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Waipu Rugby Club has no senior teams this season but 180 registered junior players

For the first time in as many years as most people can remember Waipu does not have a senior rugby team. Club President Ryan Hall said that in recent times it has become increasingly difficult to find enough senior players.

Northland Rugby stipulates that clubs with teams in the Premier competition must also field a reserve squad. which makes it even harder to find sufficient players. He said last year the club's management committee took the decision to drop out of the Premiership and field a Division One team instead which does not require a reserve squad, but even this proved impossible

to achieve. Mr. Hall said the club has very competitive Under 18 and Under 14 teams and, with 180 registered junior players, is the third of fourth biggest junior club in Northland.

He said, "We are in a rebuilding phase and are committed to developing our local players."

The Waipu Men In Kilts team for over 35 year-old players is also strong and enjoys good public support. In addition the annual end of year touch tournament draws as many as 400 junior and senior players.

Waipu will be hosting a junior tournament this Saturday 24 April.


Waipu RSA ANZAC dawn ceremony at the Waipu cemetery

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No Sand Mining message loud and clear at NRC meeting in Waipu

The Northland Regional Council got a clear message from the people crowding into the Waipu Cove Surf Lifesaving Club House on Tuesday 22 April for the Northland Regional Council monthly meeting: many Bream Bay residents are strongly opposed to sand mining in Bream Bay.

Malcolm Morrison of the of the Bream Bay Guardians told the Councillors the only people who would benefit from the sand mining would be McCallum Brothers Ltd. There was nothing in it for Northland or Northlanders. He said the argument that Bream Bay sand was needed to support development in Auckland didn't stack up as there is in fact an over supply of sand there already.

When asked by Councillor Jack Craw if this included sand currently being dredged at Pakiri Mr. Morrison replied it did not as there is enough sand from other sources, quarrying and land based mining to supply Auckland.

He told the meeting that Bream Bay's sand is a closed

system and with no sand coming in it is a finite resource. He questioned the assertion by McCallum Brothers Ltd. that the dredging would be so far out it would not have an impact on the Bream Bay dunes system.

"When my grand children dig a hole in the sand it very quickly fills up again with surrounding sand moving into it.'

Mr. Morrison told the Councillors that the Gaurdians of Bream Bay had established a fighting fund and had a team of experts who would be willing to help the NRC with monitoring if the McCallum Brothers application

Barbara Leeuwenberg representing the "Combined Communities of Bream Bay against Marine Sand Mining" presented two active petitions hosted by Action station and with a combined 15,000 signatures to the Council.

She called on the NRC to oppose the sand mining proposal and to ensure that independent assessments are provided to the decision making panel. Tp Publicly acknowledge the risks to Bream Bay's ecosystems, marine habitats, surf breaks, scallop beds, and species such as the critically endangered tara iti — the

To support mana whenua in their efforts to protect their rohe moana

and to uphold the intent of Te Tiriti o Waitangi by ensuring meaningful consultation, which to date has been severely lacking.

She concluded, "The voices in these petitions are not fringe. They are reasonable, informed, and growing louder by the day. They're asking you — as stewards of this region — to protect what is precious and irreplaceable and to represent the interests of our region at any hearings or consultations with the EPA or Fast Track decision-making panels and pursue appeals if necessary.

This Council has an opportunity to demonstrate leadership, foresight, and respect — for the environment, for tangata whenua, and for the people of Northland.

Bream Bay is not just sand. It is not a quarry. It is home, it is habitat, it is heritage. It is a living system. And it is not for sale. It deserves your protection"

NRC Deputy Chairperson Tui Shortland told the crowd that the NRC had opposed the Government's Fast Track Bill. She said the Northland Regional Plan had been cast aside and the NRC would have an advisory role only in the decision on the McCallum Brothers Ltd. sand mining application and then only if they were invited to do so.

The decision would be in the hands of three government appointees.

Despite the NRC not having control over whether or not the McCallum sand mining application is granted and not being able to set the conditions if it is granted the regional council will be charged with monitoring the dredging activity at the expense of Northland ratepayers.

Stop the sand mining campaigner Emma Hart – Northland people will have to pay for something they never wanted and will derive no benefit from.

