man was due to appear in the Whangarei District Court on 4 December on a charge of unlawfully being at a property.

Calling for volunteer beach ambassadors

Volunteer beach ambassadors are needed to help patrol ths shoreline between the Ruakaka and Waipu estuaries this summer

This will be the fourth summer the programme, which was set up by Constable Martin Gedes of The Bream Bay Police in response to a number of drownings on this section of beach, has operated. The District Coroner has mentioned the initiative as part of the answer to the drowning fatalities which he has investigated over the last six years.

Ben Thompson of Cervus Equipment Whangarei has once again offered the loan of a beach Gator so the patrollers can cover the eight kilometres of beach between the two estuaries.

Patrolling will begin on 23 December and continue twice a day for two months.

Ambassadors will have training around the use of the Gator, identifying dangerous sea conditions and responding to emergencies. They are not encouraged to enter the ocean to save lives but rather to be the point of contact at the scene relaying vital information to emergency services

Constable Martin Geddes said, "The key roles of the ambassador are around prevention and education. To assist with this we have safety pamphlets in Chinese, English and Korean. The hands on personal approach is what makes this initiative work.'

A typical patrol will start by logging on at the Ruakaka Surf Club where the Gator is kept. From there the patrol travels along the beach stopping and talking to groups and individuals, handing out pamphlets and advising on beach safety and etiquette.

The patrol morning shift begins around 9.00am and ends at 1.00pm. The afternoon shift runs from 1.00pm through to about 5.00pm.

Constable Geddes said, "We are looking for a commitment of four to six shifts over the summer season. Some patrollers may be able to contribute more than

that, there is some flexibility around these shifts. " You will need a current drivers licence or be willing to double up on a patrol if you do not have a licence. Training will involve a commitment of about two hours at the Ruakaka Surf Club on 14 December beginning at 3.00pm.

Solvent recycling plant clean up has taken longer than it should have

The Environmental Protection Society acknowledges the clean up of the Ruakaka Solvent Recycling plant has taken "longer than is desirable."

Four years after the plant ceased operations and the Northland Regional Council brought a successful prosecution against the plants owners, Brian Smith and several companies Mr. Smith is the director of for the illegal discharge of hazardous substances into the surrounding duneland, solvents appear to remain stockpiled in rusty drums and old plastic containers outside the plant.

In reply to questions sent to the authority by the Bream Bay News, the EPA's senior communications advisor Sean O'Brien said, "

"The Environmental Protection Authority, Work Safe NZ, Northland Regional Council, and Whangarei District Council are working together to resolve this issue, and acknowledge that the clean-up has taken longer than is desirable. The initial focus has been on managing the safety of the site."

Asked if it was true that a security guard had been posted at the entrance to the site last summer, Mr. O'Brien explained, "A security guard was hired over the summer holiday period by the Whangarei District Council to prevent uncontrolled and unauthorised access to the site. A security fence has since been installed."

He said, "Securing of the site is part of a series of precautionary measures put in place to make it safer."


He said that Work Safe issued a compliance order in January 2015 to stop chemical products coming onto the property and that a "significant amount" of solvent has been removed since September 2018.

He said, "Central and local government agencies are committed to ensuring the chemicals, which remain at the site are safely removed and disposed of."

The solvent recycling plant is located behind the Lakeside Industrial Park just 500 metres from the shoreline of Bream Bay.

event was "Shaping the Future of the Bream Bay Region" but it could just as easily have been called Shaping the Future of Northland as the three invited speakers: Regional Development Minister Shane Jones, Wayne Brown the Chairman of the Upper North Island Freight Study and Greg Miller, CEO of KiwiRail spoke of the benefits upgrading the rail and moving Ports of Auckland to Northport would bring to the whole region.

The Ruakaka Economic Development Group invited Northland business operators and iwi representative to ta day Wayne Brown chaired the upper North Island



day of talks and workshops at Freight Study which has recommended moving the Ruakaka Racecourse on Ports of Auckland to Marsden Point

Mr. Brown the first invited speaker to take the floor said this is the "biggest opportunity for Northland we will see in any of our lifetimes."

He suggested that anyone opposed to the move should leave the meeting right now and asked if anyone held this view. Mere Kepa said she did but she wouldn't be leaving anytime soon as this was her land.

Mr. Brown said people should be writing letters to the New Zealand Herald to support him in a war of words with Ports of Auckland CEO Tony Gibson.

Peter Batten President of the Ruakaka Economic Development Group which organized the hui said local people have known for thirty years that this was going to happen and we need to "seize the opportunity."

He said he had lived in Bream Bay most of his life and as a young fellow he was able to go down to the beach and throw out a line and catch a nice snapper.

Those days had gone but nevertheless we need to make sure that development from here on in occurred "in a sustainable way."

Shane Jones arrived late but was given centre- stage as soon as he walked through the door. He said that a 'final call'' is about to be made on moving the NZ Navy's dry dock to Whangarei and this could bring significant benefits here.

He said anyone who hadn't been following the debate about moving Ports of Auckland to Northland needed to "wake up" and echoed Mr. Brown's statement

that the proposal needed public support.

"We have to stand up and aggressively promote our selves."

He said an upgrade of the railway line between Swanson and Whangarei had already begun with a \$95 million government investment announced in September. He said he had been at the racetrack several weeks ago, which had been an expensive exercise. He said he had last been at the Ruakaka Racecourse several weeks ago and this had been an "expensive exercise."

He quipped that local horses were a bit like local voters, who he said were slow to back the right person.

Greg Miller the CEO of Development. KiwiRail spoke after morning tea. He said a decision on building the Marsden Point rails spur to Northport is imminent

Shane Jones, Minister of Regional Economic

"We are working on the problem of how to get past the Mata Hill."

He said before the Auckland Port could be moved to Northport the rail system would need to be in place. As well as the new spur this involved making the line from Auckland into Northland capable of carrying todays freight including modern 9.5 foot high containers, which cannot fit through the tunnels and building an inland

port in north west Auckland. There would also be an inland container terminal at Otiria near Moerewa where the Northland rail line ends.

He described work already underway on the main line with the \$95 million government grant.

He said an easy solution would have been to "daylight the tunnels" by blowing them up but this was impossible because there are houses, farms and cows above them. A rail engineer from Argentina has come up with the solution of lowering the base of the tunnel and then rebuilding and widening the framing.

He said 33,000 containers currently go from Northland to

Auckland by truck each year, which could potentially travel by rail. Five rail bridges, which are on average around 100-years old need to be replaced, as did hundreds of culverts. Drainage improvement work is needed along the length of the line.

He said that initially the trains would be diesel but recesses would be built along the line in preparation for a conversion to electricity. Moving freight by rail could have big savings both in terms of the cost of road maintenance and in energy use. He predicted there will be a sharp increase in the price of diesel when new rules set by the International Maritime Organisation (IMO) lowering the levels of sulphur permitted to be used in ships fuel come into play on 1 January 2020, and that this will make rail freight even more competitive.






