### On the campaign to **bring Post Shop** services to Bream

Mavis Wright is on the campaign trail to get the payments service offered by NZ Post Shops to extend to the Ruakākā and Waipu post centres.

Mavis, who does not use the Internet, said she has to travel to either Otaika on the southern edge Whangārei or Wellsford to pay her car registration and she believes there are many others in this situation.

Carl Morley of Ruakākā Lotto and Post is understanding of Mavis's problem and is trying to arrange for the comprehensive payment service NZ Post offers from post shops to be available from his store. He said he gets many enquiries from people seeking to pay their vehicle registrations, change of ownership fees, road user charges, telephone, electricity bills, ambulance charges and he would like to be able to offer this service. But Brian White, owner of Waipu Lotto and Post, said he had already looked into this but had decided it was too expensive.

"It would be very time consuming and just not worth it for us "

He said NZ Post was not interested in increasing the number of its Post Shops

Ken Orr of the Ruakākā Town Centre it would make sense to have the expanded Post Shop service in Ruakākā. He said there is ample parking for big trucks on Marsden Point Rd., alongside the town centre. Truck drivers could update their road user charges in Ruakākā en route to the port.

### **EDITORIAL**

### As a civilized society we pool our resources to provide public assets

Years ago I let out our house in Avondale and moved to Wellington for a year with my two young daughters to study journalism at the polytechnic there. I found a flat in the centre of the city on the slopes of Mt. Victoria. To help pay the rent I needed a flatmate so I advertised and when a solo mother with a six-year-old daughter renlied. I thought she would be ideal.

She turned out to be a prostitute and would often leave her little girl with me while she went out on the town. This was not too much of a problem as I was there for my own children anyway. Sometimes in the morning I would have to direct a bleary eved Korean sailor to the nearest taxi rank so he could get back to his ship.

Money meant everything to this woman. When she had money from a client she would head out in a taxi to a down town hairdresser. She would get her nails painted and a fake tan and go on a shopping spree. Once the money was spent she would just stay in bed all day. She didn't seem to consider walking anywhere, taking her daughter to a park, a swimming pool, catching a bus or visiting the free library, art gallery or museum.

I was dirt poor in those days but I was able to provide for my children and give them some rich experiences by making use of the various facilities provided by the Wellington City Council

I am wary of local government election candidates who talk about cutting back on rates. We do need to ensure that the hard earned money we hand over to the Whangarei District Council is spent wisely but people who think that money is the be all and end all remind me of that former flatmate.

As a civilized society we pool our resources in the form of rates to provide public assets. These can be well-maintained roads, wastewater disposal systems, clean tap water and storm water drainage but are also sports fields, libraries and, dare I say it, shared walking, cycling, running and mobility scooter trails.

It is a beautiful thing on a Saturday morning to see all those children and young adults making use of the upgraded Ruakāka football fields. These fields, which remain sound after weeks of rain, are the result of some wisely spent Whangārei District Council rates money.

As I travel around Bream Bay I often come across the joyous sight of groups of cyclists out on rides together. I see people walking, running, riding bikes and getting good outdoor exercise on the Waipu to Waipu Cove Cycle and Walkway. Even people who live in the town's rural outskirts make use of this trail as they feel it is too dangerous to walk or cycle on our rural roads.

A sod turning ceremony with blessings from Patuharakeke representatives was held alongside the Ruakākā Tavern on Saturday morning 2 August. I hope we don't have too long to wait for the Ruakākā shared pathway to be built. I believe it will bring many advantages; it will provide a link between the communities of Ruakāka and Marsden Cove, save on fuel costs and time for busy parents when children can ride their bikes to after school activities, help to keep all those gregarious recreational e-bike riders safely separated from log trucks heading to and from the port, provide business opportunities, bring more tourists to the area and give those who already come here another activity to enjoy, but most of all it will raise levels of happiness for everyone who uses it now and for many years to come.

There is nothing quite like the freedom and happiness you can experience riding a bike out in the sun or the wind.



Council's revenue raising via rates, is in general controlled under the framework as laid out in the Local Government Act 2002. Since the implementation of this Act, council has been forced to spend considerable time and large amounts of expenditure on achieving the 4 wellbeing criteria as laid out in this legislation. These 4 criteria are: Social, Economic, Environmental and Cultural. Every project as planned or initiated by our council must be assessed for compliance with these criteria.

The good news is that central Government have just introduced to parliament the "Local Government (System Improvements) Bill". One key feature is the removal of these 4 wellbeing principles. It is expected to pass into law late this year and will change the outcome in favour of how rate payer funds are used. The main intention is to re-focus council on core activities such as infrastructure and services. But the bill also contains various other requirements that should improve, (and not before time)

TRANSPARENCY and ACCOUNTABILITY. Requirements for more information sharing with your elected councillors, inclusion of contractor and

consultant costs in financial reports and even a proposal for maximum terms for any Chief Executive will hopefully answer long standing concerns that ratepayers have been sounding the alarm on. Rate "capping" or "pegging" is yet to be addressed fully but is a part of the intended legislative process. Far from these proposals making it an easy transition for the newly elected incoming council lineup, they must all hit the ground running and I would relish this challenge.