Update on the Ruakākā Energy Park and, soon to be built, solar farm at the Ruakākā Residents and Ratepayers' AGM

Robert Batters and Mike Wilson from Meridian Energy will be guest speakers at the Ruakākā Residents and Ratepayers Annual General Meeting in the new Recreation Centre in Peter Snell Rd. on 13 May 2025 at 7pm.

They will be giving an update on the Ruakākā Energy Park, where work is about to get underway on a new 130MW solar farm that will produce enough energy to power over half of Northland's homes in an average

year

Around 250,000 solar panels are to be installed on sites between Port Marsden Highway and Marsden Point Road. Construction will run through to early 2027 and is expected to create employment and contracting opportunities. It also includes 30ha of native habitat and wetland restoration that will provide substantial environmental benefits and additional contracting opportunities.

A 97% rate increase for some lifestyle block owners under WDC "preferred option."

Some lifestyle block owners would be getting a 97% increase in their rates while for some of the properties in town their rates will go up just 1% Whangarei District Council Deputy Mayor Phil Halse told the Waipu Resident and Ratepayers meeting last week.

The Whangārei District Council has stated in its consultation document that keeping the Universal Annual General Charge at \$500 and then charging a higher percentage on land value is its preferred option for its 2025 - 2026 annual plan.

Councillor Halse told the meeting that this might change during the consultation process.

Submissions on the Council 2025 – 2026 rating options closed on Friday 2 May. The Waipu Residents and Ratepayers Association has asked to present a submission at the annual plan hearings and will be pointing out that the lower AUGC and higher land value charge disadvantages many Bream Bay land owners many of whom live on lifestyle blocks, on farms or on high value coastal properties.

The Waipu RRA submission will argue if charging those with higher valued land a higher rate is an attempt to help people who are struggling financially, it is a very clumsy one.

It will tell the hearing that In Bream Bay we have young families who own lifestyle properties who are not wealthy people. We have families living in caravans or makeshift cabins as they work hard to raise enough money to build homes on their land and it seems unfair that they should be penalised for the land they own.

"What's more many owners of residential property on low value land are landlords who would be unlikely to lower rents in response to their lower rates bill."

At last week's meeting Neil McLeod also raised an objection to the storm water charge on all properties.

He pointed out that farmers and lifestyle block owners take care of their own stormwater and, in fact, every three years or so he has to clean out a drain on his property where silt and metal accumulates from run off from the Council owned road

Mr. McLeod also asked why the owners of land zoned for industrial use at Marsden Point should be offered grants, which would be funded by rural and commercial ratepayers.

Councillor Halse said that there were several blocks of land in that area which, although zoned as industrial were unable to be developed due to a lack of capacity in the Ruakākā wastewater plant.

Kay and Ron Dixon's fairwell afternoon tea - an opportunity for the community to say thank you

"Waipu was good to us", said Ron Dixon at the farewell afternoon tea held for him and his wife Kay at the Waipu Celtic Barn on Wednesday 30 April.

"Well you and Kay were very, very good for Waipu", replied Graham Boult of Waipu 2,000, which had organised the event.

Ron and Kay lived in Waipu for 50 years but have recently moved to Whangārei to be closer to their two daughters.

The family arrived in the town when Ron, a qualified diesel mechanic, got a job at Somners Transport. They stayed on when he went to work at the refinery where he remained for the next 33 years. For 40 of those years Ron was an active member of the Waipu Fire Brigade.

Kay was, in fact, one of the instigators of the Waipu 2000 organization, which has been overseeing the upkeep of Waipu town since 1992.

She described how she had gone along to a meeting called by Government officials who asked what local people wanted for Waipu after the bypass around the town went in.

Kay was Waipu's postie, a job she had held for 32 years from 1986, and while she was riding about delivering mail she had noticed that some parts of the town looked "a bit scruffy." When she was invited to make a suggestion about what was needed in Waipu her idea was "a clean up group".

Waipu chemist Tony Solomon was

another founding member of Waipu 2,000 and he and Kay collaborated on many ventures.

Kay – "We did lots of fundraising. We cleaned out units at Ranburn, we sold pies." Kay has many memories and stories to tell such as the time the local radio station ran a competition offering the town's National Bank Manager as a "slave for a day."

Fire Chief Alby Whyte won but offered his "slave" to the Waipu 2000 group and the Bank Manager was sent to pick up rubbish, do some mowing and sweep the street.

