A case made for **Council purchase of** Nova Scotia Rd. land for a recreation park

Councillors and Council staff were asked to consider buying a plot of land in the Nova Scotia Estate for a recreation park at a public consultation meeting on the Council's long Term Plan held in Waipu last week. Peter Blanch took the floor first when the meeting was handed over for public questions. He told those present that the young people of Waipu have been waiting for 20 years to get a recreation park.

"We tried to get one in the Waihoihoi Park but we were turned down at the hearings because the judge thought it would be too noisy. We had some land lined up in Cove Rd. The Council even surveyed this for us but this was never secured and this land has now been sold. A third place we considered is land in the Nova Scotia Estate which is now up for sale."

Neil McLeod said the Waipu 20 Year Structure Plan, which was approved in 2013, had marked the Nova Scotia land as a reserve. In the plan it states that Waipu would need more reserve space and the purchase of this would be funded by growth. This was given a medium priority.

Mr. McLeod asked if all the people who had participated in forming the structure plan had been wasting their time. He said, that only five years remained for that 20 year plan and the Council needed to implement some of its provisions.

Jill Mutch pointed out that apart from the Caledonian

EDITORIAL

Happy to pay more to clean up rivers, if the money is used effectively

Second time lucky for the Waipu Car and Bike show, which was rained out on its first scheduled date in February. Today Sunday 1 April, Easter Sunday and April Fools Day, who could ask for more perfect weather,

There were over 600 cars and 130 bikes at today's show. It always amazes me how much money people spend on these vehicles. Hundreds of thousands of dollars have gone into the restoration of some of those gleaming machines. Craziness in my view. I can think of much better things to spend money on. But at least, here they are all put to some constructive purpose: making money for the Waipu Lions to distribute to local good causes. What I really enjoy about the Car and Bike show are the great characters who come along with their vehicles.

On the subject of over - extravagance in the motor vehicle department, what about this gigantic bus, which almost tipped over in the drain outside our front fence last week? I went out to see what was happening, arriving at the same time as the ambulance followed in quick succession by two police cars and the Waipu Fire Brigade.

I think the luckless bus driver must have thought it was me who had called 111 as he got a bit abusive, complaining about how much all this would cost him. My thought was, "What about all those emergency services wasting time and money on you and your ridiculous bus?"

I am not sure who called them in, maybe someone driving by. One of the police officers told me they had got word this was a bus crash, which they thought they had better treat seriously. Somewhere, somehow the communication lines got a bit crossed and, as a result, all those Waipu Fire Brigade volunteers got called away from their homes, an ambulance and driver got

diverted away from the Bream Bay Station and, potentially, a serious medical emergency and two police cars, which could have been pulling up some of those crazy, speeding drivers on State Highway One, spent at least half an hour each driving up Mountfield Rd. and back again.

This is not the first time something like this has happened in our road. A few years ago we had an Armed Defenders call out when someone mistook a man heading into the hills with a gun to shoot pheasants for a crazed murderer.

A little more skill in communication might have saved a lot of trouble in this instance as well.

I think my submission to the Northland Regional Council will say something like, "I am happy to pay a bit more in rates to help clean up Northland Rivers provided the money is used effectively."

I believe we don't really need to spend much more money on reports, such as the one which has just come out telling us all how much we will have to spend to fix the problem of dirty rivers in Northland by 2040. I can't see how this calculation can ever be made accurately.

This afternoon I went to take a photo to go with the Ruakaka River story on the bridge at Flyger Rd. There are some beautiful big native trees just at that spot - totara, kahikatea, titoki, karaka, and nikau. This is surely what we need more of. We should be looking at what is growing here already, collecting seed from those big old trees and then we need to roll up our sleeves and start planting on all those steep eroding Marilyn hillsides and around all those river margins.

Making a forceful case for the sealing of Helmsdale Rd.

A case for tar sealing the entirety of Helmsdale Rd. was made rather forcefully at the Whangarei District Council's Long Term Plan consultation meeting held in Waipu last week in St Peters Anglican church on Wednesday 28 March.

Christine Terblanche told the Council's CEO, Rob Forlong that with all the new subdivisions off the road the Council should by now have received enough money from development contributions to get the remaining 2.9 kilometres of road sealed.

She said the road was in heavy use by tradesmen, residents, logging trucks, farm machinery and the school bus and the dusty conditions were hazardous to the

health of people living there. She held up a plastic bottle of rather murky looking water, which had been collected from the down pipe of a property alongside the unsealed section of road.

"And we are all reliant on water collected from the roofs of our houses", she said.

Anna Benson stepped forward wearing a facemask clogged with dust, which she said had collected while it was being worn for a single day outside a Helmsdale Rd. roadside property.