### What happened here?



The above photograph was taken on Saturday morning 2 August 2025 at the Shoemaker Rd. /State Highway one intersection. Sergeant Smon Craig said two cars travelling north on Thursday 30 July at 9.30pm crashed with one ending up smashing into the array of signs at the intersection. No-one was injured.

### **Proposed Council Controlled** Organisation to take care of drinking water delivery and wastewater treatment and disposal throughout Northland

Three Waters the previous government's solution to water management problems around New Zealand was thrown on the bonfire of projects set by the current coalition government when it came to office. Three Waters proposal was heavily criticized as taking local assets away from local control.

Now there is a new name for a central government mandate to find efficiencies in the delivery of water services - Local Water Done Well.

In response Whangarei, Kaipara and the Far North District Councils have agreed to establish a Northland wide Council Controlled Organisation to take care of drinking water delivery and wastewater treatment and disposal in the region.

Andrew Carvell, WDC General Manager for Waters said advantages of the proposed CCO include., "cost efficiencies through shared resources, reduced duplication and economies of scale over time, improved borrowing capacity, enhanced resilience through a larger, shared workforce, improved ability to deliver large-scale capital programmes and respond to legislative changes, as well as a commercially focused board and management team."

A long held concern of Whangarei District residents to any kind of amalgamation is that we could end up subsidizing ratepayers in our two smaller neighbouring

Mr. Carvell gives assurances "Councils have agreed to a model that will see financials ring-fenced for each district and have non-harmonised water charges to start with, meaning water charges are different for residents in each district,"

It is expected that during its first three years, the CCO would be able to identify and prioritise some of the critical issues each district is facing and then be in a position to review its approach to finances and water charges.

"There are still many details to work through, but we are exploring further measures to ensure the CCO will be equally beneficial for each district, and set the right path towards harmonised water charges."

Under this model stormwater assets remaini with each Council. However in the press release sent out by the three Northland district Councils there is the statement that "a shared service arrangement could be made with the CCO for operations."

The Councils are required to deliver their "water services delivery plan" to the Government by 3 September 2025.

# Protecting land for future generations By Lydia Draper By Lydia Draper

Most of Aotearoa's land is privately owned (70% – approximately 19 million hecares). The concept of private ownership arrived with European settlers in the early 1800s. The path to Aotearoa had been paved by Abel Tasman who chartered the country in 1642, followed by James Cook who circumnavigated and mapped the three main islands in 1769.

The concept of private ownership was at odds with the collective way in which Māori lived (and still is). For example, individual titles for blocks of land could have no more than 10 people named as owners. Whereas a hapū (kinship group) could consist of 100, or even several hundred, whānau (family) members. In this way, the advent of private land ownership changed the landscape of Aotearoa forever; and with the same brushstroke, also made it difficult to protect land for future generations.

In 1977, the QEII National Trust was established under the Queen Elizabeth the Second National Trust Act. The Trust's mission is to "inspire private landowners to protect and enhance open spaces of ecological and cultural significance".

A huge variety of ecosystems are found on private land, including threatened habitats and areas of high ecological value. The QEII National Trust prioritises wetlands, sand dune systems and indigenous lowland ecosystems, as these have suffered the higoest losses.

The chart below details the QEII National Trust covenants in Te Ākau:

A QEII covenant is a permanent way of protecting land and its indigenous ecosystems. It's a legally binding agreement that states what the land can and can't be used for. A covenant cannot be removed and changes can only be made if they're in line with the covenant's objectives, even if the land is sold.

#### Placing a covenant on Māori whenua (land)

Established in 1991, the Ngā Whenua Rāhui Fund is a contestable fund that aims to facilitate the voluntary protection of indigenous biodiversity on Māori-owned whenua while honouring the rights guaranteed to Māori landowners under Te Tiriti o Waitanai'

Ngā Whenua Rāhui achieves this aim by working with hapū and whānau to place a kawenata (covenant) on all or part of the whenua. A kawenata is a legal agreement registered on the land title that serves to protect and preserve the indigenous biodiversity originally present in the landscape. The intention is for kawenata to remain on the whenua permanently but they each have a 25 year review clause, giving owners the opportunity to renegotiate the terms of the kawenata or opt out of it altogether.

In Te Ākau there are currently two Ngā Whenua Rāhui kawenata totalling 54 hectares. Across Aotearoa there are currently 307 agreements signed under kawenata. There is \$6.5 million of funding available on an annual basis, which covers the agreement work and operating the fund. The definition of Māori-owned whenua includes either Māori freehold land or general land owned by Māori.