Kay recalls Alby made the most of the joke and sat there watching with a big whip.

Kay and Tony (and sometimes Weenie, Tony's wife, took on the job of emptying

rubbish bins over long weekends when the town was overflowing with visitors. One evening while Tony was on the job newly arrived Waipu Four Square owner/operator Steve Price mistook him for a homeless person and offered him some hot pies.

Waipu 2,000 was able to secure contracts for mowing and garden maintenance from the Whangārei District Council, which enabled them to employ a series of caretakers for the town. Kay has photographs and fond memories of them all. Tony and Kay, and Ron when he was needed, continued to lend a hand working alongside when and where they were needed.

Waipu 2000 employs Alan Nordich, Waipu's current caretaker who has been in this job for over 20 years. Many believe this local control is the reason for Waipu's overall well-kept appearance.

Whangārei District Council Deputy Mayor Phil Halse paid tribute to the vision of Kay and Tony in forming the trust and securing the Council contracts. He said the arrangement has been working well from when it was first made in 1992.

Steve Jones, as Waipu's RD contractor spent many years alongside Kay sorting mail in the cramped confines of the back room of the Waipu Post Shop. He said Kay had been a big help to him and wife Lyn when they first took over the RD run. "We came from a farming background and knew nothing about delivering mail. Kay knew everyone and if there was mail addressed a bit vaguely Kay usually knew where the person it was meant for lived.


Steve said he and Kay "had had their moments" but at the farewell had only good things to say about Kay and Ron

"They were always on the other end of the phone and always willing to help.

If we needed people to put out chairs or pack them away after an event they would be there.

Kay and Weenie had helped make the kilts for Waipu's Men in Kilts rugby team and then took care of their washing and ironing after the big, often very muddy, games.

Around 80 people attended the afternoon tea to personally thank Ron and Kay for all their hard work and to widh them well in their new life.

The islands in Te Ākau (Bream Bay)

On the horizon from the beach at Uretiti: Tarama. and Marotiri Islands with Tūturu (Sail Rock) to their right. In the far right and in the distance is Hauturu o Toi (Little Barrier Island) New Zealand's first nature reserve.

Taranga (Hen), Marotiri (Chickens) and Tūturu (Sail Rock) are a familiar presence on the horizon of Te Ākau. Depending on the angle, Marotiri may look like one island, but it is actually a cluster of eight.

At its peak Taranga soars at 417m; the tallest elevation of Marotiri is Māuiroto Island at 234m and Tūturu curves in at 139m. Approximately 18,000 years ago, when sea levels were at least 100 metres lower than they are now, the islands were hills surrounded by a vast coastal plain. Sea levels began to rise 7,000 years ago, rising high enough to separate the islands from the mainland.

The islands are located 22km from the coast, with the Tasman and Subtropical Fronts lapping at their shores. The eastward flow of the currents splits at the northern tip of Aotearoa and continues down the east coast. The islands are regarded as a high ranking ecological area, both above and below water. Despite this ranking, there has only been a small number of scientific investigations into their marine habitats. A reef fish survey published in 2002 recorded 72 species, which placed it as one of the more diverse sites in Te Tai Tokerau (Northland).

Threatened species that can be found in the waters surrounding the islands are tohoraha (Bryde's whales), terehu (bottlenose dolphins) and kākahi (orca). Popokanua (common dolphins, which are not threatened) can be spotted there too. Kekeno (New Zealand fur seal) are present in small numbers as transient visitors. Also with a transient presence are Upokohue (pilot whales), false killer whales and some of the large baleen whales.

Landing ashore Taranga and Marotiri is by permit only and must be for research purposes. The Department of Conservation (DOC) manages access and issues permits in line with conservation priorities and their partnership with Ngātiwai. According to DOC, 'Taranga was first declared a scenic reserve in 1908 under the Scenery Preservation Act 1903. Later, in 1925, additional legal protections were extended

to Marotiri as scenic reserves. In 1953, the islands were reclassified as wildlife sanctuaries under the Wildlife Act, reflecting growing recognition of their biodiversity value. Today, the islands are officially classified as nature reserves, offering the highest level of legal protection for conservation under the Reserves Act 1977. These changes reflect evolving conservation priorities over time.'