Mrs. Benson said people with health conditions were sometimes forced to leave their family homes when the dust nuisance was at its worst during dry weather. Mrs. Terblanche said with all the grading and spreading metal that was necessary the Council was spending around \$36,500 on its maintenance each year. She calculated that if it were to spend \$365,000 to get the sealing work done, after 10 years it would be making savings.

However, Mr. Furlong said the cost for sealing that length of road would be closer to \$1 million and that sealed roads are, in fact, more expensive to maintain than metal ones. He said the \$365,000 calculation may have been made based on the cost of sealing a driveway but public roads had to be made to a higher standard. The cost to seal a kilometre of road to the Council required standard is \$360,000.

Peter Blanch said the residents of Cullen Rd., where he lives, had some years ago each contributed \$1,800 to have that road sealed and he asked if the Helmsdale Rd. residents could do the same.

But Mr. Furlong said the Council was no longer operating that scheme, as the proportion of funds contributed by the residents was minuscule compared with the total amount needed. He said the Helmsdale residents would need to come up with half a million dollars.

He said, the new Labour led government is re- setting priorities for subsidies for roads and road safety would be higher up the list.

"Maybe some opportunities will come out of that," said Mr. Forlong.

Stormy weather likely cause of little blue penguin deaths

There are lots of dead little blue penguins washing up on the shores of Bream Bay at present. Francis Buchanan who was staying in Ruakaka with her brother recently counted 21 in a kilometre of beach between the Ruakaka estuary heading south. Francis was concerned that there may have been some environmental disaster but Ann McCracken of the Whangarei Ornithological Society said the culprit is more likely to have been Cyclone Hola. "When it gets stormy for the birds it's a bit like being in a washing machine and, of course, little blue penguins are in the water all the time. The stormy weather came at a bad time when young birds had just left their burrows to fend for themselves and were not yet expert fishers and swimmers. Little blue penguins breed throughout Northland coastal areas, on offshore islands and more remote rocky sections of the mainland coast.

Emergency services arrive in force when a big motorhome was driven into a ditch

motor home owner said he had moved to the side of the road to let the second bus pass.

Petition to try to save Caledonian Park totara

Waipu's tree warrior, Isa Inui has launched a petition on the website change.org in support of a group of totara trees in the Caledonian Park which have been marked for removal.

The petition reads, "We want to ensure the full protection and preservation of the mature Totara trees on the North Eastern fence line of the Waipu Caledonian park.

"These trees are destined to be cut down and they have already been marked. 16 totara from the neighboring property (Madly Indian restaurant) have already been felled and ringed for fire wood.

"These trees provide shade for the park during the hot summers. Especially during the highland dances. When entering Waipu from the northern side they are a welcoming sight and add to the character of Waipu. They are an irreplaceable part of the old Waipu village adding scenic greenery and history to the area."

At last count the petition had received 378 signatures.

Is a said she would be posting the petition with its signatures to the Waipu Caledonian Society, which owns the park.

Park, which was privately owned, Waipu had very little reserve space.

"The Waihoihoi Park is really the only Council owned reserve."

She had information from the Council that 166 building consents for Waipu were issued between 1 January and 31 December 2017.

She said the village postie now delivered mail to 400 households (up from 360 in October 2016) and the Waipu Rural Delivery now delivered mail to 900 households, compared to 750 in October 2016.

She said, "This is a whopping 18% increase in 18 months but, in spite of all this development, there have been no green spaces or extra car parking allocated to Waipu Village."

The Council's Chief Executive Officer Rob Forlong said there was some money in the Long Term Plan for recreation parks but if the Waipu park first needed land to be purchased, it would be particularly expensive. He said some landowners had unrealistic ideas about the size of the Council's pockets when it came to selling land for public use.

Submissions on its Long Term Plan need to be sent to the Council before 8 April.

Man arrested in connection with Karawai St. burglaries

An arrest in connection with Karawai St. burglaries.

An arrest has been made in connection with the series of burglaries in and around Karawai St., Ruakaka.

A 40-year-old local man has been charged with eight counts of burglary and remanded in custody for his next court appearance in the Whangarei District Court on 16 April.

Bream Bay Police have been working alongside Whangarei Police on the case. The repeated burglaries have been very frightening for Karawai St. residents as,

on several occasions, the man entered houses while the occupants (in some cases women living on their own) were asleep.

Lucky to be alive after collision with a log truck

The occupants of a small car: a Toyota Yaris, miraculously escaped injury after a collision with a log truck on Port Marsden Highway at 4pm on 22 March. The driver of the car had attempted a U turn in the path of the oncoming truck. Senior Sergeant Simon Craig said the occupants of the car were extremely lucky not to have been killed.

Two crashes into Brynderwyn barrier

• At 8am on Sunday 25 March a vehicle hit the centre barrier on the northern side of the Brynderwyn Hill. No one was hurt but the driver is facing a charge of dangerous driving.