The Ngã Whenua Rāhui Fund is currently closed but is proposed to re-open in March 2026. I was lucky to live the early years of my life on the property of my grandparents (Noeline and Walter Draper) located along Glenmohr Road and nestled into the Piroa mountain range (the Brynderwyns). The land was mostly dedicated to indigenous forest with a stand of ancient kauri watching over it like stoic senties. I remember sitting with my back against one of the trunks and gazing upwards for what seemed like forever. The kauri was so tall, its branches were lost to the sky. Thankfully my grandparents had the foresight to place the kauri stand in the QEII Trust. Although the land has changed ownership, it is a relief to know that the kauri trees will always be protected. But with 70% of Aotearoa in private ownership, what will become of the other indigenous forests that are so few and far between? Who will protect them?

### New kiln installed for Art Group

The kiln has been bought with funding from the Whangarei District Council's Communities Fund

BBCAG chairman Jan Corles said the new kiln is a huge boost to the group's popular pottery section, which is run by Anne Coutts and Vicki Bennett.

"There are some big smiles in the pottery group," she said. "We are so grateful for the funding. It's already made a huge difference for our group."

The old kiln had been bought second-hand and had recently developed faults which made firings unreliable, leading to some disappointing results when breakdowns occurred. It was needing continual repairs and monitoring to keep it running.

The new kiln will allow firings to be done at higher temperatures and the first pots have started emerging to great excitement from the group.

The old kiln is being kept for basic bisque firing for as long as it continues to work. The pottery sector has been growing steadily, with new sessions being added to cope with demand

Pottery sessions are held on Tuesdays from 10am to 12.30pm, and 5.30pm to 8pm Wednesdays from 10am to 12.30pm and Thursdays from 5.30pm to 8pm.

The fibre group meets on Wednesdays from 10am to 12.30pm.

The painting group meets on Tuesdays from 10am to 1pm.

A photography group is being revived this month and will meet on the fourth Thursday of the month at 7pm at the Art Cottage.

### Bream Bay schools in winning form at the AquaBot Northland

Year 7 Bream Bay College

On Saturday, four Bream Bay College students, Tia de Jong, Leo Parkes, Jayden Bradburn, and Isabelle Woodhead proudly represented their school in the Northland Regional Aquabots Competition held at Te Papawai community pool in Kawakawa. The NZ Aquabots program is the first underwater robotics programme aimed at school children in NZ. Based on a US Navy initiative it is designed to foster interest in science, technology, engineering, and mathematics (STEM) among students. The event, held in celebration of New Zealand's marine reserves (with a special focus on Goat Island, the country's first marine reserve), challenged students to put their engineering, teamwork, problem solving and environmental knowledge to work, to design and make their ROV (Remote Operated Vehicle).

The Bream Bay team competed with their Aquabot, Legacy, tackling a series of tricky tasks including: A marine-themed quiz to test their environmental knowledge. Driving challenges that demanded precision and coordination using their Aquabot. A timed underwater obstacle course simulating real life marine scenarios and testing the bot's speed, and a presentation where they showcased their learning and engineering processes. The day was far from easy, right at the first task, one of Legacy's propellers stopped working! But thanks to their quick thinking and teamwork, the team managed to repair it on the spot and continue with the competition. Their determination and hard work paid off, out of seven tasks, they won six, claiming first place overall and earning the Regional Winner trophy, and, they've now secured a spot at the National Aquabots Competition held in Wellington on the 30th of November.

Bream Bay also had three winning teams in the Primary School division with One Tree Point primary taking 1st and 3rd place and Waipu primary 2nd place. A big thanks to the Kahui Ako Initiative for purchasing the kits that allowed all the Bream Bay schools to participate in this event.

Mr. Orr took the Post Shop Regional Manager Peter Macartney on a tour of Ruakākā and One Tree Point to impress on him that this is a growth area.

Mr. Macartney agrees that there is certainly a lot of growth here. He said, "We are always looking at ways we can do things better."

He pointed out there is also a post shop in Maungaturoto and the Post Centre in Kaiwaka has a separate arrangement with the New Zealand Transport Agency to handle vehicle registrations, toll road payments and road user charges there.

New Zealand Post as the national mail carrier operates under a Deed of Understanding with the Government. One of NZ Posts obligations under the present deed is to have at least 240 Post Shops where customers "can receive personal assistance from a NZ Post employee or agent" and "can access a wider range of products and services over and above basic postal services."

However, last year the Ministry of Business Innovation and Employment ran a consultation on proposed changes to this deed and "on moving towards a financially sustainable mail service.'

The consultation closed in December 2024 and (to quote from the MBIE website) the ministry is "currently working through the next steps."

Riders go on excursions from the retirement village off One Tree Point Rd. twice each week.

Speaking earlier at the ceremony, which was held on Saturday morning 2 August, Jules Flight, who chairs the Shared Path group, said one of the major reasons for working to build this path is safety. He said sometimes while cycling on Port Marsden Highway or on Marsden Point Rd. if you reached out you could touch a log truck as it goes by and that the log truck drivers themselves are concerned about how dangerous this is. Jules also made the point that the path, which will be concreted, will be able to be used by walkers, joggers, mobility scooter riders, scooters and pushcahirs as well as cyclists.