Identified as an Important Bird Area by BirdLife International, the islands are home to endemic seabirds such as tīeke (saddlebacks) and about 500 breeding pairs of Pycroft's petrels. Tuatara, also endemic and the last surviving member of its family of reptiles, live on the islands too.

The islands border several tribal boundaries. Patuharakeke to the west. Learning the pūrākau (ancient stories) of the islands is a wonderful way of strengthening our connection to them. In Māori mythology, the name Taranga is attributed to the mother of the demi-god Māui. Māui was born prematurely and Taranga thought, mistakenly, that he was stillborn. She cut the topknot from her head and wrapped his body in her hair. Calling upon the sea god Tangaroa to take him, she threw Māui into the waves. Tangaroa and the sea goddess Hine-moana bore him on their backs and swept him swiftly along the coast where he was found by his uncle, Tama-nui-ki-terangi who raised him as his own son.

One day Māui decided to find his mother. After many months of searching he came across a pā and quietly entered. Inside, his mother was standing behind his four brothers. When she learned that this young man was her son, her eyes filled with happy tears. Māuitiki-tiki-a-Taranga was happy too, for he had finally found his mother.

Perhaps it was the warmth of the Tasman and Subtropical Fronts that kept Māui alive as he was swept down the coast and into the arms of his father.

Grass growth for this time of year is phenominal says dairy farmer Simon Couper. The warm wet weather has seen a late autumn surge in growth.



Northpower electricity consumers to receive discount payment

Northpower electricity consumers will soon receive their second instalment of a total of \$15.8 million in pricing discounts thanks to Northpower and the Northpower Trust.

The first instalment was paid in November 2024, and this is the second instalment of the 2024/25 discount payment.

The Northpower Pricing Discount is made possible with the support of the Northpower Electric Power Trust, which owns Northpower on behalf of Northpower's consumer beneficiaries connected to the Northpower electricity network.

The Northpower Trust says it is satisfying to see Northpower's consumer beneficiaries continuing to benefit from the consumer ownership model that has existed since 1993. Over this time Northpower has returned over \$278 million to electricity consumers in Kaipara and Whangarei.

Northpower Trust Chair Phil Heatley has welcomed the discount, and the way that it flows



back directly to electricity consumers in Kaipara and Whangarei.

"We hear from our consumer owners that they appreciate the discount payment each year, it's the way that we have done things since the Trust was established, and as Trustees we view it as an appropriate way to reward consumer owners," Mr Heatley says.

Most residential and business customers connected to Northpower's electricity network will benefit from a discount which will be calculated on their individual usage. This payment will be up to \$155 including GST, on top of the payment made in November of around \$150.

Updates from your electricity network

Northpower Chair Mark Trigg says he is pleased with the level of discount, and the fact that it has increased over the time that he has been working with Northpower's Board.

"Over the past 8 years we have seen the discount increase from around \$120 to \$305 this year, which has been possible due to the improved financial performance and growth achieved by Northpower over the years," Mr Trigg says.

In future years, Northpower will be making a single payment in May each year, so the next payment will be May 2026. This change to payment timing is required to meet accounting and tax compliance purposes, where discounts should be paid after the end of the financial year. As a result, there will be no discount payment in November/December 2025.

The discount will be shown as a credit on customers' May or June electricity bills and will benefit over 63,000 current customer connections on the Northpower network.

To qualify as eligible, consumers must have an active network connection as of 1 May 2025. Full details of the eligibility criteria and how the discount is calculated are available on Northpower's website www.northpower.nz/forhome/pricing/northpower-pricing-discounts/

Councillor Rick Stolwerk - standing for a fourth term on the NRC

Rick Stolwerk, who represents the Coastal South area of Northland including Bream Bayon the Northland Regaiona; Council has announced he will be standing for this seat again in this September's Local Government elections..

He said there are a number of reasons for this decision.

He would like to continue to support the work of the Piroa Conservation Trust and to see a predator free corridor extending from the east to the west coast. He said Piroa Conservation has already expanded its predator control work from the 400 hectares where it began and now covers 25,000 hectares and he would like to be able to help secure funding for the predator control work to extend into another 15,000 hectares.

He wants to work for more marine protected areas n the form of marine reserves or rahui areas in Northland.