• Two days later, on Tuesday 27 March at 7.45am, another vehicle drove into the barrier. The elderly driver was unhurt.

Three car nose to tail at Oakleigh roadworks

• On 23 March three vehicles were damaged in a nose to tail accident at the stop signs alongside road works at Oakleigh.

• At 7am on 19 March there was a single car accident on Shoemaker Rd. in Waipu. The car left the road and ended up in a drain. No one was hurt.

Work begins on Ruakaka **Primary classroom**

Work has begun on a new classroom for Ruakaka Primary.Roll growth at the school has been rapid growing from 170 children enrolled at the start of 2015 to 225 on the first day of Term One this year.

Consequently the school is short of classroom space, with classes occupying the former library and, from the beginning of this year, the staff room.

Teachers have been using a Port o Com for their morning tea and lunch breaks, which they have found a bit hot and stuffy over the summer months.

Progress on the classroom was held up while the contractor waited for a building consent from the Whangarei District Council. There has been a further hold up this month with the availability of aluminum joinery but the building is expected to be completed some time next month.

As soon as the classroom is finished work will begin on a new multi-purpose library for the school. The completion date for this second building is planned for the beginning of the school year in 2019.

The school hasn't had a library for two years. A selection of books is put into each classroom but children are unable to take them home

Principal Marilyn Dunn said, "It's been very frustrating but we are finally getting there. Things are beginning to move at last."

Petition for Peter Snell Rd. traffic calming

A petition to get some traffic calming engineering in Peter Snell Rd. was initiated by Sharon Rudolph before she died last year.

Constable Mark Stuart said he had agreed to keep the petition at the station here and out of respect for Sharon removed it from the counter. Constable Stuart said he had retained the petition with its signatures and if someone was interested in reconvening it he would hand this over to them.

He said, "Police would support any initiative that would reduce reckless behaviour on our roads."

Linda Wells, a resident of Peter Snell Rd., said she and others are interested in resurrecting Sharon's petition. "We would like to get things going again. As a community we hope to be able to put something in place to reduce the speed of traffic travelling down our street."

The recreation centre committee has been successful in gaining funding for the building's upkeep in recent times.



Funding proposed in Long Term Plan for community based pest control groups

Community based groups working to control animal and plant pest species in the Brynderwyn Forest stand to gain some substantial funding support from the Northland Regional Council if its proposed Long Term Plan, which is currently open for public submission is adopted.

Malcolm Nicolson, Chief Executive Officer of the NRC told a meeting in Ruakaka last month that improved pest management was one of four new focuses for LTP with an extra \$2.3 million going towards this each year. He said that the aim is to have Northland's 23 major forests pest free within the next decade.

Kane McElrea the NRC's Biosecurity Manager Partnerships and Strategy said,

"We have chosen not to name specific forests as we would prefer to work with the willing and as communities are ready to take on the job rather than being prescriptive."


He sent through a copy of a map taken from the NRC"s recently adopted "Northland Regional Pest and Ma-

rine Pathway Management Plan 2-017 -2027" which he said "provides an indication of where council intends to (but not limited to) support community led conservation activities in Northland to work towards pest free forests over the next 10 years."


One of the areas highlighted is the Brynderwyn Forest stretching from Mangawhai to Waipu, northwest through the Maretu forest and southwest across to the Kaipara Harbour.

Mr. McElrae said, "The proposed high value pest control area programme would allocate approximately \$200,000 to pest control groups in the Waipu / Mangawhai area to support animal pest and weed control programmes. This high value programme area would include private land throughout the Brynderwyns. This would involve council working with a local committee or working group to develop plans and allocate the appropriate funds to where it is required." He said the Long Term Plan is also suggesting an increase in community pest control funding for projects outside these areas.



Will the NRC's proposed increase in spending to fix our rivers be enough?

The Ruakaka River is not in a healthy state.

On a LAWA (Land Air Water Atmosphere) web page, where river water quality at tested sites throughout New Zealand is rated and compared, the quality of water taken from the Ruakaka River near Flyger Rd. is in the worst 25% for most water quality measures including: E.coli count, water clarity and phosphorous content. It is in the worst 50% for dissolved nitrogen content and amongst the worst 25% for ammoniacal nitrogen. Animal waste (particularly

from humans and farmed animals such as sheep and cows) is the major source of ammoniacal nitrogen in New Zealand waterways.

The site also has information about land cover in the catchment as this can influence water quality. The Ruakaka River catchment is 68% in exotic grassland, 23% in indigenous forest, 5% in shrub land, 2% in exotic forest, 1% in urban use and 1% is waterways.