The Navigation Safety Bylaw is currently under review and he would like to see this completed. His fourth reason for standing

is that as a fourth term councilor he would provide some stability for the Northland Regional Council which he hopes will run smoothly in its next term.

Postal voting in the 2025 Local Government Elections begins on 22 September with the final day for voting on 11 October.

NRC rates increase likely to be less than proposed in its Long Term Plan

The Northland Regional Council is likely to set its annual rate below the 5.79 percentage increase proposed for the 2025/2026 financial year its 2024 – 2025 Long term plan. The increase is likely to be around 5.2%. Asked how this was possible when prices everywhere are rising, Bruce Howse, the NRC's Group Manag-

er of Corporate Services said, "we have been looking hard at where we can potentially make savings."

The NRC will not be going out to consultation on its 2025/2026 annual plan as this will stay in line with what was proposed in the second year of the Long Term Plan.

NRC fund open for applications

The second round of the Northland Regional Council's Climate Resilient Communities Fund is now open for applications

The fund aims to build community resilience to the effects of climate change by focusing on local needs and community-led solutions. The NRC has \$600,000 to invest in projects that meet the funding criteria, and eligible groups can apply for between \$5,000 and \$40,000 plus GST.

Applications must be for projects in Te Taitokerau and from a legal community entity, such as hapū or iwi groups, community or neighbourhood groups, education providers, social enterprises and not-

for-profit businesses.

The fund will support projects focusing on: food resilience, water resilience, energy resilience nature-based resilience and planning for resilience.

Applications close 3 June 2025.

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

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Terry O'Meara

26 November 1943 - 19 April 2025

Terry O'Meara was someone who could be defined by the service he gave to his community.

Soon after he and his wife Sandra moved to Ruakākā with their three daughters in 1976 Terry volunteered as a Scout leader and became a member of both the Ruakākā School PTA and the St John Ambulance Committee. He joined the Marsden Jaycees where he held the positions of both Secretary and President. He became a Marsden Lion in 1985 and for 27 years played an active role in the many community projects undertaken by the Lions. He served terms as President, Secretary and Bulletin Editor.

For many years Terry and Sandra shared their home with foster children assisting 13 different children at difficult times in their lives. In 1981 they adopted the last of their foster children.

Terry was a fitter and turner by trade and came to work at the Marsden Power Station after working at the Meremere station, From 1987 he spent two years employed at the BP Service Station on State Highway One and another 19 years at the engineering company SPI, contracted for five of those years to the New Zealand Refining Company store.

On his retirement he set up Terry's Toy Shop at his home basement, making a variety of mainly wooden toys that he gave away or sold at very cheap prices saying his aim was to make children happy. He also maintained a Swap a Book cupboard in front of the house next to the Oasis Store and had the reputation of being the go to man for handyman jobs in his Ruakākā South neighbourhood.

Terry underwent surgery for bowel cancer in 2017 and Sandra commented how his "wonderful, positive attitude" had helped to pull him through this serious health challenge.

Continuing his lifelong habit of helping out where he could, Terry joined the Ostomate Society and became President of the Northland branch sometimes meeting with people who had recently undergone bowel surgery to help them adjust to their new condition.

In 2020 Terry was named Ruakākā Library Citizen of the Year.

Terry and Sandra were married for 57 years. Sandra described Terry as her "rock" and wonders how she will get on without him by her side but says she knows his love will continue to guide her.

Terry is also survived by his four daughters, three sons in laws, 15 grandchildren and seven great - grandchildren.

Sandra said as she and Terry were very much members of the Ruakākā community she wanted to hold the service here, rather than in Whangārei.

Hundreds of people attended a service to remember Terry in the Ruak \bar{a} Memorial Hall on Thursday, with many more watching the service on line.

Wastewater Treatment Plant Interim Solutions Option Poupouwhenua Reserve

The Ruakākā Wastewater Treatment Plant is approaching the limit on the amount of wastewater it is consented to discharge into existing consented areas. This is affecting Whangārei District Council's ability to process consents for new development in the area.

The construction of a new treatment plant and discharge facility is underway but not due for completion until 2030.

Council is considering a range of interim solutions to the capacity constraints. One possibility is to discharge treated wastewater via spray or dripline onto two reserve areas beside the existing treatment plant.

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