Jean-Charles Perquin, the Northland Regional

Council's Environmental Monitoring Manager, said there are several factors that need to be considered when looking at this comparison. Firstly, water taken from lowland sites such as the one at Flyger Rd. tends to be of poorer quality than when the sample is taken further up the catchment. Secondly, Ruakaka riverside landowners have taken action such as fencing and planting river margins to improve the situation. Three of the water quality measurements (although still poor by national standards) have shown "meaningful improvements" in recent years. These improvements have been made in: levels of total oxidized nitrogen, phosphorous levels, and water clarity.

There is no similar collection of scientific

this contamination. The NRC is still waiting on these results.

The Northland Regional Council's draft Long Term Plan proposes to step up a gear in water quality improvement work in Northland. The annual spend on water related work over the next three years would increase by \$1.2million in 2018/19 rising to \$2.2 million by 2020/21. This would cost ratepayers \$14.60 extra a year in 2018/19 rising to \$26.88 by 2020/21.

The LTP consultation document says this extra money would provide more grants to help landowners fence off and plant alongside waterways, expand the NRC's poplar nursery at Flyger Rd. and hand our grants for erosion prevention work on steep hill country.

There will also be more monitoring of rivers, wetlands and lakes. Eighteen new staff would be hired over the next three years to work on these programmes.

It is unclear if any of this extra funding would be coming to Bream Bay to improve the state of the Ruakaka and Waipu Rivers. Jonathon Gibbard, The NRC's Group Manager of Governance and Engagement said those kinds of details have yet to be worked out.

There is also the question would an extra \$2.2 million a year be enough? A report released last week by the Ministry for the Environment looking at progress on a goal set by the previous National Party Government to have 90% of the country's rivers and lakes swimmable by 2040 found that rivers in Northland and Auckland are the dirtiest in the country with fewer then a quarter of Northland rivers suitable for swimming. The report estimated that \$4.8 million dollars a year would need to be spent in Northland on reaching this target, with the Northland Regional Council itself estimating this figure is closer to \$10 million. The close off date for submissions on the Northland Regional Council's Long Term Plan is Tuesday 17

First Working Monday of every Month data for Bream Bay's other major river system; the Waipu River and its tributaries: the Pohuenui, Waihoihoi and Ahuroa and the Waionehu Stream. For the first time this last summer samples were taken to determine if Piroa Falls on the Ahuroa River was a safe place to swim. The E.coli levels found in these weekly samples were consistently high. The pond beneath the falls was given an *Unsafe for Swimming* rating and the Northland Regional Council has sent a water sample from this site for laboratory analysis in a bid to identify the source of <u>5 April 2018</u>

Making toys for the joy they bring to children's faces

Terry O'Meara is one of those people who have to be doing something.

Since he finally retired at the age of 70 from a job in charge of the tool store at the Marsden Point Refinery he has completed a number of online courses on a variety of subjects including: genealogy and Parkinson's Disease (because he has a friend with this condition) and developed a little cottage industry making wooden toys.

Terry is an engineer by trade and, prior to the job at the refinery, worked for SPI in Ruakaka for 19 years. He

began making the toys for his grandchildren and then for friends who would say, "Can you make me one of those for my grandson?"

To begin with, he would give all his toys away but since he retired can't afford to do this, so now he sells what he makes, although he doesn't earn a great deal of profit. He could put the price up to make more money but he says then the toys might not sell as readily as they do.

"Mostly its just for the look on the children's faces when they see they have a new toy."

He makes a wide variety of toys: dolls' cots play ovens, garages, aeroplanes, trucks, cars and trains.

He looks at adverts for wooden toys on Trade Me and then modifies the designs and he searches second hand shops for nice old wooden toys. He also makes wooden household items such as a cutlery and condiment holder to use at BBQs, handy racks with hooks and a nifty pot plant holder.

He enjoys the challenge of making something new. His workshop is crammed with a collection of his handiwork.

People bring him offcuts of wood but sometimes he runs out and has to go and buy it. He prefers it to be untreated. He likes to work in pine but occasionally a piece of mahogany or even kauri might come his way. He either paints the finished items or stains them with vegetable oils. He sells mostly through word of mouth but belongs to a craft co-operative in Hamilton and his toys are in a shop there.

Last year was a difficult one for Terry and his wife Sandra as Terry battled a serious health issue.

Sandra believes it was his "wonderful positive attitude" that helped pull him through.

Unable to travel too far, last Christmas Terry and Sandra donated toys to the Christmas gift collection at Orrs Pharmacy. They also turned their garage into a toyshop and did a roaring trade. They are planning to do the same next Christmas.

Terry held an exhibition of his hand made wooden toys and household items at the Ruakaka Library last month and is planning another in November.


by their favourite storybook. The masks must be able to be manipulated by hand instead of being worn.

The club would like to thank its sponsors for their






